A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE AMENDMENT #1 TO THE APPROVED HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT 2004 ACTION PLAN INCLUDING COMMITMENT OF ONE MILLION THREE HUNDRED FOUR THOUSAND AND SEVEN DOLLARS (\$1,304,007) IN FUTURE YEAR AND ONE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY SEVEN THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY ONE DOLLARS (\$1,877,461) IN REPROGRAMMED COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT FUNDS, MAKING COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROJECT AWARDS, AND APPROPRIATING ANNUAL AMERICAN DREAM DOWNPAYMENT INITIATIVE ENTITLEMENT GRANTS FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT IN THE AMOUNT OF SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED ELEVEN DOLLARS (\$75,911) OF 2003 ENTITLEMENT AND EIGHTY NINE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED SEVENTY SEVEN DOLLARS (\$89,577) OF 2004 ENTITLEMENT AND APPROPRIATING SAID FUNDS TO THE FEDERAL CATEGORICAL GRANTS FUND (241).

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Anchorage has a HUD-approved 2004 Action Plan of the 2003-2007 Consolidated Housing and Community Development Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, outlining the program of activities to be undertaken with Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, and Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funds; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Anchorage has proposed an Amendment #1 to the 2004 Action Plan in order to award grant funds and apply for additional funds through the American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI); and

WHEREAS, throughout the development of said 2004 Action Plan, and Amendment #1 thereto, the Municipality of Anchorage actively sought participation of residents and representatives of lower income Anchorage neighborhoods, including community councils; and

WHEREAS, public testimony on said Amended 2004 Action Plan and Amendment #1 was heard before the Housing & Neighborhood Development Commission; now, therefore,

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY RESOLVES:

<u>Section 1</u>. That the Amendment #1 to the 2004 Action Plan outlined in AM 480-2004 and in Attachments B-E of said AM, incorporated herein by reference, is adopted.

<u>Section 2.</u> That \$1,877,461 in previously appropriated CDBG funds and \$1,304,007 in future CDBG entitlements are hereby allocated to the uses outlined in AM 480-2004 and Attachment B, and

including grant and contract awards listed in Attachment C, all of which are incorporated herein by reference.
Section 3. That funds in the amount of \$75,911 in FY2003 ADDI entitlement and \$89,577 in
FY2004 ADDI entitlement within the Federal Categorical Grants Fund (241) are appropriated to the
AnCHOR program administered by Anchorage Neighborhood Housing Services and for program
administration. Accounting information is outlined in the attached Assembly Memorandum,
Attachment A, incorporated herein by reference.

Subject: Approval of Amendment #1 of the 2004 Action Plan of the Municipality of Anchorage's 2003-2007 Housing and Community Development Consolidated Plan, including approval of grant and contract awards for projects listed in Attachment C, program amendments in Attachments D and E, and appropriation of 2003 and 2004 American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI) Entitlement funds to the federal categorical grants fund 241 to provide downpayment and closing cost assistance to Anchorage homebuyers.

The attached document supports AR 2004-155 a resolution to adopt Amendment #1 of the 2004 Action Plan of the 2003-2007 Consolidated Housing and Community Development Consolidated Plan. This Amendment accomplishes three objectives:

2) Amends Section Three of the 2004 Action Plan (HOME Narratives and \$ 75,911 Proposed Projects) to include appropriation, application and proposed uses for \$165,488 89,577 in American Dream Downpayment Assistance Initiative funds from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, and makes necessary program changes and clarifications in order to apply for these funds, as detailed in Attachment D.

3) Amends Section Three of the 2004 Action Plan (HOME Narratives and Proposed Projects) to expand the options available to HOME and ADDI-funded homeownership programs in fulfilling affordability requirements, and specifies how two HOME/ADDI-funded homeownership programs will utilize each option, as detailed in Attachment E.

These three objectives are explained in more detail below

1) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

A. Housing Programs (Reduction of \$175,000 – reprogrammed in projects below)

Anchorage Neighborhood Housing Services (ANHS) has requested its Minor Repair grant be reduced by \$175,000.

B. CDBG Capital Projects (\$1,507,586 in reprogrammed funds and \$955,000 in future year 2006 Entitlement funds)

In the 2004 Action Plan \$1,482,344 was identified as available for capital projects not yet specified. This Amendment increases the funds currently available for CDBG Capital Projects by \$25,242 and

awards said funds to the projects and activities listed below. The amendment also awards and commits a total of \$955,000 of future year (2006) CDBG funds to capital projects, pending receipt of future year CDBG entitlements. Detailed descriptions and award information is included in Attachment C. These projects are pending completion of an environmental review per 24 CFR Part 58

CDBG Capital Project Awards and Uses included in Attachment C were made available for public comment from April 29 to June 14, 2004. The Housing and Neighborhood Development Commission (HAND) heard public comment on these projects on May 12 and are expected to pass their recommendation on these awards on June 16. A summary of all comments received during the public comment period and any HAND Commission Resolution will be provided to the Assembly via subsequent AM for the June 22nd Assembly meeting.

C. Elimination of Slum and Blight (\$100,000 in reprogrammed CDBG funds)

Up to \$100,000 is recommended for the environmental testing, possible remediation and purchase of 3901 Mountain View Drive, NE corner of Mountain View and North Bragaw. This projects meets the CDBG national objective of removal of slum and blight on a spot basis, per 24 CFR 570.208(b)(2). This is a CDBG eligible activity per 24 CFR 570.201(a), (b) and (d). This project is pending completion of an environmental review per 24 CFR Part 58.

D. Public Services (\$269,875 in reprogrammed CDBG funds, and \$349,007 in future year 2005 Entitlement Funds)

In the 2004 Action Plan \$203,875 was identified as available for public service projects not yet specified. This Amendment increases the funds currently available for CDBG Public Service projects by \$66,000 and awards said funds to the projects listed below. The amendment also awards and commits a total of \$349,007 of future year (2005) CDBG funds to public service projects, pending receipt of future year CDBG entitlements. Detailed descriptions and award information for these public service projects is included in Attachment C. These projects are pending completion of an environmental review per 24 CFR Part 58.

The Public Service Awards included in Attachment C were made available for public comment from April 3 and extended until June 14. The Human Services Allocation Task Force (HSATF) reviewed and recommended these awards as a result of a Request for Grant Proposal process for the 18-month period 7/1/04 – 12/31/05. The HSATF functions at the request of the Administration, and is comprised of six individuals with diverse backgrounds. The HSATF took public comment at a meeting on 5/6/04. The HAND Commission also accepted public comment on these projects during its May 12 meeting. A summary of all comments received during the public comment period and

 any HAND Commission Resolution will be provided to the Assembly via subsequent AM for the June 22 Assembly meeting.

2) American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI): Application and Funding

The Municipality of Anchorage has been allocated \$165,488 in FFY 2003 and FFY 2004 ADDI funds which will be used to augment the Anchorage Communities Home Ownership Resource (AnCHOR), an existing closing cost and downpayment assistance program currently funded through HOME and administered by Anchorage Neighborhood Housing Services. Minor changes in the AnCHOR program will apply to loans utilizing ADDI funds to meet funding guidelines. The complete text of this amended section of the Action Plan is included in Attachment D.

3) HOME Investment Partnerships Program Recapture Provisions

The Recapture Provisions that may be elected in programs funded with HOME or ADDI are outlined in the 2004 Action Plan. Recapture Provisions govern how direct homeowner housing assistance programs may ensure housing affordability over a period of time. The Municipality of Anchorage proposes to include the option of "shared net proceeds" in its recapture options, to be determined on a program by program basis. The complete text of this amended section of the Action Plan is included in Attachment E.

- 1. Salvation Army Alaska, McKinnell Family Shelter. Contract award not to exceed \$955,000 in FY 2006 (future year) funds for the new construction of a 16-unit family homeless shelter, located between 1701 A Street and 1695 C Street. This contract award shall be effective when signed on behalf of the Municipality and shall extend through December, 2006 with two (2) one-year (1-year) options to extend. This award is subject to receipt, appropriation, and approval of the 2006 Action Plan. The project meets a CDBG national objective by serving the presumed low-income homeless population, 24 CFR 570.208(a)2(i)A. This is a CDBG eligible activity per 24 CFR 570.201(c).
- 2. Catholic Social Services, Clare House Renovation. Contract award not to exceed \$252,878 for the interior and exterior painting of an existing facility, improve lighting, and internal renovations for this shelter for homeless women and women with children. This contract award shall be effective when signed on behalf of the Municipality and shall extend through December, 2004 with two (2) one-year (1-year) options to extend. The project meets a CDBG national objective by serving the presumed low-income homeless population, 24 CFR 570.208(a)2(i)A. This is a CDBG eligible activity per 24 CFR 570.201(c).
- 3. Covenant House, Alaska, Crisis Center Renovation and Outdoor Lobby. Grant award not to exceed \$376,708 for the construction of a secured outdoor rest area for homeless teen and young adult residents, addressing hazardous waste removal and abatement inside the Crisis Center, and performing other interior, accessibility and security upgrades. - 4. Special Olympics Alaska, Facility Renovation. Grant award change order not to exceed \$40,000 in additional funds to address cost overruns experienced by this renovation project awarded by the Assembly on August 27, 2003. The project meets a CDBG national objective by serving a minimum of 51 percent low income clientele, 24 CFR 570.208(a)2(i)B. This is a CDBG eligible activity per 24 CFR 570.201(c).

The remaining parks each meet a CDBG national objective by benefiting a low-income area per 24 CFR 570.208(a)(1). All parks projects are CDBG eligible activities per 24 CFR 570.201(c).

- 2. Mountain View Slum and Blight Removal, up to \$100,000: environmental testing, possible remediation and purchase of 3901 Mountain View Drive, NE corner of Mountain View and North Bragaw. - 3. Alaska Legal Services, not to exceed \$166,875: Children At-Risk Project provides legal assistance to families with children at-risk of abuse or neglect. Services provided at 1016 W 6th Ave., Anchorage, AK; program will maintain income documentation per 570.208(a)2(i)B.
- 4. Anchorage Literacy, not to exceed \$153,352: Multi-Sensory Instruction Program provides illiterate adults reading instruction via small classes and software programs. Services provided at 1345 Rudakof Circle, #104, Anchorage, AK; program serves presumed low income illiterate adults per 24 CFR 570.208(a)2(i)A.
- 5. Covenant House Alaska, not to exceed \$103,444: Job Development Program increases youth self-sufficiency skills with GED/education, driver training and work skills. Services

- provided at 609 F Street, Anchorage, AK; program serves abused youth and homeless persons per 24 CFR 570.208(a)2(i)A.
- 6. STAR, not to exceed \$87,750: Youth Advocate Program provides victims of child sexual abuse and their families with crisis intervention, related community education. Services provided at 1057 W Fireweed Lane, Anchorage, AK; program serves abused youth per 24 CFR 570.208(a)2(i)A.

Revisions beginning Page 3-9, in Section Three "HOME Narratives and Proposed Projects", Subpart "Proposed HOME Project Descriptions," second paragraph of the Anchorage Communities Home Ownership Resource (AnCHOR) are indicated below:

A borrower's total household income may not exceed US Department of Housing and Urban-Development's (HUD) established low-income limits, according to family size. These income limits are adjusted on an annual basis. The maximum amount of assistance will be \$30,000, of which only \$10,000, or six percent (6%) of the purchase price whichever is greater, may be funded from ADDI funds. The minimum amount of combined HOME and ADDI assistance for each loan is \$1,000.

Anchorage Neighborhood Housing Services (ANHS) will administer the program. ANHS will takeseveral steps to ensure the suitability of families receiving AnCHOR assistance. Pre-purchase homebuyer counseling is required for all AnCHOR loan recipients. Homebuyers must also commit to post-purchase counseling, available through ANHS. To market the program, ANHS will create and annually evaluate its affirmative marketing plan, which will include providing brochures on the program to Alaska Housing Finance Corporation (AHFC) for distribution to public housing and

Section 8 applicants and/or residents, as well as targeted outreach to residents of mobile home parks that are expected to close in the near future, among other activities. In addition, ANHS, the Municipality of Anchorage and AHFC have coordinated the AnCHOR program with AHFC's Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Program. This program assists Housing Choice Voucher ("Section 8") recipients purchase homes, using their voucher to assist in mortgage payments rather than for rental payments, and reduces overall debt payments through use of the AnCHOR program.

Two special types of loans have been included in the HOME program this year. Zero percentinterest AnCHOR loans will be available for down payment and closing costs for households
participating in the Affordable Homeownership program administered by Habitat for Humanity. The
loans will be deferred until the property is sold or the owner moves out of the home. The
Municipality is also partnering with AHFC in the Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership
Program. This program will provide AnCHOR loans to disabled individuals utilizing Section 8

Proposed amendments in this Appendix refer to the Resale and Recapture guidelines included in the 2004 Action Plan. The location of the text proposed for changes is indicated in the boxed captions below.

Revisions to Page 3-4, "HOME Narratives and Proposed Projects", "Resale/Recapture Guidelines" are indicated below:

Resale/Recapture Guidelines

If a <u>homeownership</u> project ceases to comply with the affordability requirements during the affordability periods described above, the Municipality shall implement the following guidelines for recapturing all or a portion of the HOME funds used, recapturing the property itself, or requiring the property be sold to a low-income household.

Resale

In projects where HOME funds are used for acquisition and/or rehabilitation and no loan subsidy is given, a Resale provision will be utilized in the form of a second mortgage using a Promissory Note and Deed of Trust (DOT), or written directly into the DOT. The minimum terms of affordability are defined by regulation and guide the terms of the second-mortgage loans. The housing must remain the principal residence of the family for the duration of the period of affordability. A detailed description of default and actions under default reside in the Deed of Trust.

In the event the "Borrower" intends to sell the property during the affordability period, the housing must be available exclusively to families qualifying as low-income as stipulated in the applicable program's policies and the new owner must use the property as their principal residence as defined in the Deed of Trust.

The resale price shall provide the original HOME-assisted homeowner a fair return on investment to include the homeowner's investment and any capital improvements. The price shall also remain affordable to a reasonable range of low-income homebuyers. These resale-price assurances are delineated and guaranteed as provisions in the Deed of Trust as applicable.

Recapture

When down payment assistance or other loan assistance is provided, the Deed of Trust and-Promissory Note will document restrictions needed to comply with HUD 24 CFR 92.254 (a)(5)(ii). The Deed default provisions may include (but are not limited to) payment schedules, superior encumbrances, occupancy requirements, use of property, materially false information and/or material, and compliance with federal regulations and program policies.

The housing must continue to be the <u>Borrower's</u> principal residence throughout the applicable affordability period. Loan balances at the time of a default according to the Deed of Trust and Note shall be <u>recaptured</u>, including amortized loans and loans with other types of payment requirements.

In the event of recapture, the amount recaptured will be either the balance of the loan at the time ofdefault or property sale (called the "Loan Balance Recapture" method) or a portion of the net
proceeds (called the "Shared Net Proceeds" method) resulting from disposition or anticipated
disposition of the property, or, in the case of foreclosure, a combination of both of these methods.
The amount to be returned to the HOME program utilizing the Shared Net Proceeds method shall be
determined according to the formula stated in 24 CFR 92.245(a)(5)(ii)(A)(3), or homeowners may be
allowed to recover their investment first, depending on the parameters of the program. Each
program will designate the method (Shared Net Proceeds, Loan Balance Recapture, or combination
thereof) that will be used for that program in its Policy and Procedures. For all programs, in the case
of foreclosure, if insufficient funds remain to pay the full recapture amount, the amount of recapture
shall not exceed the Shared Net Proceeds method utilizing the formula stated in 24
CFR92.245(a)(5)(ii)(A)(3).

HOME funds used to reduce the purchase price to an affordable price are subject to the samerecapture provisions as above and may be treated as either a loan with payment requirements or loans reduced over time. **Deleted:** The balance of loans reduced over a time period coinciding with the affordability periods shall also be due and payable upon default.

When HOME funds are used to assist homebuyers acquiring single-family housing containing one or more units, the recapture provisions apply as above to both the unit used as the homebuyer's primary residence and the assisted rental units. For the rental units, the affordability requirements of 24 CFR 92.252 will apply, except that the Municipality may terminate the affordability period upon the recapture of the HOME funds.

Revisions to page 3-9, "HOME Narratives and Proposed Projects", "2) Anchorage Communities Home Ownership Resource", second paragraph, are indicated below:

AnCHOR offers funds for downpayment and closing costs, up to \$30,000, to families with-household incomes at or below 80 percent of the area median who wish to purchase a single-family home (including condominium units) within the Municipality of Anchorage. Assistance is in the form of a second or third mortgage loan on top of the maximum affordable first and in some cases second mortgage the borrower can obtain. The AnCHOR mortgage is secured by a note and deed of trust. For the first ten years of the loan, five percent (5%) of the loan will be forgiven annually if the homeowner continues to make the property his or her principal residence. The remaining 50 percent of the loan will not be forgiven. There are no periodic payments on the loan, however, if the borrower sells of moves out of the home at any time, the unforgiven balance becomes due and payable to the Municipality's HOME Program under the Loan Balance Recapture method of recapture described under the Resale/Recapture Guidelines described earlier in this Section. However, in the event of foreclosure, if insufficient funds remain to pay the full recapture amount, the amount of recapture shall not exceed the Shared Net Proceeds method utilizing the formula stated in 24 CFR92.245(a)(5)(ii)(A)(3).
