AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 3.30.141, RECOGNIZED HOLIDAYS WITH PAY, TO INCLUDE MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. DAY AS A PAID MUNICIPAL HOLIDAY

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

Section 1: That Anchorage Municipal Code Section 3.30.141, Recognized holidays with pay, is amended to read as follows:

3.30.141 Recognized holidays with pay.

The following days will be recognized as holidays with pay for all employees in regular full-time and regular part-time positions.

- New Year's Day.
Martin Luther King Jr. Day (third Monday in January).
Washington's Birthday (third Monday in February).
Seward's Day (last Monday in March).
Memorial Day (last Monday in May).
Independence Day.
Labor Day.
Veterans Day (November 11).
Thanksgiving Day.
The day after Thanksgiving.
Christmas Day.
One personal holiday.

Section 2: That this ordinance is effective immediately upon passage and approval

6 April 4, 1968 sparked an historical moment throughout the United States and the World,
7 one which would and could never be forgotten. A man who spent most of his life
8 attempting to "build bridges" with people of diversity in an effort to achieve and maintain
9 civil rights for all of us was gunned down while doing what he knew best. This man, was
10 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a man who had a dream, and because of his efforts we are
11 closer than ever before to his dream being fulfilled. His dream embraced the
12 transformation of injustice and oppression to freedom and justice, and that "one day little
13 black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls as
14 sisters and brothers." During his marches and freedom rallies for peace and equality,
15 although the most visibly oppressed seemed to be in the forefront, his dream was for
16 justice and equality for all peoples in "every valley...hill..and mountain." It is for that reason
17 Congress voted to celebrate his life, and passed a bill on November 2, 1983, with the first
18 national celebration taking place on January 20, 1986.

20 During deliberations related to the decision to make Dr. King's birthday an official holiday,
21 many were hesitant because of the anticipated costs of the holiday, extra overtime paid to
22 Federal workers who had to work on the holiday, as well as millions to those Federal
23 workers who were paid for the day. Senator Bob Dole responded to those critics by stating
24 "I suggest they hurry back to their pocket calculators and estimate the cost of 300 years
25 of slavery, followed by a Century or more of economic, political, and social exclusion and
26 discrimination."

28 As we deliberate the decision to declare this day a Municipal holiday in Anchorage, it is
29 inevitable that discussion on the costs in excess of the cost of productivity will be on the
30 table. During our discussions, let us consider the significance of Dr. King's message and
31 what it meant to our Country, the World, and our City and State and then determine which
32 would be the greatest loss to this community - monetary or humanitarian.

34 The time is long overdue for the Municipality of Anchorage, the largest city in the State of
35 Alaska, to pay tribute to the man who had the courage to use inspiration, peaceful
36 resistance, oratory and great writings to create an America where people of all colors,
37 races, creeds, and national origin could work, live, and play together in peace. I believe
38 that the United States of America is a better country for enacting Dr. Martin Luther King,
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Jr. Day. Anchorage, with its recent emphasis on "bridge building," will also become a better place by demonstrating respect and support for making the birth of the father of bridge building a Municipal Holiday.

Within the State of Alaska, each year on the third Monday of January, schools, Federal offices, post offices, banks, state workers, and local municipalities (Barrow, Cordova, Fairbanks, Juneau, Kodiak, Skagway, Nome, Mountain Village, Unalaska, and Valdez) close their doors to celebrate the birth of a man who made a difference. It is long overdue for the Municipality of Anchorage to maintain the spirit and remember the injustices that Dr. King fought so hard for all of us.

As we enter the New Millennium, it is befitting that we, as a community, take the time to recall his protests for freedom, equality, and dignity for people of all races. Let us join the many other cities throughout the country and Alaska (see attached sampling) in the celebration of the birth of a man who made a difference, by acknowledging, through this amendment of the Anchorage Municipal Code, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day as a recognized Municipal Holiday.

The estimated direct costs involved if this ordinance is approved, using 1993 estimates, would be \$373,000 in overtime and benefit costs for those employees required to work on holidays such as Police and Fire. The cost of productivity (noncash) would be estimated at \$599,000 (see attached spreadsheet).

If the attached ordinance is approved, the Municipality would be closed for business on an additional day during the year. Employees would not work on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, other than those essential employees.

As mentioned above, the estimated direct costs would be \$373,000 to compensate those employees who are required to work on holidays. In addition, the cost of productivity would be estimated at \$599,000.
