ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AO No. 2015-10(S)

AN ORDINANCE SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFED VOTERS OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF ANCHORAGE A BALLOT PROPOSITION AMENDING THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CHARTER TO ADOPT AN ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SALES TAX, TO DEDICATE THE REVENUE TO HEALTH AND PUBLIC SAFETY USES RELATED TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, TO ALLOW USE OF THE REVENUE TO FINANCE BONDS FOR PROJECTS RELATED TO ALCOHOL TREATMENT, AND TO PROVIDE FOR APPROVAL BY A MAJORITY (FIFTY PERCENT PLUS ONE) OF QUALIFIED VOTERS VOTING ON THE QUESTION.

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Pursuant to state law, a ballot proposition in substantially the following form and substance shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the Municipality at the next regular Municipal election to be held April 7, 2015:

PROPOSITION NO. _____

Shall the Anchorage Municipal Charter be amended by adding the following new section to Article XIV:

Section 14.06 Alcoholic beverage sales tax.

(a) There is hereby levied a tax on all retail sales of alcohol in an amount equal to ____ percent (___%) of the sales price paid. Revenues received from this tax are dedicated to financing alcohol treatment, emergency transportation, and housing programs, including housing programs for chronic inebriates [health and public safety programs related to alcoholic beverages].

(b) If bonds are issued to finance the acquisition or construction of alcohol treatment <u>or housing</u> facilities, the revenue derived from this tax shall first be used to pay annual principal, interest and other carrying costs of said bonds, until such bonds are paid in full.

(c) The Assembly shall enact such additional provisions, not inconsistent with this section, as necessary or desirable to implement this section.

And amending Anchorage Municipal Charter, Article II (4), and Charter §14.01(b) as follows:

QUALIFED VOTERS OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF ANCHORAGE A BALLOT PROPOSITION AMENDING THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CHARTER TO ADOPT AN ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SALES TAX, TO DEDICATE THE REVENUE TO HEALTH AND PUBLIC SAFETY USES RELATED TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, TO ALLOW USE OF THE REVENUE TO FINANCE BONDS FOR PROJECTS RELATED TO ALCOHOL TREATMENT, AND TO PROVIDE FOR APPROVAL BY A MAJORITY (FIFTY PERCENT PLUS ONE) OF QUALIFIED VOTERS

VOTING ON THE QUESTION.

Anchorage will not be America's #1 community in which to Live Work and Play until it solves its chronic alcohol inebriate problem.

Anchorage has tried to solve this problem for many years. The problem is well understood. Study after study, report after report, offer the same remedies: housing facilities, services and treatment. The plan put forth in this ordinance comes from these many studies – particularly from the recommendations of Mayor Sullivan's Homeless Leadership Team, an effort facilitated by Darrel Hess, then the MOA's Homeless Coordinator.

Anchorage has about 200 chronic alcohol inebriates, often described as "frequent flyers," who are a severe drain on the city's public safety and health services. A recent "before/after" study show a two-thirds reduction in service calls per inebriate housed at Karluk Manor (Housing First model). There are additional savings where inebriates have reclaimed their lives and become productive members of the community (Detox and Sober Housing/Clitheroe models). With this plan, Anchorage taxpayers would regain the services of APD, AFD/EMT, Health Department and other city departments that are now devoting an inordinate amount of staff time and valuable taxpayer funded resources to dealing with inebriates.

The difference between prior efforts and this ordinance's plan is that this ordinance supplies the single critical ingredient missing until now: a continuous funding source.

This plan is targeted and restricted in its use of funds. The cost of the program described below would be \$5.3 to \$7.3 million per year. Covering this cost will require either a 3% sales tax on all retail alcohol sales or a 5.5% sales tax on retail alcohol sales at just package stores.

Funds from a sales tax on alcohol would be used only for the following:

Housing: Funds would finance, via revenue bonds, the building or repurposing of new or existing facilities. Specifically this plan calls for:

- 1) 80 Housing First units whose purpose, like that of Karluk Manor and Safe Harbor, is to provide a safe place to house inebriates, thereby getting them off the streets. (Est. \$10,100,000 new construction cost.)
- 2) The addition of 12 short-stay Detox beds to the 14 Anchorage currently has. Fairbanks, by comparison, has 24 such beds serving a much smaller population. (Est. \$4,400,000 new construction cost.)
- 3) 96 units of extended-stay Sober Housing (replacing 42 bed Clitheroe) to which detoxed clients can be sent. (Est. \$48,100,000 new construction cost.)

Housing facility operation, housing services and treatment: Funds would be used to augment existing and anticipated State, Federal and contributed dollars to provide staff to operate the facilities and provide qualified treatment. Depending upon the type of facility, the type of staffing ranges from facility managers (Housing First) to shifts of Registered Nurses (Detox) to a non-resident supervising doctor (Detox) to case workers (Detox and Sober Housing). (Est. \$800,000 to \$2,800,000; the lower amount dependent upon an expansion of Medicaid coverage.)

Regarding Funds from the State's Alcohol Tax: The State of Alaska is not remitting to Anchorage alcohol tax revenues that many believe it owes or promised. Given the State's fiscal situation and given the State Constitution's prohibition of dedicated funds, it is unlikely that State alcohol tax revenues will come to Anchorage dedicated to solving the city's chronic alcohol inebriate problem. That said, by committing to this plan, Anchorage will communicate to the Legislature the seriousness of this issue, an issue whose roots are statewide.
