PROPOSITION 7

ANCHORAGE FIRE SERVICE AREA FIRE PROTECTION BONDS

For the purpose of providing fire protection capital improvements in the Anchorage Fire Service Area, shall Anchorage borrow money and issue up to \$3,075,000 in principal amount of general obligation bonds and increase the municipal tax cap by an annual amount not to exceed \$2,249,100 to pay the associated annual operations and maintenance costs?

Voter approval of this bond proposition authorizes for each \$100,000 of assessed taxable property value (based on the estimated 2007 assessed valuation in the Anchorage Fire Service Area): (i) an annual increase in taxes of approximately \$0.92 to retire the proposed bonds, and (ii) an annual increase in the Municipal Tax Cap (Charter 14.03(b)(2)) of approximately \$8.19 to pay for annual operations and maintenance costs related to the proposed capital improvements.

APPROVING A LONG-TERM, NON-EXCLUSIVE LEASE OF THE WILLIAM C. CHAMBERLIN EQUESTRIAN CENTER IN RUTH ARCAND PARK TRACT D, WITH THE RAINBOW CONNECTION THERAPEUTIC HORSEBACK RIDING PROGRAM AND ANCHORAGE HORSE COUNCIL, TWO NON-PROFIT CORPORATIONS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF OPERATING, UPGRADING AND MAINTAINING PUBLIC EQUESTRIAN FACILITIES AND PROVIDING THERAPEUTIC HORSEBACKRIDING FACILITIES AND PROGRAMS FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Shall the Municipality of Anchorage enter into a long-term, non-exclusive lease of the William Clark Chamberlin Equestrian Center in Ruth Arcand Park, Tract D, with Rainbow Connection Therapeutic Horseback Riding Program and Anchorage Horse Council, two non-profit organizations, for the purpose of operating, upgrading and maintaining public equestrian facilities and providing therapeutic horseback riding facilities and programs for people with disabilities upon approval by a majority of the voters at no cost to the taxpayers?

Property affected by this proposition is located in Ruth Arcand Park, described more specifically as the Section Sixteen Equestrian Center, also known as William Clark Chamberlin Equestrian Center, Tract D, Section Sixteen Subdivision, according to Plat 86-124, Anchorage Recording District, Third Judicial District at Anchorage, Alaska.

The taxpayers of the Municipality of Anchorage do not incur an increase in property taxes as a result of this lease, and any operations, upgrades and improvements constructed during the lease by Rainbow Connection and Anchorage Horse Council shall belong to the Municipality of Anchorage at the end of the lease. PROPOSITION 9

A DISPOSAL BY EXCHANGE FOR FAIR MARKET VALUE OF ONE ACRE MORE OR LESS OF DEDICATED MUNICIPAL PARK LAND IN JACOBSON PARK, LOCATED IN THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF TRACT A-1, COLLEGE VILLAGE #9 SUBDIVISION, FOR LOT 14, BLOCK 14, COLLEGE VILLAGE #9 SUBDIVISION

Shall the Municipality of Anchorage dispose of approximately one acre of dedicated municipal park land from the southwest corner of Tract A-1, Jacobson Park, located on 36th Avenue, for a one-half acre residential lot known as Lot 14, Block 14? When transferred, Lot 14 will be dedicated as park land, added to Jacobson Park, and preserved in perpetuity. The land exchange shall be based upon fair market values estimated by appraisal.

The Alaska Jewish Historical Museum and Community Center proposes to use the one-acre parcel of park land for public parking and access to Jacobson Park, and for private parking for new facilities. The exchange of the two (2) parcels is conditioned upon all required public approvals for the new facility being obtained from all federal, state and local agencies including, without limitation, a wet lands analysis with consideration of drainage and water levels in Otis Lake and the adjacent neighborhood as required for a permit from the Corps of Engineers, a Traffic Impact Analysis including consideration of pedestrian access to and from David Green Park; a Site Plan review by Planning and Zoning including a parking analysis; and Building permit review and issuance of all required building permits. Upon completion of the land exchange, the Alaska Jewish Historical Museum and Community Center agrees to donate \$100,000 to the Municipality for park and trail improvements in Jacobson Park. There is no cost to the taxpayers and no decrease in property values result from this exchange. (AO 2007-32 as amended)

PROPOSITION 10

CHARTER AMENDMENT TO SYNCHRONIZE APPORTIONMENT UNDER THE CHARTER WITH CURRENT STATE LAW AND ADOPTION OF FINAL STATE REDISTRICTING PLAN

Shall Anchorage Municipal Charter Section 4.01 be amended to synchronize apportionment under the Charter with current state law as follows: (Underlined words are added. [Bracketed words are deleted]. Plain text is unchanged).

Section 4.01. Power, composition and apportionment.

The legislative power of Anchorage is vested in an assembly of 11 members. Election districts, if established, shall be formed of compact and contiguous territory containing as nearly as practicable a relatively integrated socioeconomic area. The assembly shall be reapportioned whenever it becomes malapportioned. The assembly shall determine and declare by resolution whether or not it is malapportioned within two months [30 days] from:

(1) Adoption of a final state redistricting plan under art. VI, sec. 10, Constitution of the State of Alaska [receipt of the final report of each federal decennial census, including any supplementary data necessary to establish population distribution within the municipality];

If the assembly determines it is malapportioned, it shall, within six [five] months of the determination, reapportion itself in the manner provided by law.

Pursuant to Anchorage Ordinance No. 2006-154, amendment of Charter Section 4.01, to synchronize apportionment under the Charter with current state law and adoption of a final state redistricting plan, shall be incorporated into the Home Rule Charter only if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in the Municipality of Anchorage voting on the question in this election. Property affected by this proposition is located in Ruth Arcand Park, described more specifically as the Section Sbtteen Equestrian Center, also known as William Clark Chamberlin Equestrian Center, Tract D, Section Sbtteen Subdivision, according to Plat 86-124, Anchorage Recording District, Third Judicial District at Anchorage, Alaska.

Shall the Municipality of Anchorage dispose of approximately one acre of dedicated municipal park land from the southwest corner of Tract A-1, Jacobson Park, located on 36th Avenue, for a one-half acre residential lot known as Lot 14, Block 14? When transferred, Lot 14 will be dedicated as park land, added to Jacobson Park, and preserved in perpetuity. The land exchange shall be based upon fair market values estimated by appraisal.

The Alaska Jewish Historical Museum and Community Center proposes to use the one-acre parcel of park land for public parking and access to Jacobson Park, and for private parking for new facilities. The exchange of the two (2) parcels is conditioned upon all required public approvals for the new facility being obtained from all federal, state and local agencies including, without limitation, a wet lands analysis with consideration of drainage and water levels in Otis Lake and the adjacent neighborhood as required for a permit from the Corps of Engineers; a Traffic Impact Analysis including consideration of pedestrian access to and from David Green Park; a Site Plan review by Planning and Zoning including a parking analysis; and Building permit review and issuance of all required building permits. Upon completion of the land exchange, the Alaska Jewish Historical Museum and Community Center agrees to donate \$100,000 to the Municipality for park and trail improvements in Jacobson Park.

There is no cost to the taxpayers and no decrease in property values result from this exchange. (AO 2007-32 as amended)

Shall Anchorage Municipal Charter Section 4.01 be amended to synchronize apportionment under the Charter with current state law as follows: (Underlined words are added. [Bracketed words are deleted]. Plain text is unchanged.)

Section 4.01. Power, composition and apportionment.

The legislative power of Anchorage is vested in an assembly of 11 members. Election districts, if established, shall be formed of compact and contiguous territory containing as nearly as practicable a relatively integrated socioeconomic area. The assembly shall be reapportioned whenever it becomes malapportioned. The assembly shall determine and declare by resolution whether or not it is malapportioned within two months [30 days] from:

(1) Adoption of a final state redistricting plan under art. VI, sec. 10, Constitution of the State of Alaska [receipt of the final report of each federal decennial census, including any supplementary data necessary to establish population distribution within the municipality];

If the assembly determines it is malapportioned, it shall, within six [five] months of the determination, reapportion itself in the manner provided by law.

Pursuant to Anchorage Ordinance No. 2006-154, amendment of Charter Section 4.01, to synchronize apportionment under the Charter with current state law and adoption of a final state redistricting plan, shall be incorporated into the Home Rule Charter only if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in the Municipality of Anchorage voting on the question in this election. (1) Adoption of a final state redistricting plan under art. VI, sec. 10, Constitution of the State of Alaska [receipt of the final report of each federal decennial census, including any supplementary data necessary to establish population distribution within the municipality];

If the assembly determines it is malapportioned, it shall, within six [five] months of the determination, reapportion itself in the manner provided by law.

Pursuant to Anchorage Ordinance No. 2006-154, amendment of Charter Section 4.01, to synchronize apportionment under the Charter with current state law and adoption of a final state redistricting plan, shall be incorporated into the Home Rule Charter only if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in the Municipality of Anchorage voting on the question in this election. 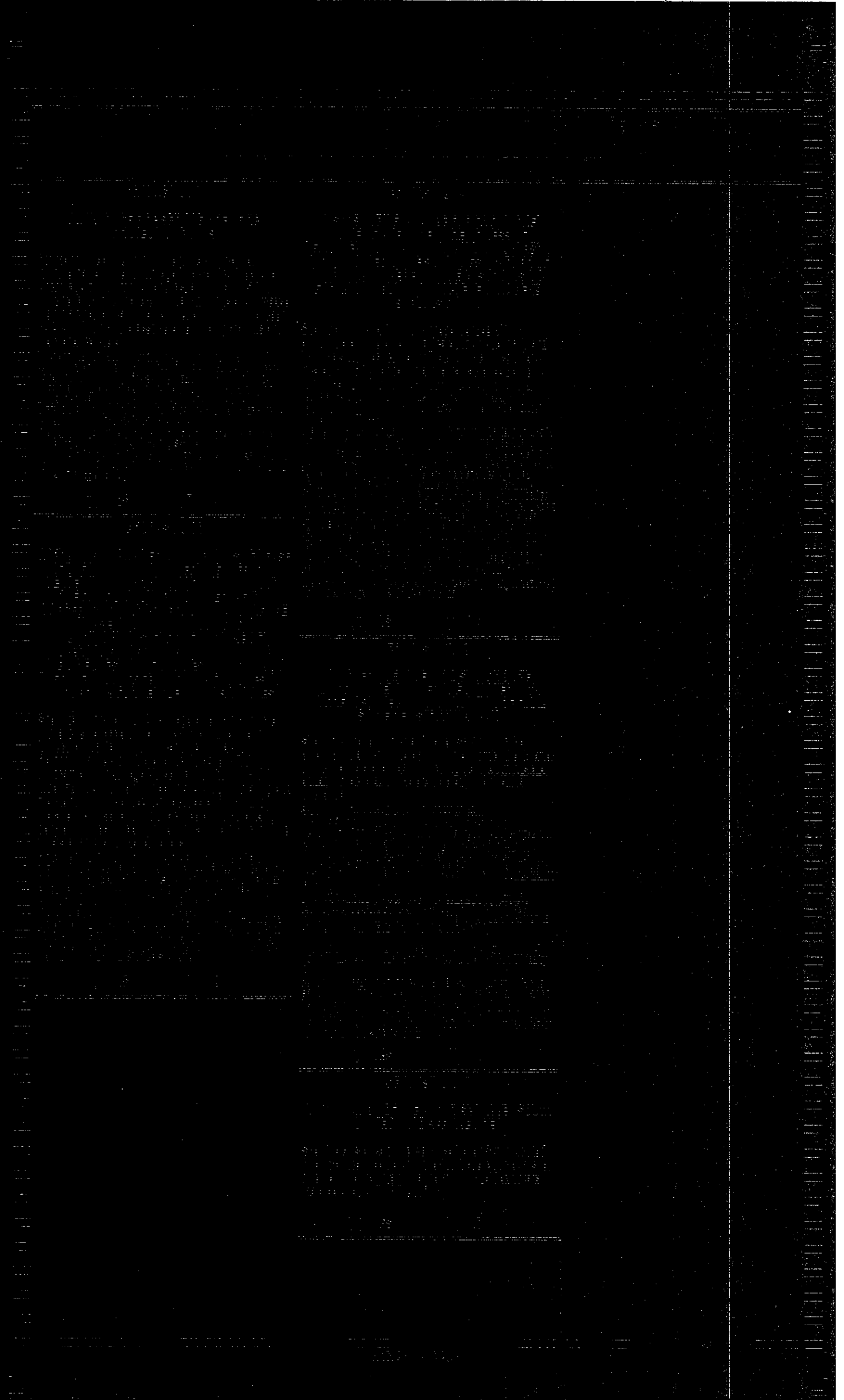

The exchange of the two (2) parcels is conditioned upon all required public approvals for the new facility being obtained from all federal, state and local agencies including, without limitation, a wet lands analysis with consideration of drainage and water levels in Otis Lake and the adjacent neighborhood as required for a permit from the Corps of Engineers; a Traffic Impact Analysis including consideration of pedestrian access to and from David Green Park; a Site Plan review by Planning and Zoning including a parking analysis; and Building permit review and issuance of all required building permits. (1) Adoption of a final state redistricting plan under art. VI, sec. 10, Constitution of the State of Alaska [receipt of the final report of each federal decennial census, including any supplementary data necessary to establish population distribution within the municipality];

If the assembly determines it is malapportioned, it shall, within six [five] months of the determination, reapportion itself in the manner provided by law.

Pursuant to Anchorage Ordinance No. 2006-154, amendment of Charter Section 4.01, to synchronize apportionment under the Charter with current state law and adoption of a final state redistricting plan, shall be incorporated into the Home Rule Charter only if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in the Municipality of Anchorage voting on the question in this election.
