AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING ELEMENTS FOR SITE SELECTION AND SITE PLAN APPROVAL OF A NEW FACILITY FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES AND ESTABLISHING THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY AS THE APPROVING AUTHORITY FOR SITE SELECTION, SITE PLAN APPROVAL, AND THE COMPETITIVELY SELECTED LEASE OF A NEW FACILITY.

WHEREAS, the current facility used by the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) no longer meets the functional needs of the Department and the clients it serves;

WHEREAS, the current facility cannot be maintained or upgraded in a manner cost effective or in a manner that will meet the Department's current and future needs;

WHEREAS, it is recognized that a new privately owned and developed facility has economical and beneficial advantages to citizens of Anchorage over one that is owned and developed by the Municipality;

WHEREAS, there are recognized advantages to having a new facility in mid-town, relatively close to the university-medical district, but that those advantages do not automatically outweigh all other factors, including cost;

WHEREAS, the need for the new facility places a significant time constraint on the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, the Assembly will, pursuant to any purchasing code requirements or as they may otherwise determine, approve the site selection and site plan; now therefore,

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Anchorage Municipal Code Title 21 provisions governing public facility site selection, site plan review, and public facility project landscaping review are hereby waived and inapplicable to the site selection and site plan review for the DHHS facility.

Section 2. The Anchorage Assembly shall review and approve a site selection and site plan in conjunction with the acceptance of a successful proposal under a Request For Proposals (RFP).
 The final site plan, including landscaping, may be approved with the acceptance of the proposal or may be approved at a later date. Consistent with applicable law, including AMC Tile 7, the RFP shall provide a scoring methodology which encourages proximity of a new facility to the university-medical district and also encourages a "turn-key" facility, in addition to the conditions identified in Exhibit A.

SUBJECT: AO 2003-32; Department of Health and Human Services New Facility

The Municipal Department of Health and Human Services has occupied their current location at 825 L Street since the early 1980's. Originally constructed as a hospital in the early 1960's, the building does not meet the needs of the department or the people of Anchorage for several reasons:

Functionality. As the department has grown to meet the needs of the public, the space constraints imposed by the layout of the building and its inability to be modified at an economic cost has limited the department in effectively using the space.

Facility Maintenance. The facility is in current need of major work for continued occupancy. One elevator is permanently shut down because parts can no longer be found to fix it. Plumbing is deteriorating and toilets are constantly backed up requiring continuing maintenance calls. The water system is rusting and drinking water often has a brownish tint because of the rust. Ceiling and ceramic tiles continually fall because of excess moisture.

Location. The current location in the downtown area is not central to a majority of the citizens who use the facility. A user survey this past summer showed that citizens who use health department services are equally distributed throughout the Municipality with no more than 14% coming from any one zip code area. A location more central to midtown would better serve the citizens.

Availability of Medical and University Resources. As the department's roles and responsibilities have grown, it is clear that the availability and closeness of medical and university resources will further enhance the departments' ability to provide quality service to the citizens of Anchorage, especially with regard to the events of September 11, 2001, and the emphasis on Homeland Security and Bioterrorism. The current collaboration such as the training of UAA School of Nursing students and research projects related to water quality studies with UAA enhance synergism gained by being close to the UMED district and will further ensure exceptional support to all of Anchorage. Location in this area conforms with Anchorage 20-20, the Anchorage Bowl Comprehensive Plan.

In light of the above issues, it is critical that the department relocate to a new location at the earliest
possible date. To ensure the location meets the needs of the department and our citizens, it is
recommended that an area be pre-identified to ensure the future location of the department is optimized.
This process will also allow the development community to concentrate on a specific area and thereby
minimize the risk of preparing submittals which do not meet the department's goals. Pre selecting an

area rather than a specific site will also allow for any suitable site within the area to be bid on, which 1 will increase the competitiveness of the bid while at the same time minimize the overall timeframe for 2 3 completion of the project. Following the standard Title 21 Site Selection Process would preclude site 4 work from being accomplished in the summer of 2004, which would delay the final completion by approximately one year.

THE ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDS APPROVAL OF AO 2003-32.

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Exhibit A AO 2003-32 DHHS Facility Request for Proposals Suggested Evaluation Criteria

A committee will be sanctioned and charged with proposal evaluation. The committee will have a cross section of members representing the MOA and professional disciplines related to project development and construction.

The Request For Proposal evaluation process will likely be structured into two phases. The initial concept is for the first phase of evaluations to be based on the responses to the technical specifications as delineated in the Request For Proposal.

Suggested evaluation criteria include, but may not be limited to:

Architectural: The architectural design concepts employed in the proposals are very important to the Municipality. Evaluation of this criteria will be based on how the architecture of the proposed facility meets the design requirements in the RFP.

Functional Efficiency: This criteria may be evaluated on the effectiveness of space utilization, effectiveness of circulation between department divisions, flexibility of space planning (adaptability of future changes), size and layout of customer service areas and relationship to the support spaces, the relationships between the various divisions, and the arrangement and layout of the support spaces (conference rooms, break rooms, training rooms, restrooms, etc.)

Quality of the Structure/Building Systems: This criteria will be evaluated on the appearance and image of the facility, the thermal envelope of the building (energy efficiency), mechanical systems and their energy efficiency and functional effectiveness, fire and life safety systems, the vertical transportation systems and their ability to move people quickly, safely, and efficiently, and the standby generator capabilities.

Building Expansion Potential: This criteria will consider the demonstrated ability to expand the facility in a cost efficient manner.

Experience and Capability of Proposed Team: Evaluations may be based on the strength and experience of the developer, the design team, and the construction team. The strength and experience of the property management team will also be considered.

Proximity to University and Medical District: The proximity to the U/MED district is very important to the department because of the ongoing collaboration and the synergism gained between DHHS and the U/MED district. Sites located within or the closest to the U/MED area may be scored higher than sites located further away from this area. Boundaries may be established and included in the Request For Proposal.

Other criteria may be developed as may be necessary and consistent with the above.

The proposed second phase of the evaluations will be of the cost proposals. It is likely the cost evaluations will be based upon a fixed priced, full service lease for a twenty-five (25) year term with the lowest cost proposal receiving greater evaluation points.
