The Anchorage Fire Department shall charge the following fees for each inspection or re-inspection as required for licensing, permitting, or life safety by the municipality, state government, or federal government when such inspection or re-inspection occurs:

During normal business hours as set and announced by the fire chief or his or her designee: \$50.00 per hour with a one-hour minimum charge.

- 2. Outside normal business hours (except Sundays and municipal holidays) as set and announced by the fire chief or his or her designee, if so requested by the licensee or prospective licensee: \$86.00 per hour with a two-hour minimum charge.
- 3. On Sundays and municipal holidays, if so requested by the licensee or prospective licensee: \$129.00 per hour with a two-hour minimum charge.

The fees described in this section are in addition to those charged upon an application to the municipal clerk under section 10.10.015. The fees described in this section do not apply to inspections conducted under the authority of section 10.10.050.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall become effective January, 2000

Department

INTRODUCTION

This ordinance would institute a new fee and raise an existing fee for services provided by the Anchorage Fire Department and Anchorage Police Department. The proposed fees more accurately reflect the cost of providing services. These changes in fees are intended as "user fees" that will avoid the need to either increase taxes or reduce services.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS

Section 1 This section would raise the charge for the *third or subsequent* false burglary alarm in a six-month period from \$35 to \$100. On such a third or subsequent false alarm, the change in language in this section also allows APD to apply this charge to situations in which the police response is cancelled between the time the officer is dispatched and the time the officer arrives.

Section 2

This section would put in the Code the fees to be charged by the Fire Department for inspections required for licensing, permitting, or life safety. The fee would be \$50 per hour for inspections during normal business hours. Prospective licensees frequently request that AFD conduct inspections outside normal business hours. If inspections are conducted pursuant to such requests, the fees would be \$86 per hour for inspections outside business hours and \$129 per hour for inspections on Sundays or municipal holidays. The Fire Department now charges these fees only in limited circumstances.

Anchorage Police Department

False alarms are caused by installation of inappropriate systems, improper installation of otherwise appropriate systems, poor system maintenance, and careless operation of alarm systems. The reasons a city charges a fee for false alarms are to discourage preventable false alarms (and the resulting unnecessary police responses), and to recoup the costs associated with those responses.

JUSTIFICATION

The false alarm fee in Anchorage has remained unchanged since 1980. The labor costs associated with handling each call have gone up. The number of false alarm calls has increased at a rate greater than increases in population and number of officers. False alarms have doubled since 1990. Thus it is clear that the current fee no longer deters false alarms and no longer covers costs.

In 1996 the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), under contract by the Municipal Assembly to study the APD, recommended that the alarm fees be raised. According to the IACP, there are cities that charge considerably more than the \$100 proposed here for a false alarm. Some cities have stopped responding to alarm calls altogether. The industry will support this rate increase. The higher rate may scare off a small amount of business, but fewer false alarm calls saves the alarm companies money on the other end. To the alarm companies, this ordinance revision appears to be a wash.

Anchorage Fire Department

Budget cuts necessitated by the reduction in State revenue-sharing forced the Fire Department to review all programs. Current services could not be provided given the reduction in revenues from the State. Options considered were:

Cutting services;

- 2 Increasing taxes to the level needed to maintain services; and
- 3. Generating offsetting revenues to compensate for the loss of State revenuesharing funds.

The generation of revenue was determined to be the most viable option for the following reasons:

- Maintaining services would avoid a lowered rating from the Insurance Service Office (a non-profit organization that rates fire services provided by municipalities). Cutting services, on the other hand, would cause fire insurance costs to go up in Anchorage.
- > The people who use the service would pay the "user fee."
- > It makes sense for the user to pay the incremental cost of service
- > Inspection fees are reasonable and customary in most jurisdictions.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

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Mayor

The following is the estimated annual impact of the recommended new and increased fees. The 2000 General Government Operating Budget is based on these new/increased fees being in effect by January 1, 2000. The new/increased revenues in the 2000 budget are the amounts reflected below.
