AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY Subject: AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 8.05 AND SECTIONS 8.45.015 AND 15.20.020 TO PROHIBIT CAMPING ON **PUBLIC PREMISES BY** PROVIDING CRIMINAL **PENALTIES** AND **ENFORCEMENT PROTOCOLS** CONSISTENT WITH CITY OF GRANTS PASS V. JOHNSON AND OTHER LAW; AND SUBMITTING A BALLOT PROPOSITION TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF ANCHORAGE AT A REGULAR ELECTION THE QUESTION OF WHETHER TO APPROVE AN AREAWIDE SPECIAL TAX LEVY DEDICATED TO PAYMENT OF THE COSTS OF ADDRESSING PROHIBITED CAMPSITES AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND CARE OF DISPLACED HOMELESS PERSONS.

This Substitute version of the ordinance is proposed in order to provide a funding source for what is foreseeably going to be a very costly effect of enacting the criminal camping penal code provisions offered in the original ordinance. There are easily hundreds of unsheltered individuals in the Municipality of Anchorage at any given time, many whom are living in prohibited campsites. The criminal camping offense would become enforceable, if passed, in this environment allowing potentially hundreds of criminal charges to be brought, prosecuted and convicted defendants incarcerated, all for which the Municipality must pay.

This request is for an annual levy of a special tax areawide in the Municipality only sufficient to collect not to exceed \$15,000,000, which could support a substantial amount of annual prohibited campsite abatement actions and misdemeanor criminal prosecutions. Only with new funding can the Municipality support criminalizing camping effectively, without sacrificing current funding levels for municipal services and programs. This model was successful in the past to pay for new APD information technology, including body-worn cameras, to fund new emergency medical equipment and systems for AFD, and when the Maintenance & Operations Department needed new snow removal and hauling fleet vehicles and equipment. Additional funds, should they exist, will be used for funding of key supports including housing, treatment, case management, and other core services.

The (S) version adds a new Section 5 for the ballot proposition to authorize a special tax levy, and changes to Section 7 with effective dates make the Code amendments in

Sections 1 through 4 effective only upon passage of the ballot proposition when election
