This is an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

The 2015 CAPER provides an overview of major initiatives that were executed in program year 2015 by the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Public Health Initiatives and Partnerships Division, Community Safety and Development (CSD). The MOA experienced delays in implementing goals and outcomes in Annual Action Plans (AP) due in part to 6 to 12 month delays in receiving HUD grant agreements for the last three years. The MOA did not receive 2013 HUD grant agreements until December 2013 so these funds were not allocated until 2014. The 2014 Action Plan was approved by HUD on July 1, 2014 with HUD grant agreements received on August 14, 2014. On June 18, 2015, the 2015 AP was approved by HUD and the MOA received HUD grant agreements.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Projects

Administration, Planning, and Grant Management - CDBG

Administration, planning and grant management to carry out Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) are summarized below.

- General and financial management of the CDBG projects and programs were successfully completed.
- Community coordination in the development of the draft 2016 Action Plan and 2014 CAPER.
- Executing the MOA's Request for Proposal procurement process and ensuring that written agreements comply with federal guidelines.
- Monitored subrecipient agreements, recordkeeping and related budgets, in conformance with all federal, state and municipal guidelines, including eligibility under HUD national objectives, Davis Bacon labor requirements, environmental reviews, fair housing and affirmative marketing.
- Completed the annual monitoring review schedule for all HUD rental housing development projects and subrecipient agreements.
- CSD staff participated in the development of the Anchorage Community Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness.
- CSD staff participated in community planning and activities that included CoC membership meetings, Annual Project Homeless Connect and Fair Housing Accessibility Training.

- Directed CSD operational costs and indirect costs as determined by the Intergovernmental Chargeback System (IGC's) based on the MOA's Central Services Cost Allocation Plan in accordance with OMB 2 Circular 200 governing reimbursable federal awards.
- Obligated administration and planning funds to salaries and related costs for general management, oversight and coordination of the CDBG program (\$322,724).
- MOA Intergovernmental Charges in the amount of \$93,242 was expensed and recorded during 2015 for the years 2014 and 2015.
- Funds obligated to administration are limited to 20 percent of the CDBG Entitlement for the program year, plus program income.

services Project Delivery Costs. Previous to 2013, Project Delivery Costs were maintained separately. These expenditures are reported as part of the CDBG and HOME activities to which they are associated. In the 2015 AP, project delivery costs were budgeted separately to the MRP, the MHRP and the SHI project.

Minor Repair Program – NeighborWorks Anchorage (NWA)

The Minor Repair Program (MRP) provided assistance for increased accessibility, energy efficiency or repairs to items presenting a threat to health or safety in an owner-occupied home (including mobile homes, condos, and single family homes). For the standard component of the MRP, assistance was available to low- and moderate-income residents throughout the MOA and was provided in the form of a grant. Loans may be available when projects need to exceed the maximum of \$15,000 for health and safety reasons. All homes considered for assistance under this component of the MRP must be occupied by owners with annual incomes at or below 80 percent of the area median income, as determined by HUD, which is adjusted for family size. Maximum project cost per eligible client is \$15,000, excluding housing services costs. Exceptions may be made for homes with additional costs due to lead-based paint, or fund unforeseen cost overruns, when additional costs are due to improvements that will accommodate a resident's disability or for other exceptional circumstances.

Anchorage Safety Center – MOA

The MOA DHHS manages the Anchorage Safety Center and Anchorage Safety Patrol (ASC/P), a State mandated (AS Title 47) protective custody hold facility for persons who are incapacitated by alcohol or drugs in a public place. The ASC is opened around the clock, 365 days a year, to monitor clients during the sobering process. Over 90 percent of the people using the ASC/P report to be homeless.

The ASC facility received funding for repairs to improve the health, safety, and sanitation of the facility. These repairs included replacement of latrine fixtures, fire resistant wall panels in sleep off area, heat circulating elements, reinforcement in quiet room door and window, added barrel bolts and latch on quiet room door, widen guardian partition protection and metal corners guards, painted sleep area, and added dedicated electrical circuits at work station and office area. Funding amounts per program year are shown below. The renovation work was completed in 2014. The remaining funds will be reprogrammed.

John Thomas Building - MOA

In 2012, MOA announced a Public Notice for the Change of Use of John Thomas Building. Between 1993 and 1995, CDBG funds of approximately \$987,256 were used to improve the building.

The MOA sold the property in January 2016 through the solicitation of sealed bids (AMC 25.30.080). An acceptable bid was received via the competitive offering, pursuant to AMC section 25.30.090 A. Since the sale results in change of use of the building, a reimbursement to the MOA CDBG program was required. It has been determined that the reimbursement portion to CDBG is 79 percent of the fair market value of the property. The property sold for \$1,400,000. The MOA CDBG program will receive \$1,106,000 which is anticipated to be appropriated in the 2016 AP. Funding will be used for 2016 projects and previous years CDBG program income shortfalls that were predicated upon the sale of the JTB building.

CDBG 2015 Public Services - TBD

Fifteen percent of the annual CDBG allocation may be used for public services. The 2015 Public Services funds are anticipated to be identified in the 2015 AP Substantial Amendment #1 scheduled for MOA Assembly approval in early 2016.

Children at Risk - Alaska Legal Services Corporation (ALSC)

The 2014 Public Services funds to ALSC provided direct legal assistance to 317 homeless and near homeless families with children. This legal assistance was aimed at immediately increasing an at-risk family's safety and stability by keeping or securing housing, obtaining orders of protection and assisting with income maintenance issues such as securing child support and public benefits.

In 2015, this project was funded with CDBG funds in the 2014 AP Substantial Amendment #2. ALSC has provided a cash match to the program of \$1,304.

Emergency Overflow Shelter (Bean's Café) – Catholic Social Services (CSS)

The 2014 Public Services funds to CSS' Brother Francis Shelter (BFS) provided emergency overflow for 422 unduplicated homeless individuals annually. This is a safety net program to provide emergency overflow at Beans Café using BFS staff when the shelter is at capacity and the temperature is 45 degrees or below.

Housing First Program - RurAL CAP

The 2013 and 2014 Public Services funds to the RurAL CAP Housing First Program provided services to approximately 13 chronically homeless people, who suffer from chronic alcoholism, homelessness and mental illness, with case management and supportive services. Supportive services may include substance abuse treatment, locating and maintaining housing, and other reintegration activities.

In 2015, this project was funded with CDBG funds in the 2014 AP Substantial Amendment #2.

Pathways to Recovery - Anchorage Community Mental Health Services (ACMHS)

The 2013 and 2014 Public Services funds to ACMHS through the Pathways to Recovery program provided outreach, engagement, intervention, case management and housing services to homeless persons with chronic alcoholism and other related disabilities. The year's goal is to engage 30 individuals who frequently are served at the Anchorage Safety

Center (ASC) in case management and appropriate referrals for assessments, detox, treatment, housing placement, employment, etc.

In 2015, this project was funded with CDBG funds in the 2014 AP Substantial Amendment #2.

Youth Advocacy and Outreach – Covenant House Alaska (CHA)

The 2013 Public Services funds CHA through Street Outreach Teams to establish a relationship with homeless youths in the street. CHA's Drop-In Center encourages the youth to take advantage of other services. Street Outreach Teams educate security guards and doormen at businesses and attend youth oriented events to make sure vulnerable youth know CHA is available.

CHA also operates a Crisis Center that offers homeless, runaway and at risk youths ages 13 to 24 years of age a safe place to stay and get help. The Center is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and all services are free of charge. No youth who comes to their door is ever turned away. CHA assist youth with safe shelter, food, clothing, counseling, family mediation, medical attention, employment and education assistance, health services, a youth enrichment program, pastoral ministry and housing services. The total youth served with CDBG funds in 2014 and 2015 was 398 homeless youth.

Alaska Youth Advocacy - ACMHS

The 2013 Public Services funds ACMHS through the Alaska Youth Advocates (AYA) to work with youth who have little or no family support, often have quit school, may suffer from abuse or addiction, and have no place to go but the streets. The AYA's POWER Teen Center and Health Clinic in downtown Anchorage, reaches out to youth by offering a caring environment and information that can help them make better decisions in their lives.

AYA estimated they would assist 600 homeless youth through Team Outreach in 2014. No youth were assisted in 2014 due to organizational delays. AYA became an affiliate of ACMHS in late 2014. There were 18 homeless youth assisted in 2015 with intensive case management services, consumer outreach, food, shelter, clothing, medication and education.

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HUD's 2014 HOME allocation was a greater amount than projected in the 2014 AP. Since the 2014 HOME award increased by \$7,007, the HOME administration increased by \$701. This is part of the 2014 AP Substantial Amendment #1 was included in the 2015 AP approved by the MOA Assembly in February 2015.

Affordable Housing Program - Habitat for Humanity Anchorage (HFHA)

HFHA used CDBG funds to purchase two parcels of land (East 4th Avenue/Oklahoma Street) in 2010. Construction on the property continued through 2015, yielding 31 affordable homes: 24 generated from the CDBG funds and 7 developed through non-CDBG sources. There were 8 projects completed with CDBG during 2015.

Under this program, HFHA purchased sites for the construction of affordable housing for low- to moderate-income households. Sites acquired with the assistance of CDBG funds and the construction of new single-family or multi-family housing units will be completed using other funds and volunteer labor. Homebuyers will be required to qualify for a 0 percent interest loan and comply with the policies of HFHA's program. The homebuyers for these units will also receive a minimum of \$1,000 in down payment and closing costs assistance through the HOME program.

Safe Harbor Revitalization Project - RurAL CAP

RurAL CAP is a CHDO who submitted a successful rental housing development application resulting in a contract award for the Safe Harbor Revitalization Project. Funding was provided in the 2012 AP Substantial Amendment #3, the 2013 AP Substantial Amendment #2, the 2014 AP Substantial Amendment #1, and the 2015 AP. It is anticipated to add additional funding in the 2014 AP Substantial Amendment #3, the 2015 AP Substantial Amendment #1, and the 2016 AP. The project is a CHDO Rental Development Project to provide 123 units of permanent and transitional rental housing.

RurAL CAP plans to target the housing needs of the homeless, those who are very low-income (less than 30 percent of the median household income), people with disabilities and other special needs groups.

The revitalization plan includes three primary components:

- 1. SH Merrill 55, at minimum, Permanent Supportive Housing Units: This component will target homeless individuals who are in need of supportive services, including those with disabilities and special needs.
- 2. SH Muldoon 48 Transitional Supportive Housing Units: These units will receive improvements to address deferred maintenance, health and safety, accessibility, and amenity access needs. The targeted population that will be served by this component will be low-income, homeless families and individuals, including those with disabilities.
- 3. **SH Village 20**, at minimum, **Permanent Housing Units:** Conversion of the How-How restaurant on the Muldoon property. The new design will consist of 20 apartments for low-income individuals and families, targeting low-income, formerly homeless individuals and families, including those with disabilities and special needs.

- CSD staff participated in community planning and activities that included CoC membership meetings, Annual Project Homeless Connect and Fair Housing Accessibility Training.
- Directed CSD operational costs and indirect costs as determined by the Intergovernmental Chargeback System (IGC's) based on the MOA's Central Services Cost Allocation Plan in accordance with OMB 2 Circular 200 governing reimbursable federal awards.
- Obligated administration and planning funds to salaries and related costs for general management, oversight and coordination of the ESG program.
- MOA Intergovernmental Charges in the amount of \$6,774 were expensed in 2015 for 2014 and 2015 administrative activities.

• Funds obligated to administration are limited to 7.5 percent of the ESG for the program year.

In the 2014 AP, ESG was projected at the 2013 AP level. Awards were received in August 2014 and 2014 ESG funding increased by \$19,071. The Administration award increased by \$1,431 and was recorded in the 2015 AP. The 2015 ESG award funding was in the amount of \$150,740. Up to 7.5% of a recipient's fiscal year grant can be used for administrative activities. The 2015 ESG Administration allocation was projected at the 2014 level of funding. The difference of \$507 is to be allocated into the 2016 AP once approved by the Municipal Assembly.

All recipients must match with an equal amount of other federal, state or local resources (cash and non-cash) as per the matching requirements at 24CFR576.201.

Homeless Prevention

MOA administers the ESG housing relocation and stabilization services are necessary to prevent the individual or family from moving into an emergency shelter or another place as described in the "homeless" definition in 24 CFR 576.103. This assistance is, generally provided on a "short-term" basis and provided to individuals and families who meet the criteria under the "at risk of homelessness" definition in 24 CFR 576.2.

Applications for assistance are screened for eligibility at the beginning of each month. Individuals and families seeking assistance are also referred to other organizations for coordinated assistance and/or continued services. MOA has developed a standardized intake, assessment and referral system for homeless individuals and families.

In the 2014 AP, ESG was projected at the 2013 AP level. Awards were received in August 2014 and 2014 ESG funding increased by \$19,071. The Homeless Prevention award increased by \$17,640 and was recorded in the 2015 AP. The 2015 ESG Homeless Prevention allocation was projected at the 2014 level of funding. The difference of \$6,246 is to be allocated into the 2016 AP once approved by the Municipal Assembly. To assist the homeless and at risk-of-homelessness individuals and families, CSD has reprogrammed 2015 unspent RRH funds of \$32,202 to Homeless Prevention.

The ESG program provided services to 132 adults with 115 children during 2015.

A cash match of \$35,134 was provided by Chugach Electric Heating Assistance Program to 134 individuals and families in Anchorage needing assistance due to severe financial crises. Anchorage Water and Wastewater Utility (AWWU), Coins Can Count (CCC) Program, provided assistance in the amount of \$6,704 and assisted 31 families who were at risk of

having their water services disconnected. AWWU customers fund the CCC program. The average customer could contribute \$6 per year. DHHS ADRC provided a \$55,607 match. The total cash match contribution to Homeless Prevention was \$97,445.

Through an option year clause pending the receipt of funding and mutual consent of the parties, 2012 ESG subrecipients were awarded 2013 ESG grants. The 2013 ESG subrecipient agreements were issued during 2015 in the amount of \$26,232. There were no 2014 ESG funds dedicated to emergency shelter services, the funding priority was to address the needs of homeless households or at risk of homelessness households to regain permanent housing.

Rapid Re-Housing

Catholic Social Services (CSS) was awarded \$63,084 of 2013 ESG funding to provide Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) services. ESG funds provided housing relocation and stabilization services and short-and / or medium-term rental assistance to help a homeless individual or family move as quickly as possible into permanent housing and achieve stability in housing.

CSS provided 42 households with case management support and direct financial assistance for short-and / or medium-term term rental assistance.

The RRH follows the following guidelines of eligible activities are:

- Standardized screening tool and assessment to determine eligibility.
- Time-limited (3 to 6 months of support).
- Persons with mid-range acuity.
- Scattered apartment sites.
- No Intensive Case Management or Assertive Community Treatment Tactics.

A cash match of \$133,467 was reported by CSS.

The subrecipient has matched the award with an equal amount of other federal, state or local resources (cash and non-cash) as per the matching requirements at 24CFR 576.201.

In 2015, the MOA fostered and maintained decent affordable housing by funding three CDBG projects, the Safe Harbor Inn rental development project is rehabilitating two existing rental development facilities that provide 55 permanent units for individuals who are the chronic homeless and with disabilities, and 48 transitional units for families who are homeless. The MOA funded the MHRP that rehabilitated for health and safety to mobile homes owned by low-income families. Also, the MOA funded the MHR that rehabilitated for health and safety to homes owned by low-income families.

The Children-At-Risk project is operated by ALS to provided suitable living environment with assistance to homeless and near homeless families with children that were critical to preventing homelessness.

The Pathways to Recovery project operated by ACMHS to provided suitable living environment with outreach, engagement, intervention, case management and housing services to homeless persons with chronic alcoholism and other related disabilities.

The Emergency Overflow Shelter at Beans Café operated by CSS provided a suitable living environment for homeless individuals when the Brother Francis Shelter was at capacity and the temperature is 45 degrees or below.

The Housing First project operated by RurAL CAP provided suitable living environment with outreach, case management, tenancy retention and supportive services to chronic homeless persons with disabilities.

MOA funded ESG eligible activities designated to prevent homelessness or the risk of homelessness to individuals and families. ESG provided essential supportive services to homeless individuals and families through rental and utility assistance, rapid re-housing and essential supportive services.

The goal to provide affordable housing with the MRP included in the 2013 AP was 18 households and is not included in the 2015 AP or these tables. Fifteen MRP units were completed in 2015. The one year goals in the 2015 AP included the Safe Harbor project for 100 units to be rehabilitated and 5 units created. It also included the MHRP for rehabilitation of 20 units. The Safe Harbor Revitalization Project has rehabilitated 48 homeless transitional housing units and 55 homeless permanent housing units and is scheduled for completion of additional units in 2017. Anchorage Safety Patrol (ASP) and Anchorage Safety Center (ASC)

The DHHS, PHIP Division manages the contract for the ASP & ASC. ASP van staff takes persons incapacitated by alcohol (in public places) into protective custody and transports them to the ASC located adjacent to the Anchorage Jail Complex. Clients are assessed by an ASP EMT and those with health care issues are taken to hospitals for medical clearance or further assistance.

The Safety Center is always open and staffed (year-round 24 hours per day/7 days per week) to monitor clients during the sobering process. On-site contractor staffing is maintained at 1 staff to-10 client ratio, and includes a State-Certified Emergency Medical Technician.

Anchorage Cold Weather Plan

The Emergency Cold Weather Plan comes into effect when outside temperatures reach 45 degrees or below. The objective of the plan is to safeguard the lives of vulnerable homeless individuals and families by providing overnight shelter during inclement weather conditions

that pose a threat to those living without adequate shelter, especially those at higher risk of death due to exposure. All applicable MOA and State health and safety codes must remain in effect and be adhered to when the Emergency Cold Weather Plan is activated.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Alaska Domestic Violence Sexual Assault Intervention Program

The MOA addresses the issue of domestic violence and homelessness by providing Alaska Domestic Violence Sexual Assault Intervention Program (ADVSAIP) monies to Abused Women's Aid in Crisis (shelter and emergency assistance for domestic violence women victims and their families), Standing Together Against Rape (emergency assistance for sexual assault victims), and Victims for Justice (legal advocacy and emergency assistance for interpersonal violence victims). In July through December 2015 ADVSAIP distributed

\$90, 720 in emergency financial assistance to 144 victims throughout Alaska.

Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program

The MOA recognizes the importance of ending homelessness among households with children, particularly for those households living on the streets or other places not meant for human habitation. This is one of HUD priorities. The MOA has funded CSS and the MOA Homeless Prevention Program to continue using the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing program funded with ESG.

Other strategies to maintain a goal to reduce the number of homeless families with children include:

- Implementation of the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing program using ESG monies, to create a safety net for homeless households with children.
- Over the next year, CSS will receive ESG monies to assist homeless families.
- CSS and the ESG Lead Coordinator with Alaska 2-1-1 will work to ensure families are referred appropriately.

Due to the success of the Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) voucher program, HUD should consider additional investment in special use vouchers for the homeless population.

The following information was provided by Alaska Housing Finance Corporation (AHFC).

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

AHFC is the State of Alaska's only Public Housing Authority. In Anchorage, AHFC owns/manages approximately 700 rental units and administers about 2,300 vouchers. In addition to its traditional voucher program, AHFC also offers the following specialty programs:

- 1. Empowering Choice Housing Program a partnership with the State of Alaska Council on Domestic Violence and the Alaska Network on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault. This direct referral program offers 115 vouchers to families displaced by domestic violence in Anchorage's jurisdiction.
- 2. Moving Home Program a partnership with the State of Alaska Department of Health and Social services. This direct referral program offers 70 vouchers to persons with a disability in the Anchorage jurisdiction;
- 3. Tenant-Based Rental Assistance
 - a. Re-Entry a partnership with the State of Alaska Department of Corrections (DOC). This direct referral program offers 20 coupons to persons under a DOC supervision requirement in the Anchorage jurisdiction.
 - b. Youth a partnership with the State of Alaska Office of Children's Services. This direct referral program offers 10-15 coupons to youth aging out of foster care in the Anchorage jurisdiction.
- 4. Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing a partnership with the Alaska VA Healthcare System. This direct referral program offers 145 vouchers to homeless veterans in the Anchorage jurisdiction.
- 5. Sponsor-Based Rental Assistance this partnership with Rural Alaska Community Action Program, Inc., offers the equivalent of 46 project-based vouchers under a Housing First model at Karluk Manor in Anchorage.

AHFC was admitted to the HUD Moving to Work Demonstration program in 2008. This is AHFC's seventh MTW year and all activities must meet one of the three MTW statutory goals:

- 1. Reduce cost and achieve greater cost effectiveness in federal expenditures;
- 2. Create incentives for families to work, seek work, or prepare for work; and
- 3. Increase housing choices for low income families.

During 2015, AHFC continued its focus on activity 2014-1 Reasonable Rent and Family Self-Sufficiency Initiative which divided AHFC's voucher and public housing families into three distinct categories:

• Classic Program – these are families in which all adult household members are either 62 years of age or older or a person with a disability. These families contribute 28.5

percent of gross monthly income toward rent and receive an examination every three years.

- Set Aside Program these families are participating in direct referral programs (such as those mentioned above). These programs may have time limits or specialized calculation methods.
- Step Program these are families that have a "work-able" adult in the household. These families are on a "stepped" subsidy schedule.
 - o Year 1 families contribute 28.5 percent of gross monthly income toward rent.
 - Year 2 families contribute 40 percent of the payment standard/rent toward rent; AHFC pays 60 percent.
 - Year 3 families contribute 50 percent of the payment standard/rent toward rent; AHFC pays 50 percent.
 - Year 4 families contribute 60 percent of the payment standard/rent toward rent; AHFC pays 40 percent.
 - Year 5 families contribute 70 percent of the payment standard/contract rent toward rent; AHFC pays 30 percent.
 - O Year 6 families are responsible for the full rent of their rent.

As AHFC began its 2014-1 activity in 2014, AHFC developed and implemented a statewide Family Self-Sufficiency Program called Jumpstart. Previously, FSS was limited to larger markets such as Anchorage and Southeast Alaska.

- 1. Jumpstart officially began on November 1, 2015 and is in the process of developing key partnerships with State agencies, services providers, and nonprofits to provide necessary resources to its families on time-limited rental assistance programs.
- 2. A special training session for AHFC staff was conducted in September 2015 to introduce AHFC's new family focus and provide staff with tools for coaching and helping families articulate their needs.

AHFC was pleased to complete the development of two additional affordable housing developments, Susitna Square and Ridgeline Terrace, in 2015. Through its subsidiary Alaska Corporation for Affordable Housing, AHFC formed partnerships and leveraged Neighborhood Stabilization funds and tax credits to assist in the construction of these new developments. In addition, AHFC is providing project-based voucher assistance for 81 of the 88 new units.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

AHFC promotes resident involvement in Public Housing activities through both a Resident Advisory Board (RAB) and Resident Councils.

The purpose of AHFC's RAB is to provide advice and comment to AHFC on proposed operations, the annual Moving to Work Plan, proposed construction activities, and other items of interest to AHFC's public housing and housing choice voucher clients. The RAB is

composed of eleven members from AHFC's Public Housing (PH), Section 8 New Multifamily Housing (S8N), and Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) programs.

AHFC conducted four quarterly meetings with RAB members in 2015. Minutes and comments received during meetings are reported to AHFC's Board of Directors.

AHFC also hosts Resident Councils (RC) at several Public Housing sites. Each RC is formed to encourage resident participation in the management of public housing, as may be found appropriate after consultation with the residents. All residents in each complex that elect to have a RC shall have the opportunities to improve and/or maintain a suitable, safe, and positive living environment through participation in the Council.

AHFC maintains a staff person designated to assist in the formation, development, and educational needs of a RC and offer technical assistance to volunteers. Members are encouraged to conduct regular meetings, discuss resident concerns, and provide feedback to AHFC management on any of a number of issues affecting residents in the apartment communities.

Homeownership:

AHFC currently has 41 homeowners receiving assistance for homeownership under a HAP plan. AHFC suspended applications for this program in 2008, when administrative costs exceeded budget authority. The Board of Directors approved the permanent closure on March 9, 2011. Given the difficult financial times forecasted for future funding, AHFC does not currently plan to re-visit this program in its current form. Staff are investigating alternate methods of encouraging this activity. Further development of this activity will be tied to future leasing rates and available funds.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

AHFC is a statewide Public Housing Authority and is designated a High Performing Agency by HUD.

MOA will ensure that the map responds to the many insights and issues brought up by stakeholders in over 120 consultations conducted in the fall of 2015.

The MOA current target dates for the release of the Public Review Draft are as follows: Late December 2015- Release of Public Review Draft January – February 2016– Public Comment Period Late March 2016– Release Public Hearing Draft May 2016 - Planning and Zoning Commission Public Hearing

The largest barrier to affordable housing is the fact that the population far exceeds the current housing stock in Anchorage. With the limited CDBG and HOME funds, the MOA is not able to make a significant impact. The highest priority goal is to increase the supply of affordable rental housing, especially for the veterans, families, chronic homeless, seniors, and persons with disabilities.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Homeless Individual and Families

The MOA recognizes the importance of ending homelessness among households, particularly for those households living on the streets or other places not meant for human habitation. Other activities that MOA has been involved with in 2015 to work towards the goal to reduce the number of homeless individuals and families include:

- Implement the Anchorage Community Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness
- Implementation of the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing program using ESG funds, to provide a safety net for homeless prevention for individuals and families.
- Anchorage's Emergency Cold Weather Plan coordinates with churches to shelter homeless families.
- MOA participation at the FY2015 Project Homeless Connect event which serves low-income and homeless individuals and families.
- DHHS staff as ACEH Board member

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

On September 15, 2000, 24 CFR Part 35 – Lead Based Paint Poisoning Prevention in Certain Residential Structures became effective. In 2003, the MOA began implementing Part 35 into its affordable-housing programs. During the 2015 program year, the MOA continued to fully incorporate lead-based paint policies and procedures into its remaining CDBG and HOME housing programs.

Under the Minor Repair Program, the MOA made 11 units lead-safe in 2015.

Lead-based paint in Anchorage's housing continues to be a rare occurrence, primarily due to Anchorage's relatively new housing stock. Nevertheless, all CDBG and HOME funded programs dealing with rehabilitation of older homes include funds to address lead-based paint according to Part 35 regulations.

Beginning April 2010, federal law required contractors hired to perform renovation, repair, and paint projects in homes, childcare facilities, and schools built before 1978 that disturb lead-based paint to acquire certification with the Lead Renovation, Repair and Painting Program Final Rule (EPA 40 CFR Part 745) and follow specific work practices to prevent lead contamination. The MOA, its contractors and subrecipients continue to be certified firms with their workers and subcontractors existing as Certified Renovators.

However, looking forward, the Minor Repair Program will conclude at the end of 2016. At this time, the only other housing program that may encounter units built before 1978 is the Mobile Home Repair Program.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The MOA, DHHS, PHIP Division operates and collaborates with partner agencies by administering the following programs:

- CDBG, HOME and ESG grant funded programs
- ADVSAIP
- Emergency Preparedness
- The Anchorage Safety Center and Anchorage Safety Community Patrol
- Anchorage's Cold Weather Plan coordinates with churches to house homeless families overnight
- Human Services Community Matching Grant

The MOA, DHHS, PHIP Division coordinates with the HAND Commission and the HCOSH, various departments within the State of Alaska, the AHFC, the Anchorage Coalition to End Homelessness, (Anchorage Continuum of Care), Anchorage Women's Commission, the Anchorage Senior Citizens Advisory Commission, the Anchorage ADA Commission and other social service agencies.

ADVSAIP

The ADVSAIP has successfully increased the safety of domestic violence and sexual assault victims by holding offenders accountable through a unique partnership between the DHHS, Municipal Prosecutor's Office, Anchorage Police Department, Abused Women's Aid in Crisis (AWAIC), Standing Together Against Rape (STAR) and Victims for Justice (VFJ).

Anchorage Safety Patrol (ASP) and Anchorage Safety Center (ASC)

The PHIP Division manages the contract for the ASP & ASC. ASP van staff takes persons incapacitated by alcohol (in public places) into protective custody and transports them to the ASC located adjacent to the Anchorage Jail Complex. Clients are assessed using basic physiological parameters, and those requiring more health care are taken to hospitals for medical clearance or further assistance.

Anchorage Cold Weather Plan

The Anchorage Emergency Cold Weather Plan comes into effect when outside temperatures reach 45 degrees or below. The objective of the plan is to safeguard the lives of vulnerable homeless families by providing overnight shelter during inclement weather conditions that pose a threat to those living without adequate shelter, especially those at higher risk of death due to exposure. All applicable MOA and State health and safety codes must remain in effect and be adhered to when the Anchorage Cold Weather Plan is activated.

Human Services Community Matching Grant

In FY2015, the MOA received \$856,587 from the State's Department of Health and Social Services to fund agencies serving the homeless and poverty-level persons and families living in the Municipality of Anchorage. The funds were competitively awarded to the Food Bank, Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center, Clare House, Brother Francis Shelter, Beans Café, STAR, AWAIC, Children's Lunchbox, Alzheimer's, ALSC and Cook Inlet Tribal Council.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The MOA received a final copy of an Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI Report) dated February 2015 which identifies and provides recommendations to address impediments in the 2015 Action Plan.

AI Report: #1: The lack of knowledge of the classes of people protected by fair housing laws

The MOA was one of the sponsors of the Fair Housing Accessibility Training held in Anchorage on April 29, 2015. The training was also sponsored by and held at Alaska Housing Finance Corporation.

AI Report: #2: Low awareness of available fair housing enforcement mechanisms, caused at least in part by the lack of fair housing advocacy organizations.

In October 2014, ALSC won a competitive HUD grant to establish a Fair Housing Program that will allow ALSC to carry out testing and enforcement activities to prevent or eliminate discriminatory housing practices. The ALSC is a private non-profit law firm providing

statewide free civil legal assistance to low-income residents. ALSC fair housing program will work to eliminate illegal housing discrimination and promotes equal access to housing by providing education, outreach, technical assistance, and enforcement opportunities specifically related to federal, state, and local fair housing laws.

Monitor Standards and Procedures

Description of the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements.

The majority of programs funded through CDBG, HOME and ESG are administered by outside agencies. In order to ensure program compliance, the MOA utilizes programmatic policies and procedures, subrecipient agreements, and on-going monitoring activities. The MOA monitored CDBG and HOME subrecipients using the following methods:

- Quarterly reports
- Desk reviews
- Copies of the General Ledger expenses for documentation
- Davis Bacon compliance reviews
- CHDO certification/recertification
- Review of Audited Financial Statements, federal, State and Single Audits
- Site inspections

MOA conducts a desk monitoring on a regular basis of all subrecipient agreements. In addition, as projects were underway, staff conducted environmental review initial and follow-up inspections. Also, while undertaking Davis-Bacon on-site interviews, staff monitored and documented progress on the projects, photographing various stages of their construction.

During desk audits, the monitoring team concentrated on rent calculations, tenant income verification, lease provisions, the waitlist, affirmative marketing plans, LEP/ Section 504 policies, application materials, and the general ledger. The monitoring team monitored for compliance with federal program provisions and regulations including, but not limited to, 24 CFR 570, 24 CFR 92, 24 CFR 84, 24 CFR 58 and 2 CFR 200.

During 2015, the MOA conducted on-site and desk monitoring reviews of 400 North Lane Street, 100 Davis Street, Karluk Manor and Safe Harbor Revitalization Project. All monitoring reports are closed except for the Safe Harbor Revitalization Project which is in the process of closing.

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Description of the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The MOA sent out a notice and requests for information and accomplishments to an extensive e-mail list that included the general public, MOA departments, non-profit agencies, for profit agencies, community councils, and the news media. A display ad was placed in the Anchorage Dispatch news paper on February 29, 2016 to advertise the

availability of the Draft CAPER, dates for the comment period, and notice of a Public Hearing on March 4, 2016. The MOA gave a presentation on the 2015 Draft CAPER at the March 4^{th} Public Hearing and there were no public comments. No comments were received on the 2015 CAPER.

The property at 400 North Lane had 2 instances of non-compliance in 2 units. There was no GFCI outlet in the kitchen, lack of operable smoke detector in a bedroom, missing bulb and cover in the kitchen overhead light, and the overhead light in a bathroom was inoperable. The issues were all corrected.

The properties at 100 Davis Street and Karluk Manor had no issues.

The Safe Harbor Revitalization Project had issues with procurement, Davis Bacon, and relocation. Safe Harbor Revitalization Project had compliance findings with Davis Bacon labor standards, procurement standards and Uniform Relocation Act regulations. These have been resolved except for Uniform Relocation.

In an effort to preserve the affordability of rental housing, the MOA has programmed HOME and CDBG funding in the 2014 and 2015 APs and is planning to add additional HOME funding in the 2016 AP. With the 2016 AP the total of HOME funding will be \$2,448,715 and \$1,991,334 of CDBG funding for a total \$4,440,049 for the CHDO Rental Development - Safe Harbor Revitalization Project. It is anticipated to program \$202,934 of the 2016 HOME funding for another CHDO rental development project for homeless veterans and families.

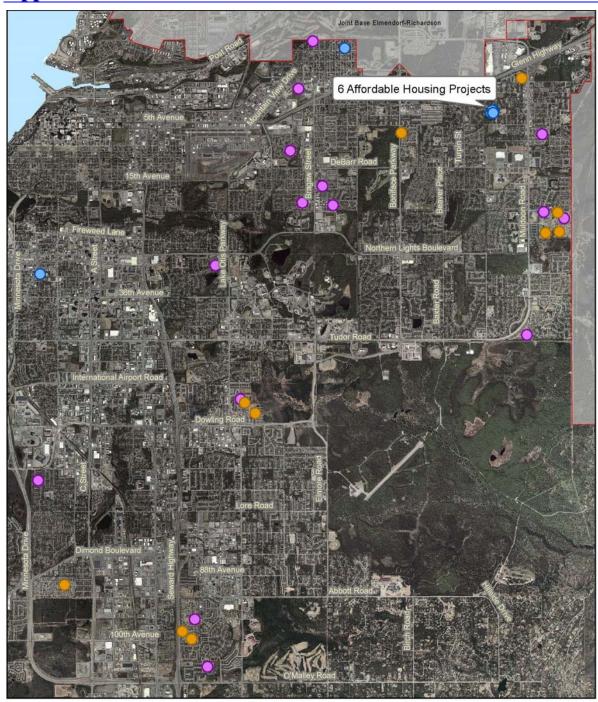
