A RESOLUTION OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY OPPOSING BALLOT MEASURE NO. 5, INITIATIVE NO.: 99HEMP, WHICH WOULD LEGALIZE THE USES OF HEMP, INCLUDING MARIJUANA

WHEREAS, the purpose of Ballot Measure No. 5 is to legalize all aspects of marijuana cultivation, possession, use (not only medicinal use), and distribution; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Anchorage recognizes the negative impacts on our community with the passage of Ballot Measure No. 5, specifically:

Marijuana use would be legal for 18-year olds in high school, even though Alaskans are not allowed to purchase cigarettes until they are 19, nor are Alaskans able to purchase alcohol until age 21;

Because marijuana is an intoxicant, passage of the measure would threaten public safety by allowing more people to be driving under the influence;

The measure would prohibit testing for marijuana for employment or insurance, even though these drug tests are currently used to determine impairment of workers, drivers or anyone suspected of being under the influence;

The measure would grant amnesty to persons convicted in the past of marijuana crimes and mandate destruction of all criminal records related to marijuana convictions;

require establishment of a panel to address the issue of The measure would/use-tax dellars to pay restitution to persons for their prior marijuana-related convictions and civil forfeitures;

The measure would require the Legislature, the Governor, and the Attorney General to challenge federal marijuana prohibitions in conflict with this proposition, which will put the State in opposition of the Federal Government, at a substantial cost to Alaskan taxpayers; additionally, this law would conflict with federal law if the State began to regulate marijuana sales as it does alcohol, and federal law likely would prevail;

Alaska businesses could be disqualified from competition for federal contracts requiring drug-free standards, which would adversely affect our economy; and

WHEREAS, in 1990, Alaskan voters passed an initiative that made marijuana illegal; and
