Minutes for Regular Meeting of July 24, 2001

ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY

1. CALL TO ORDER:

Assembly Chairman Dick Traini convened the meeting at 5:05 p.m. in the Assembly Chambers, 3600 Denali, Anchorage, Alaska.

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

The pledge was led by Mr. Tremaine.

4. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

 A. Regular Meeting - February 27, 2001

 Mr. Tesche moved, to approve the minutes of the February 27, 2001 regular seconded by Ms. Fairclough meeting.

Mr. Tesche said the roll call on page 1 indicated Mr. Tremaine was absent, but on page 1, line 50, he seconded a motion, and he also spoke on page 3 at line 5. Mr. Tremaine verified that he had been absent and excused from that meeting.

Mr. Tesche withdrew his motion with the consent of Ms. Fairclough.

Chair Traini directed the Clerk to correct the minutes and resubmit them for approval.

(Clerk's Note: See August 14 minutes for approval of the February 27 minutes.)

5. MAYOR'S REPORT:

Municipal Manager Harry Kieling apologized to the residents of Campbell Glen for the attractive landscaping that was mistakenly torn out recently. He said the Municipality would correct the error and take steps to ensure that this type of a mistake did not happen again in the future. Mr. Kieling said that despite the record-breaking rainfall in July, the Firewise campaign was still in effect, and advised residents to continue to be careful.

6. ASSEMBLY CHAIR'S REPORT:

Chair Traini reported that the wiring project for video, VCR, and DvD presentations was continuing, and the Assembly now could offer multimedia presentations. Chair Traini advised that item 15.A, Appeal S-10677 under Board of Adjustment/Assembly Appeals, would be postponed until 4:00 p.m. at the next regular meeting.

7. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Mr. Tesche reported that the Elections Committee had met with the Municipal Clerk and representatives of Accu-Vote about 10 days ago for the Accu-Vote system demonstration. He said contractual arrangements had been made with the contractor, and the Accu-Vote system would be in place for the next regular Municipal election in April 2002. He noted that Municipal employees would receive training in ballot composition at the contractor's location, and Accu-Vote representatives would be available in Anchorage during the first two elections to ensure the smooth operation of the elections.

 Ms. Von Gemmingen reported that the Alaska Municipal League Legislative Committee met in Seward on July 12 and 13, 2001. She said they developed a policy statement and a list of the major items the committee felt should be sent to State and federal legislators. She enumerated AML's priorities, which consisted of seven State priorities and five federal priorities. She said the draft list would be submitted to Alaska Mayors next month and then to the main body in November.

Chair Traini thanked Ms. Von Gemmingen for participating in AML, representing the Assembly.

Mr. Tesche stated his opposition to postponement. Ms. Taylor and Ms. Shamberg spoke against postponement.

Mr. Sullivan supported postponement and stated that they should allow the Mayor the opportunity to be present to address the issue.

Chair Traini opened the public hearing and asked if anyone wished to speak.

ROBERT SHIPLEY, representing Anchorage Waterways Council, outlined additional items the Council felt should be included in the Northwood Transportation Study, including adding Fish Creek to the area boundary map as they relate to the Anchorage 2020 Comprehensive Plan. It was also the Council's suggestion that the study area be expanded to the north and northwest since that was part of the Fish Creek watershed, and that other study areas be established so that a comprehensive approach could be taken for our city.

MARGARET AUTH testified regarding changes that have taken place in this area over the years and how they have impacted the neighborhoods. She cited serious discrepancies in zoning in the area that allowed residential homes to abut commercial properties, a street that ends in the middle of nowhere, and a trucking operation directly adjacent to a school, a ball field, and a recreation center. She urged the Assembly to halt further commercial development until the community could develop a plan for existing residential and commercial properties to co-exist safely and efficiently.

JOE MURDY stated his support for the ordinance; however, he cautioned the Assembly to carefully review the legal aspects of the ordinance with respect to the Municipality's liability.

WILLIAM EVANS said he supported the ordinance and would like to see the moratorium expanded. He said the reason the public opposed it was because of the process. He noted that the Army Corps of Engineers had issued a permit containing conditional uses to the previous owners, and Dimond Parking Lot management had bypassed the process of having the permit transferred over to them.

JIM VERHAGEY said he was a 50-year resident of this area, and his property was adjacent to the proposed construction site on Willow Place. He opposed construction of an apartment complex in this area, primarily because he felt it would cause his property to be flooded with water even more than it had been in recent years.

ROBIN LEVINE stated her support for the ordinance. She said she was primarily concerned with the property at the corner of 34th and Willow Place. She said the manmade pond there was on private property, but the connecting creek had recently been determined to be part of a natural watershed, i.e., a tributary of Fish Creek. She said it was the developers' intent to fill in the pond in order to build the four-plex. She urged that the regulation preventing construction within 20 feet of a naturally occurring waterway was enforced in this case.

GERALDINE WALTER said she owned the property on 34th across from the proposed four-plex construction site. She stated that she had not been notified of the proposed construction. Ms. Walter said three other people had natural wells from the water at that site. She expressed concern that if the pond was filled in, the natural wells on those homeowners properties would cease to exist and the water would be pushed over to her side of the street and flood her property.

Ms. Fairclough pointed out that the ordinance before the Assembly was for a moratorium on building permits in the Northwood Transportation Study area and for the development of a study area report. She noted that the four-plex people were testifying about something not in the proposed study area. Chair Traini clarified that those people who were testifying about the four-plex wanted the Northwood Transportation Study area expanded to include the area surrounding the site of the proposed four-plex construction. Ms. Walter confirmed Chair Traini's understanding.

KEVIN TRITT stated his support for an expanded study area. He echoed Ms. Levine's comments about including review of the waterways in that area into the study. Mr. Tritt said he would also like a study of the area to determine the impacts of pollutants that may be leaching from the ground and flowing into the creek that had been determined to be a Fish Creek tributary.

DAVE MANNING advocated expanding the moratorium area. He felt further development would be a degradation to the neighborhood. He said he had personally observed moose, waterfowl, and a pair of muskrats at the pond that Ms. Levine and Mr. Tritt had commented on earlier. He also reiterated Mr. Verhagey's and Ms. Walter's comments regarding flooding in that

VICTORIA WENDELL said she felt this was one of the most desirable areas to live within the community and she did not want the character of the neighborhood to change. She said she had personally observed wildlife in the area of the creek, and there was seasonal flooding in the area.

JEANIE SUMMERS, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, stated her support for the ordinance. She said many wetlands have been filled and creeks have been diverted due to improper flow of water through some of these types of areas, and these problems have been and continue to be addressed. She asked the Assembly to vote in favor of the ordinance so these issues could be addressed before more development caused other flooding problems in this particular area.

Ms. Fairclough reiterated that while the water, drainage, and development issues were being discussed eloquently by those providing public comment, the ordinance before the Assembly, the Northwood Transportation Study, did not address any of those things. She urged the public to focus their testimony on the issue currently before the Assembly.

DEE HI, pond owner's representative, said this area had been carefully studied for over a year, they had gone through the public process and the Corps of Engineers process, and a hydrology study had been conducted on the intermittent stream others had testified about. Chair Traini opened the public hearing and asked if anyone wished to speak.

BROOKS CHANDLER, former Girdwood Service Area Board member, testified in support of the ordinance. He said it was good public policy and should be adopted by the Municipality.

JULIE JONAS stated her support for this ordinance. Ms. Jonas said after the long debate and process of the railroad spur issue in Girdwood, residents had, over a three-year period, developed a system for how they would, as a community, develop their position on issues and relay it to the Anchorage Assembly. She said after a series of very well attended town meetings, a Federation of Community Councils survey, and placing advisory questions on the ballot, the Girdwood community arrived at a compromise to combine the functions of a limited road service area board and the community council. She said their new system comprised the ability to broaden citizen participation and, at the same time, allowed their elected representatives to speak on behalf of their community with one unified voice. She urged approval of AO 2001-128.

DAVE SEARS clarified that the Girdwood Board of Supervisors (GBOS) had been designated by the Girdwood Community Council to act on behalf of the council. He noted the designation could be retracted should the council change its bylaws, and the council's bylaws set out a method through the Land Use Committee to override any GBOS' vote that runs counter to the Land Use Committee's recommendations and, thus, the community's wishes. He said the private community voice and control aspects of the community council had been combined with the representative aspects of an elected body. He said the Assembly's approval of this ordinance would allow Girdwood to have the type of community council representation they desired, and it could be accomplished with the addition of one sentence to the Anchorage Municipal Code.

Chair Traini asked if anyone else wished to speak. There was no one, and he closed the public hearing.

Resolution No. AR 2001-178, a resolution protesting the renewal of the beverage dispensary-tourism liquor license for Spenard Paradise Inn (License No. 1139); transmitting notification of violation of conditions to the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board; and finding the continued operation of the licensed premise to be a public nuisance, Assemblymembers Von Gemmingen, Sullivan, Traini, Shamberg, Taylor and Van Etten.

(CONTINUED FORM 6-19-01)

Chair Traini opened the public hearing and asked if anyone wished to speak.

TOM McGRATH, Chairman, Spenard Community Council, gave the history of the liquor license at the Spenard Paradise Inn, citing numerous incidents and State Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) Board violations. He said when concerned citizens had met with then Lt. Monegan in July 2000 to discuss the problems in the area, Lt. Monegan had displayed a map depicting approximately 1,000 police calls on West 30th between Arctic and Spenard, about a two and a half block area. Mr. McGrath felt the only way there could be that many problems was if the businesses in the area were collaborating to support prostitution and drug trafficking. He said it was incumbent upon the Assembly to withdraw the Paradise Inn's beverage dispensary license and/or to abate the property so these businesses could no longer collaborate and cooperate with, and/or condone, those were committing illegal activities in the area. He said this was infringing on residents' constitutional right of pursuit of happiness to live in a drug-free and crime-free area.

MARGARET AUTH reiterated that this area had a history of problems. She said when she worked for a nonprofit organization six years ago, they did neighborhood organizing, where they asked certain neighborhoods to assess their problems and how they could resolve them. She said West 30th was a problem at that time in 1995, and the reason she brought this up was that it showed that no one had been able to resolve the problems associated with that street in that amount of time. She said the residents of the area were terrified of the people who owned these businesses, the people who frequented these businesses, and the people that traversed West 30th Avenue. She concurred with Mr. McGrath's assertion that the Assembly was responsible for addressing the problems. She said a liquor license was a privilege extended to business owners who were expected to be responsible and be good community members. She felt the Spenard Paradise Inn did not measure up as a good community member.

MICHAEL GASKWITZ said he had lived across the street from the back parking lot of the Paradise Inn for two years. He testified regarding the constant activity by prostitutes and drug dealers between the Easy Inn and the Paradise Inn as well as in the parking lots. He said prostitutes and drug dealers moved freely between the two establishments, and he had observed people inside the establishments open the back doors to let prostitutes and drug dealers inside. He said it was intimidating to residents. He estimated that the activity on West 30th would decrease by at least 60 percent if the Paradise Inn and the Easy Inn were no longer in business. He said residents of the area had talked to the owner of the bar, to no avail. Mr. Gaskwitz said the Assembly had the ability to get the owner's attention, and he asked that they do so.

SAM O'CONNOR, President, Westside Community Patrol, said they spent nearly 500 hours per month in the area of West 30th. He felt Paradise Inn contributed significantly to the illegal activities that take place in the neighborhood. Mr. O'Connor reported that the Paradise Inn's security personnel were known felons, and the community patrol had videotaped those individuals dealing drugs in the area. He reiterated Mr. Gaskwitz's comments that the owner, Mr. Song, runs the prostitutes out when Mr. O'Connor cruises the area in a marked patrol vehicle or calls Mr. Song on the phone, but if Mr. O'Connor was in the area in an unmarked vehicle, or Mr. Song was not aware Mr. O'Connor was in the area, it was obvious that no efforts were taken to rid the area of the prostitutes. Mr. O'Connor said there were rumors of after-hours activity as well, and he had videotaped footage of illegal activities in this area. He said no one walks the perimeter of the hotel as the owner had stated in a letter.

ALICIA KNIGHT, Westside Community Patrol member, testified regarding her observations and experiences with prostitution, drug dealing, and trafficking in stolen goods in and around the Spenard Paradise Inn. She reiterated Mr. O'Connor's comments that the owner was quick to take action when this activity was pointed out to him, but it was obvious he did nothing when he was unaware that patrol members or police officers were in the area. She said the security guard that attended the meeting with then Lt. Monegan in 2000 was a known felon, and she had observed him on numerous occasions in the parking lot between the Easy Inn and the Paradise Inn. She had also seen him let prostitutes into the establishment where he was working them out of the back door. Ms. Knight responded to Assembly member questions regarding photos she had submitted.

DIANE OLSON, Westside Community Patrol member and dispatcher, said that on an average weekend, 75 percent of the calls were regarding West 30th Avenue. She echoed Mr. O'Connor's and Ms. Knight's comments regarding the owner's apparent disregard for ridding his establishment of the criminal activity that prevailed there unless he was being observed or talked to by the authorities.

JULIE AUGUSTINE concurred with others' comments regarding the security personnel at the Paradise Inn being criminals, and she stated these felons were now approaching the kids at the bus stops. She said it was time to stop observing and do something about eradicating the problem from the neighborhood.

Chair Traini asked if anyone else wished to speak. There was no one, and he closed the public hearing.

Anchorage Police Chief Walt Monegan said that when he was a Lieutenant in charge of the West District, he met with concerned citizens at Pancho's Villa to discuss the problems, and he described his efforts during that time to resolve the issues. He said he had told the owner that if they were unable to reduce crime and illegal activities in this area that were attributable to the Paradise Inn, they would try to civilly abate it. He said they had worked with Mr. Wheeler on abatement at that time. During that time period, the owner had lost his security personnel, and they had witnessed a reduction in police calls to the area. He said Officers Steve Oyler and Luis Soto routinely patrol this area now, and they were available for Assembly member questions at this time. Chief Monegan responded to Assembly member questions.

Mr. Sullivan moved, to approve AR 2001-178. seconded by Mr. Tesche,

Mr. Song, the owner of Spenard Paradise Inn, Mr. Song's attorney, John Buckholtz, and Mr. Song's interpreter, Mr. Noe were requested to come before the Assembly to respond to questions.

Mr. Tremaine asked that Mr. Song produce the 15 surveillance tapes from the Paradise Inn. Mr. Buckholtz stated there were no tape recordings; they had a video monitoring system. Mr. Tremaine asked Mr. Song to confirm that there were no videotapes of the exterior entrance or the interior of the bar. Through his interpreter, Mr. Song advised that he was videotaping the interior at the current time, but he was not videotaping the exterior.

Mr. Song, through his interpreter, responded to Assembly member questions regarding the conditions contained in his beverage dispensary liquor license and to public comments raised earlier.

POLLY SMITH, Executive Director, Anchorage Literacy Project (ALP), applied for funding under the block grants, one of the few sources of capital funding available to nonprofit service agencies in Anchorage. Ms. Smith said after months of preparation and expense, ALP was one of two agencies that received funding, out of six that had applied, from the Housing and Neighborhood Development (HAND) Commission. At least three of the four proposals were rejected for the same reason, the omission of the new Form 10029, which was new to the application process and was extremely confusing to complete. She asked the Municipality to allow those agencies to remedy the omission of the form. She requested that the Assembly review the process and consider allowing the HAND Commission to review all submitted proposals and that the funding be separated by year instead of having a two-year funding block.

SALLY VENADA, Educator and Coordinator with Impact Family Literacy Program, associated with the Anchorage Literacy Project, said she was one of three people who had collaborated on writing the grant proposal for the Community Development Block Grant. She said she was experienced in writing federal and state grants, and while most were consistent in format, information, and required forms, this particular application was quite different. She said the budget forms were the most confusing and difficult she had ever encountered. She added that the new minority and women-owed business form did not seem to apply to their proposal. She said her group would have been much less disappointed in not receiving funding from the grant had the decision been based on the merits of their proposal, the content and their plan, rather than their misinterpreting a confusing new form. She urged the Assembly to review the format, the forms, and the process in an effort to make it more straightforward and fairer to future applicants.

JIM BARNETT, attorney for the Anchorage Literacy Project (ALP) and Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center, both applicants who were denied funding due to omission of the new Form 10029, spoke. He said both of these applicants had outstanding proposals that deserved the opportunity to be reviewed. Mr. Barnett said they appealed and been denied, and they also requested assistance from the Mayor. He said Office of Planning, Development and Public Works Director Craig Campbell called him a couple of weeks ago and advised that their request for assistance would also be denied. He said he advised his clients that the Anchorage Assembly was their last option for seeking assistance in this matter. Mr. Barnett asked that the Assembly consider other options for allowing the denied applicants another chance to have their proposals reviewed by the HAND Commission.

Ms. Shamberg moved, seconded by Mr. Tremaine, and it passed without objection,

to continue the public hearing until 11:00 p.m. to finish AR 2001-211.

JAN McCLARENCE, Executive Director of AWAIC, said AWAIC was one of the successful bidders for this grant funding. She said she has had many years of grant writing experience, and this was one of the more extensive and difficult grant processes she had participated in. She pointed out that there was a certain threshold that had to be met, and two agencies met it and four did not. She noted that this was a competitive process, and these agencies frequently compete for the limited grant funds that occasionally become available. She said the process was over, and two agencies had met the criteria and been awarded grants, and she felt that it would be unfair to change the rules at this time to allow the other agencies another opportunity. She asked that the Assembly follow through with the guidelines that had been set out for this process.

DAVID TAYLOR, Board President for AWAIC, said AWAIC wanted to address the need for transitional housing for some time, and this grant would provide them the opportunity to do so. He said the funding they had been awarded through the grant would allow them to build a 10-apartment facility adjacent to their secure facility on West 13th Avenue, and also provide administrative space in the AWAIC facility to assist with counseling and other services provided by their organization. He said this grant helped them accomplish their mission, and he urged the Assembly to approve the resolution.

BILL BOBRICK said he was the President of the Board of Standing Together Against Rape (STAR), but he was testifying personally at this time. He said it was unfortunate that deserving nonprofit organizations had to compete for the limited funds that were available, and that was why the bidding process was necessary. He said the AWAIC project was a very necessary project as it presented a life safety issue, and he urged the Assembly to approve the resolution.

Chair Traini asked if anyone else wished to speak. There was no one, and he closed the public hearing.

BEVERLY JONES addressed the public comments regarding the process and the new form, as well as the method by which proposal was judged. She noted that the grant proposal contained a statement that made it clear that if there were any questions, applicants should call the Purchasing Department. Ms. Jones also briefly explained the action plan program, which represents the Municipality's application to HUD for its annual \$3.5+ million entitlement.

Mr. Sullivan moved. seconded by Mr. Van Etten, to approve AR 2001-211.
