

5. Non-Homeless Special Needs Housing

5.1 Non-homeless Special Needs (91.220 (c) and (e))

Question 1: Describe the priorities and specific objectives the jurisdiction hopes to achieve for the period covered by the Action Plan.

In the *Consolidated Plan*, Table 6-23 identifies seven special needs populations, all of which are a “high” priority. This table is reproduced below:
