Members of the Assembly and Citizens of Anchorage:

The approved 1981-1986 Capital Improvement Program is the result of a comprehensive planning and budgeting process and represents a balanced program designed to begin the 1980 decade with construction of transportation, public safety, cultural, recreational, and utility improvements which will help shape the future of Anchorage. While continuing to rely on General Obligation Bonds to fund the majority of our expanded transportation and public safety capital projects, the program clearly places increased emphasis on an equitable share of the state's oil wealth surpluses to construct needed and long-awaited major projects.

1980 has been an exciting and productive year for the Municipality in the area of capital improvements. As a result of combined efforts of the Anchorage legislative delegation, the Assembly, and the Municipal Administration, many long-awaited and needed capital projects have been funded by state grants. 1980 grants to the Municipality for projects total nearly \$115,000,000. Of this amount, Project 80s-Phase I, a comprehensive community and economic development program, received grants totaling \$68,060,000.

In 1981, we have incorporated Project 80s-Phase II into our capital plan. The Phase II projects were selected to complement Phase I in making Anchorage a better place to live and conduct business. The following is a summary of Project 80s-Phase II.

The location intent of Assemblyman Walsh was misinterpreted by the Design and Development Section of Cultural and Recreation to mean property adjacent to Tudor School.

Consequently, \$300,000 was placed in the Park Acquisition Category under the heading Tudor School Park. (See Attachment 2)

- 3) Correct the error in the 82 -87 CIP preparation cycle.

MR LEVY responded to Mr. Baer's comments and stated when he talked to the Mayor, the Mayor had explained that Anchorage has the best lighting in the nation. Another point he made was that this country still operates under the Bill of Rights and everything counteracts itself.

Mrs. Maser thanked MR. LEVY for coming and she said she would hope he would encourage other young people to come to the assembly meetings.

Dr. Selkregg asked if he belonged to or worked for the Commission on Youth and he replied "no". She stated he would make a good contribution

Mr. Walsh said he appreciated the fine presentation. However, he would like to point out that you cannot legislate the responsibility of common sense. He said what it takes is people like MR. LEVY getting involved.

MR. LEVY responded and said he felt there is something that can be done financially. He suggested that bars should be tied down to the death of an individual, then they should accept part of the responsibility and he feels their license should be revoked for one year.

Mr. Walsh advised there is already civil liability.

Mr. Smith said he thought the new law regarding alcohol does have a new requirement that the bartender or owner of the club has to turn someone around if they are fully intoxicated.

MR. LEVY responded and said this has happened in other towns in the U.S. and he feels something can be done.

Mr. O'Connor stated that you can make all kinds of laws. However, there is not a true solution to the problem.

LINDA VEST advised she received a petition in the mail regarding Lot 1, Lakehill Acres which was to be heard conight and it was not on the agenda.

Mr. O'Connor stated it was to be heard by the Platting Board at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Hall, on February 4, 1981.

16. MAYOR'S COMMENTS:

None.

17. ASSEMBLY COMMENTS:

Mrs. Maser renewed the assembly's memories about meetings that were to be scheduled with other departments of the Municipality. She would like to have this done in the near future. Also, she requested a legal opinion on who could appoint people to special committees. She said there is an opinion that only the Mayor has the prerogative to appoint people and she would like to know if the assembly has the authority to do this. Third, she advised she would like to resign from Chairmanship of the Quasi-Institutional Committee.

Mr. Smith asked that an ordinance be drafted to zone Turnagain View Subdivision to RIA. Second, Mr. Smith ask the staff to give him an indication in regard to an item he would like placed in the 1982 CIP. He said in a couple of weeks he would like to amend the CIP to include additional money to be able to complete a downtown social itinerate center. He said he thinks possibly another \$400,000 is what is needed. He said if the assembly wants to, it could lobby for the money from the state before the session goes too far.

Dr. Selkregg said she would really like to see a document telling her why the building on 3rd Avenue cannot not be used for the itinerate center.

Mr. Smith asked that Bert Hall or the administration come up with some kind of figure based on the report that came out of the meeting at the Holiday Inn.

Finally, Mr. Smith said he is currious about the Municipal Health Plan and he was wondering if it could be designed in such a way that a person

being citizen of Anchorage could participate in the plan by paying the same costs as a municipal employee.

Mr. Baer advised there are some people in Anchorage who are looking into the health plan at the present time. He also questioned the cancellation of the meetings on February 24, and March 10.

Chairman Marsh stated the NACO meeting is March 8 through March 11.

Mr. Josephson said the NLC meeting is February 28 through March 4.

Mr. Baer also questioned the period of time for the advertisement of the Ombudsman position.

Mr. Smith stated he believed it was being advertised through February 23, 1981.

Mr. Josephson spoke to the Mayor's reponse to the assembly's comments. He also said the Supreme Court of Alaska had made a decision regarding the closure of the Government Hill School case. He asked Mr. Berns if he would like to make a comment or if he had had an opportunity to take a look at the case.

Mr. Berns responded and stated he had not had an opportunity to look at the decision. However, he would and bring a report back to the assembly on what impact it might have.

Dr. Selkregg commented regarding the procedures for the Comprehensive Plan. She suggested the staff go to the various community meetings and bring back information. She said then it goes to the Planning and Zoning Commission, then the Mayor, and then the assembly. She stated the community meetings do not have a large attendance. Therefore, she would suggest that before it goes through the whole process that there be a meeting with the assembly and let them have their input as a majority of them will attend the community meetings. She feels there should be some review by the assembly and maybe there will have to be some changes in the procedures.

Ms. Angvik agreed with Dr. Selkregg and stated there should be an opportunity to talk about the Comprehensive Plan with the staff and then hold the public hearing before taking action.

Dr. Selkregg stated she does not intend to stop anything but just to add something. She commended the Planning and Zoning Commission on a beautiful job.

Mr. Walsh said he would like Traffic Engineering to look into the traffic pattern on Spenard Road particularly the intersections of Mc Rae, Northwood and Turnagain. Along with that he stated Mr. Tecca knows the problem on Hillcrest and Forest Park which had existed for several years until they put in speeding light and the problem was decreased by 80%. He also spoke to the bulletin of the Alaska Municipal League and specifically SP 44 and he suggested that the assembly take particular notice of this. He called to the attention of the assembly the Mayor's letter referring to a noon meeting on February '24, and since the assembly meeting was cancelled, he would prefer the noon meeting be set for another date. He said the last night of the amendments to the CIP, he had requested \$250,000 or \$300,000 be put in the budget for a park behind Nerlands for 1982. He said at that time he had requested a report from Parks and Recreation regarding this. He requested the report as soon as possible. Finally, he stated at the assembly's recreat they had talked about the necessity of treating one another with respect and like the legislators they are. He commented that unfortunately there was more of a breach of this than performance and he is tired of it. He said it violates the spirit of cooperation. In closing he said he would take more care in the comments he makes and he would hope the others would

PREFACE

The Capital Improvement Program is organized into three sections. Section I contains program and financial summaries of the entire General Government and Utility Capital Improvement Programs. Section II contains detailed summaries of each General Government Department's Capital Program and Section III contains detailed summaries of each Utility's Capital Program.

Section II and Section III contain a series of five summary forms which provide detailed project category and individual project information. These forms are arranged in project category grouping. The CIP-1 outlines Department/Utility goals, objectives, and priority criteria. These forms are included for each Department/Utility and in many cases for each Project Category within a Department. The CIP-2 summarizes the status of the existing Capital Budget as of 12-31-79. Projects which are funded but not complete are shown with a brief explanation of project status. There are CIP-2 forms for each project category having a prior year budget. The Capital Project Category Summary provides a financial summary by year of all projects within a given category including Capital Investment Cost Category Totals, Source of Funds Totals, and Operating Cost Impacts when there is a tax impact. There is a Category Summary for each project category. The CIP-4 and CIP-5 forms, respectively, are financial and narrative summaries of each project within a project category. There are often several pairs of CIP-4 and CIP-5 forms for each project category.

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
