A RESOLUTION OF THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY MAKING A SITE AVAILABLE ON PUBLIC LANDS TO THE SIMONIAN LITTLE LEAGUE FOR YOUTH BASEBALL IN 2004

WHEREAS, private property historically used by the Simonian Little League for youth baseball will no longer be available to the League after the summer season of 2003 and;

WHEREAS, the Municipality has traditionally made its property available to the Little League for youth baseball because Little League programs benefit all of the citizens of Anchorage; and

WHEREAS, a study by Land Design North and other information available to the Assembly demonstrates that vacant Municipal property or private property acquired by trade of Municipal property can be made available for relocation of the Simonian Little League fields by the Summer of 2004 without additional cost to the taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality currently has \$100,000 available to assist the Simonian Little League and in partnership with the League, will explore additional public and private funding for construction of the fields at a new location.

NOW THEREFORE, the Anchorage Assembly resolves:

<u>Section 1:</u> That the Municipality shall make a site available on public lands for relocation of the Simonian Little League fields no later than the summer of 2004.

Section 2: That upon passage of this resolution, the Mayor shall inventory and make a technical assessment of available Municipal property that is suitable for relocation of the Simonian ballfields, as well as those private properties offered in trade to the Municipality for that purpose. The Mayor shall then select a site which meets the following criteria:

- The site must accommodate four Little League ballfields and an area sufficient for spectators, concessions, and batting cages. Parking as required by Municipal code must be included in the site or be available nearby.
- b In order to eliminate acquisition costs and to preserve the Municipal tax base, the site must be located on existing Municipal property or land acquired by exchange of Municipal property of equal value.
- c. The site must be available for Little League play by the Summer of 2004.
- d. The site must be within or contiguous to the boundaries of the Simonian Little League district.

- e. The site shall not be located within Bicentennial Park.
- f. The site must be one of those listed on Exhibit A or which otherwise meets the criteria of this section.

<u>Section 3</u>: That use of public property by the Simonian Little League shall be allowed under a long-term user permit between the League and the Municipality. At a minimum, the permit shall require that:

- a. the Simonian Little League provide at least 30% of the cost of building the fields, through in-kind or cash contributions;
- b. the League agree to maintain the ballfields and access bry facilities once built; and
- c. the League have priority scheduling of the fields as allowed by Municipal Codes and Regulations.

Section 4: That to construct the new ball fields, the Assembly intends to appropriate \$100,000 which is currently available, an additional \$500,000 from the proceeds of a Park Bond if approved by the voters in April, 2002 or thereafter, and such additional funds recommended by the Mayor through a Project Construction Plan. The Mayor shall complete the Plan after the Inventory and Technical Assessment made under Section 2 above. If necessary to achieve the purpose of this resolution, relocation of the Simonian fields may be combined with construction of a Community Park Project in Southeast Anchorage if the site selected for the ball fields meets all of the criteria described in Section 2. In-kind assistance from the Army or National Guard shall be explored.

<u>Section 5</u>: That Municipal Codes and Regulations shall govern site selection, construction, and use of the ball fields under this resolution. The Mayor shall prepare and submit to the Assembly such legislation, including appropriations measures, that are necessary to carry out the purpose of this resolution.

Section 6: That this resolution shall take effect immediately upon passage and approval.





Subject: AR 2002-51 - A RESOLUTION OF THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY

MAKING A SITE AVAILABLE ON PUBLIC LANDS TO THE SIMONIAN

LITTLE LEAGUE FOR YOUTH BASEBALL IN 2004

If approved by the Assembly, the attached resolution would provide a workable, cost-effective solution for relocation of the Simonian Little League fields by the summer of 2004. This memorandum explains the resolution and discusses the alternatives available to the Assembly for construction of the new fields.

Upon passage AR 2002-51, the Mayor will review Municipal properties that are suitable for relocation of the Simonian ballfields and several private properties which have been offered in trade to the Municipality for that purpose. The Mayor shall then select a site which meets several key criteria. The site must accommodate four Little League ballfields and an area sufficient for spectators, concessions, and batting cages; required parking must be provided or available; in order to eliminate acquisition costs and to preserve the Municipal tax base, the site must be located on existing Municipal property or land acquired by exchange of Municipal property of equal value; the site must be available for Little League play by the summer of 2004; the site must be within or contiguous to the boundaries of the Simonian Little League district; and, finally, the site shall not be located within Bicentennial Park.

AR 2002-51 requires the Mayor to analyze sites and make a final selection from among several iidentified properties. Land the Municipality currently owns which could be used for the new ball fields includes the Spring Hill/Henshew site, approximately 16 acres, listed as **Site 31** on LDN Study; HLB property north of the BLM tract consisting of 25 acres, listed as **Site 11** on LDN Study;; and the 27 acre Ruth Arcand site which is listed as **Sites 32/33** on the LDN Study. AR 2002-51 also allows the Mayor to study and select private lands available for exchange of municipal lands of equal value. Private sites available for trade to the Municipality include: Art Simonian property up to 28 acres, listed as **Site 6** on Land Design North (LDN) study and which is immediately adjacent to the area historically used by the Simonian Little League for over twenty years; and property adjacent to Whisper Faith Kovac Park offered by JL Properties, **Site 14** on LDN study. Letters confirming the availability of these private parcels are attached.

Once a final site is selected, the Mayor and his project management staff shall prepare a a Project Construction Plan. The Plan will include a construction budget, a program, and timetable for construction. By enacting this resolution, the Assembly intends to appropriate \$100,000 in existing Municipal funds, an additional \$500,000 from the proceeds of a Park Bond if approved by the voters in April, 2002 or thereafter, and such additional funds recommended by the Mayor through the Plan.

Use of the new ball fields by the Simonian Little League shall be allowed under a long-term user permit granted to the League. At a minimum, the permit would require that the League provide at least 30% of the cost of building the fields, through in-kind or cash contributions; that the League

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agree to maintain the ball fields and accessory facilities once built; and the League have priority scheduling of the fields as allowed by municipal codes and regulations.

Finally, applicable Municipal codes and regulations shall govern site selection, construction, and use of the ball fields under this resolution. This resolution requires the Mayor to prepare and submit to the Assembly such ordinances and resolutions, including appropriations measures, necessary to iimplement the resolution.

Alternatives

The Mayor has proposed AO 2002-29 which would place a separate bond proposition in the amount of \$4,500,000 before the voters in the April, 2002 election. If approved, the bonds would be used to purchase several private parcels located on the South side of Lore road east of Sandlewood Place and North of East 79th Avenue offered to the Municipality by J&L Properties. J&L would build out the fields and all necessary improvements, providing the League a "turnkey" facility at no cost to the League by the summer of 2004. Although recommended by the Mayor and preferred by the League, this option has several disadvantages. First, there is some doubt voters will approve this relatively expensive solution. According to Land Design North, "it is questionable whether voters area-wide would support a bond to acquire needed lands in the Abbott Loop area." LDN report, p. 6. "A bond in April, according to League official David Manzer, "is a very risky proposition. Last year's Parks bond passed only after a recount and we didn't even know the results until May. This year's Parks bond is the largest in many years and contains many much needed items. Will the voters, in much tougher economic times this year than last year, approve the acquisition of a 2.6 million dollar piece of private property for a park. .. ?" See, David S. Manzer E-Mail dated December 6, 2001.

Secondly, making an expensive "turnkey" recreational facility available to a private group with no commensurate contribution by that group to its acquisition or construction raises troubling questions over equal treatment to other deserving private recreational groups who have similar facility needs. Finally, outright purchase of private lands for this purpose removes those properties from the tax rolls, thereby reducing the Municipal tax base and further burdening taxpayers who will, of course, have to repay the \$4,500,000 in bonds sold to acquire the site and build the new fields.

If voters do not approve the \$4,500,000 in bonds proposed by the Mayor, the Mayor would "link" that action to an automatic approval of an amendment to the Bicentennial Park Plan which would allow construction of the four fields in that park. The Mayor's "fallback" position is attractive to some because it ends the controversy surrounding location of the fields and paves the way for more iintensive development of Bicentennial Park. On the other hand, the Mayor's "fallback" proposal does not address the considerable costs of building out the new fields in Bicentennial Park. Estimated to cost between \$1.5-2.0M, the new fields and related community park facilities do not appear in currently funded capital or operating budgets. Potentially, only \$600,000 is available in "leftover" parks bonds for this purpose, contingent on project design and a legislative finding by the Assembly. Correspondence between Mr. Campbell and Assemblymember Tesche (attached) confirm those facts. Unless the Simonian Little League is prepared to contribute in excess of \$1.0M to build the fields in Bicentennial Park or the Mayor can find additional funding for that purpose, the alternative of simply approving an amendment to the Bicentennial Park Plan is unrealistic and ill-conceived.

Recommendation

Few people question the need of the Simonian Little League for new ballfields and both the Assembly and Mayor are committed to using public resources for that purpose. Use of available, existing Municipal property or private property that can be traded for Municipal lands of equal value eliminates the need for an expensive bond proposition and preserves the tax base. Moreover, allowing the Mayor and his project management staff to prepare a final construction plan which includes substantial private sector contributions from the Simonian Little League and other entities, will most likely achieve a cost-effective result. Most importantly, however, implementation of the resolution will allow for continued, uninterrupted play in the Simonian Little League by the Summer of 2004.

Approval of AR 2002-51 is recommended.

Gentlemen:

You have asked whether, upon receipt of our letter of January 16, JL would still be open to discussions regarding a land exchange or other business deal involving development of the Lore Road site.

As you know, we proposed such a deal in our letter of December 31, and we followed that letter with other possible business scenarios in our informal discussions with City officials. Our letter of January 16 reflected our understanding that the administration was not inclined to proceed on that basis. If that understanding was incorrect, or if the Municipality has modified its view, JL would be pleased to continue discussions with the Municipality. I note, in that regard, that the "exchange" component need not, from our perspective, address all project costs (so that, for example, the approach can be combined with a limited bond proposition). I also reiterate the alternative described in our December 31 letter where the associated costs may be substantially reduced if the site was limited to only that necessary to accommodate the Simonian ballfields.

Dear Craig:

This letter confirms information provided to us on Friday, January 18, 2002 during our meeting with people involved in the Simonian ball fields issue.

You and Mr. Posey agree that \$100,000 is presently available to the Department of Cultural and Recreational Services (CRS) for construction of new ball fields in southeast Anchorage and that the money can be used for relocation of the Simonian fields. If the Assembly first makes an appropriate finding, \$500,000 is also available in park bond proceeds for a "Community Park Project" in south east Anchorage. While these funds could not be used exclusively to relocate the Simonian fields, these funds could be used in a larger community park project which would include the fields. No other municipal funds are currently available for relocation of the Simonian fields, at any site. We were told by representatives of the Simonian Little League that they do not have cash to contribute to site acquisition or construction of the new fields. The League has been promised some in kind services such as technical assistance and land clearing depending on the site ultimately selected for the new ball fields. In kind services may also be available through the Alaska National Guard. The dollar value of these in kind services is not known.

The Land Design North study estimated development costs for the Bicentennial Park site to be \$1,544,362. Actual costs, however, may exceed \$1.9M.

I am in receipt of your letter, dated January 20, 2002, regarding funding for the Simonean Little League Fields. I reviewed the available bond funding identified by the administration available for development of ball fields, whether at the Far North Bicentennial Park site or at the proposed Lore Road site. I can confirm that there remains approximately \$540,000 available for ballfield and park development. The source of these funds is approximately \$350,000 remaining from the 2000 Parks and Recreation bonds and about \$190,000 remaining from the 2001 Parks and Recreation bonds for parkland/ballfield acquisition and development.

I also concur with your estimate that the Land Design North (LDN) study indicated development costs for the Bicentennial Park site to be about \$1.5 million. However, I am unaware of any documents that project development estimates of \$1.9 million. The administration is using the LDN estimates for our anticipated development costs for the ballfields and park.

There are no other municipal funds that have been earmarked for parkland acquisition or ballfield development to support the Simonean Little League. We recognize that additional funds will be required to fully build out the project; however, it is our determination that the funds currently available are sufficient to clear the land and plant the grass necessary to meet the project scope requirements for ballfield development this summer.

I trust this answers your questions.

Veto of Assembly Resolution 2002-51, a resolution of the Anchorage

Municipal Assembly making a site available on public lands to the

Simonian Little League for youth baseball in 2004.

I hereby veto Assembly Resolution 2002-51 as approved by the Assembly February 12, 2002 for the following reasons:

Under the Resolution's requirements, it is unlikely that the process required by Code can be completed in time to meet Simonian Little League deadlines.

- The requirements of Section 3 of the Resolution for Simonian Little League equivalent funding at 30% is inequitable if alternate sites are to be made available for Anchorage School District or other programs.
- 3. The requirements of Section 3 of the Resolution for Simonian Little League to maintain the site are inequitable if alternate sites are to be made available for Anchorage School District or other programs.
- This AR eliminates 4000 acres located in Far North Bicentennial Park, excluding significant acreage, over 25% of the Municipality park land, that could potentially be available for the Simonian Little League, including areas within BLM control that have been previously identified through two public processes.

I encourage the Assembly to uphold this veto.
