
81% of Alaskans thought the State should go to a "per student" funding model

## The Anchorage Tax Cap Model

Section 14.03. - Tax increase limitation.

(a)...the total amount of municipal tax that can be levied during a fiscal year shall not exceed the total amount approved by the assembly for the preceding year by more than a percentage determined by adding the average percentage increase in the Federal Consumer Price Index for Anchorage from the

preceding five fiscal years plus the average percentage growth or loss in the Anchorage municipal population over the preceding five fiscal years as determined by the state department of community and regional affairs.

## HOW DO WE MOVE THE EDUCATION FUNDING CONVERSATION FORWARD?

Senate Bill 238 suggests we reconsider the most effective way for the Legislature to appropriate public education funds.
