MUNICIPAL BUDGET 101

The Municipality of Anchorage **operating budget** provides for local services like fire, police, parks, libraries, roads, building permits and health, as well as utilities and enterprises like the Port of Alaska, Merrill Field Airport, AWWU and Solid Waste Services. The Municipality's **capital improvement budget** and **capital improvement plan** consist of capital projects for the upcoming fiscal year, and for the next six fiscal years, and identify funding sources such as future bond propositions and state and federal funding requests.

The municipal budget is a reflection of the values, vision and priorities of our community, so it's important for community members to be involved.

Why care about the budget?

The approval of the municipal budget affects everyone – **from the number of books on the shelves at libraries, playgrounds in our parks, and immunizations provided at health clinics, to the quality of the roads we drive on and the response times of emergency services**, there are few things we interface with in our daily lives that aren't impacted by the municipal budget.

When community members provide input on the budget, it helps the Mayor and Assembly shape the budget to meet the current needs of our community.

How can I learn more about the budget?

The best way to learn how the budget affects the things you care about is to get involved with your community council and organizations that represent your hobbies and interests. Many organizations have staff and volunteers who know the MOA budget inside and out and share information with their members on relevant budget items.

When is the budget decided?

Every fall, OMB submits the Mayor's budget to the Assembly, around the first of October (the legal requirement is 90-days before the end of the year). After that, the Assembly holds two worksessions in October for budget presentations from municipal departments, utilities and enterprises, and one worksession in November to discuss possible budget amendments. Public hearings on the budget are held in October and November and then the budget is amended and approved by the Assembly, typically at their last meeting in November.

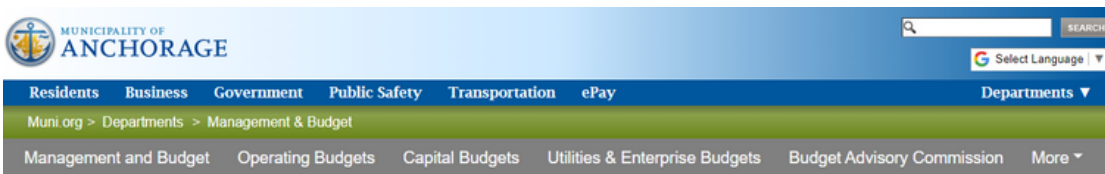
FYI

Since the current year budget is based on projections from the previous fall, a 1st Quarter Budget Revision is conducted each April to make budget adjustments if needed once the prior year's *actual* revenue and expenses are known.

How can I give input on the budget?

There are several opportunities to provide input. During the summer, before the budget is submitted to the Assembly in early October, you can provide input to the Mayor at mayor@anchorageak.gov. Once the budget is before the Assembly, you can testify for up to 3-minutes during the budget public hearings at Assembly meetings and you can also submit written testimony at any time. Visit ancgov.info/participate to learn more. The public is welcome to attend Assembly worksessions, but will not have an opportunity to speak.

* Search the menu bar **for past budgets** and more **information**

Budgets and information **for the current year** will be added here as it becomes available

* The **Revised Budget** is the most recent budget and includes a summary of funding for each department, as well as the history of any amendments that have been made

* In the **Approved Budget**, look at the **Overview** section to find pie charts of revenues and expenses. You can also find organizational charts and budgets **for each department** (Note: these can be out of date if there have been subsequent budget amendments)

* The **Capital Improvement Budget** has the anticipated capital projects and requests for bonds, state & federal funds for the year; the **Capital Improvement Plan** is the six-year outlook (including the upcoming year) of what projects the municipality plans to begin and to seek funding for in the future
