The Anchorage Veteran's Memorial is intended to be a place that inspires and nurtures all visitors -- veterans, non-veterans and especially school children -- for a heightened sense of patriotism and an appreciation for the sacrifices endured by the veterans from the 49th State. The current Veteran's Memorial in Delaney Park has many limiting features and there is a strong desire within the community for the memorial to adequately reflect the contributions of our Alaskan veterans. The proposed memorial improvements will redesign the existing Veteran's Memorial to recognize the use of the space that has evolved over many years. The existing memorial will be reoriented to address problematic site conditions such as solar glare and traffic noise, existing elements will be reorganized and new elements will be constructed. These improvements will provide a fully accessible space for public ceremony while recognizing the needs of many for a space for quiet remembrance. It will provide space to acknowledge the campaigns of America's military while recognizing the specific sacrifices of Alaskans and their contributions to the protection of liberty. Improvements will make the memorial fully accessible to the disabled, will provide sound attenuation from nearby roadways, and provide lighting and visibility that meets the needs of our veterans and citizens while providing a safe and secure public space. The urban arterial segments of the routes are characterized by high travel demand, congestion, and resulting safety issues caused by traffic levels that have exceeded the capacity of the existing arterial street network.
