DELANEY PARK STRIP - PHASE II

Problem: Funds are needed to r

Funds are needed to maintain Delaney Park as a vibrant public space serving all of Anchorage. The constant wear and tear of major events and sports use combined with outdated facilities has caused major park infrastructure decline.

Scope:

Delaney Park is one of Anchorage's oldest and most celebrated parks. The initial phase of the project approved by Anchorage Voters in 2007 will upgrade basic park amenities. New funding will make repairs to include safe walking areas, appropriate landscape buffers, tennis court rehabilitation, outdoor hockey rink improvements and higher quality turf for sports and statewide events. Connections and gateways will also be strengthened to adjacent neighborhoods and downtown across 9th and 10th Avenues via the "E" Street Corridor, Town Square Park, the new convention center and the Museum. These improvements will enhance the park by improving visibility, pedestrian safety and linking to major downtown facilities. \Box

Status:

Delaney Park was first established as a fire break during the initial town building phase in the 1920's and later served as the first airport and golf course for the city. During the war, troops were housed there and the first park plans were developed in the 1950's. Statehood was celebrated here, Pope John Paul II visited, and each year the Governor's Picnic is held in the park. Like the National Mall, this park is home to a number of memorials to our military and past historic events in Alaska. $\Box\Box$ An extensive master plan effort has occurred over the past two years and the final plan identifies repairs and upgrades needed for improvement. A Citizen Advisory Group guided the process along with major public review opportunities. Project funds are intended to systematically upgrade facilities over a multi-year period with strong local as well as private support to match the State funding requests.

MARGARET SULLIVAN PARK (WESTCHESTER LAGOON)

Problem:

Heavy recreation use has created wear and tear on the park's infrastructure. Life cycle upgrades will protect park users and the community's investment in healthy recreation destinations.

Scope:

Requested funds would leverage a 2006 State Legislative Grant for Margaret Eagan Sullivan Park. Park improvements include a children's play area, safety upgrades to the Trail Watch Headquarters, trail safety improvements as well as parking, lighting and winter access improvements to enhance community needs.

Status:

A bird lover's paradise, Margaret Eagan Sullivan Park is home to a popular lagoon for ice skating and canoeing as well as the Chester Creek and Coastal Trails. South Addition Community Council currently has a committee working on a children's play area design for the western end of the park. Construction is planned for 2009 to take advantage of the Chester Creek Aquatic Habitat improvements scheduled for 2008.

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VALLEY OF THE MOON PARK - PHASE II

Problem: Unfortunately, the popularity and extensive use of the park has left visible signs on the park infrastructure. Funds are needed to ensure a safe community park for future generations.

Scope: Requested funds will be used to leverage municipal and Anchorage Park Foundation funds for upgrades to play equipment, upgraded turf areas including irrigation, stabilized and enhanced stream bank areas for habitat protection, and to provide improved signage, park amenities and landscaping. □

Status: Valley of the Moon Park is one of Anchorage's most popular and well used recreation areas. Located close to Downtown, the park offers picnic and play areas including the city's tallest play structure as well as open field space for neighborhood football and soccer games. The park is also a part of the Chester Creek Greenbelt and offers trail users a respite from their athletic activities on the trail. Due to its ideal location, the park also draws a very culturally diverse user group that represents the many nationalities that inhabit the Anchorage Bowl. I□□n 2007, voters approved a \$250,000 municipal park bond which is funding design and small improvements to this extremely popular community park. □

10th Ave Surface Rehab - P St to Ingra St **Problem:** Pavement condition is deteriorating. Replace or overlay the pavement along with ADA sidewalk and curb rehab. Scope: Status: No work is currently scheduled in the 6-year Capital Improvement Program. The project will remain on the Capital Project Needs List for future funding consideration. 16th Ave Upgrade - E St to C St Problem: This road is in poor condition with pavement and some curbs. Drainage, street lighting, and pedestrian facilities are inadequate. Reconstruct road to include pavement, curbs, pedestrian facilities, drainage, and street Scope: lighting. No work is currently scheduled in the 6-year Capital Improvement Program. Funding will be Status:

through the Road Improvement District program unless reclassified as a collector street.

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9th Ave Reconstruction - L St to LaTouche St Problem: Pavement on this minor arterial street has deteriorated to the point where maintenance is not cost effective. The traffic signal detection loops are deteriorated and the signal system is at the end of its design life. Scope: Project will include pavement rehab, new traffic signals, street illumination, ADA improvements, pedestian and bike paths and landscape improvements. Project re-scoped to provide for a modified three-lane section between L Street and LaTouche Street. Landscape and hardscape improvements added to strengthen pedestrian connection between Fairview & Downtown. Full project funding is proposed with a combination 2008 state grant and 2009 bond funds. Construction is expected to begin in 2009. C St at 20th Ave Drainage The existing storm outfall is lower than the creek which causes sedimentation and ice build up Problem: in the system. The facility serves a local neighborhood. This project is a priority for street maintenance. This project is expected to construct a drainage lift station and a new storm drain outfall into Scope: Chester Creek at 20th Avenue. Status: A 2008 state grant has been requested. This, combined with a 50/50 local road bond match, will fully fund the project for a 2009 construction start.

Chester Creek Aquatic Habitat Restoration - Westchester Lagoon Improvements

- Reconstruct the existing outfall from Westchester Lagoon into Cook Inlet which does not Problem: adequately allow for fish passage.
 - Phase I of this project relocated the existing utilities at the Westchester Lagoon outfall into Scope: Cook Inlet.
 - Phase II will reconstruct the outfall into Cook Inlet and is complete.
 - This project is funded. Design is substantially complete and bidding is expected in the spring Status: of 2008.
