- 2. Property classified as evidence, found, or safekeeping shall become disposable property as set forth in section 7.25.030 A., except as otherwise provided in section 7.25.030 B.
- 3. When property becomes disposable property the Anchorage Police Department shall provide notice as provided under section 7.25.050 and section 7.25.060.
- 4. Disposable property not claimed and retrieved by an owner or finder in conformance with this chapter shall be forfeited to the Municipality as unclaimed disposable property pursuant to section 7.25.090.

### 7.25.020 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, unless otherwise provided, the following words when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section:

Ammunition means fixed ammunition or cartridge cases, primers, bullets, shotgun shells, or propellant powder designed for use in any firearm, including antique firearms, or armor piercing ammunition.

Antique firearm has the same definition as 18 U.S.C. § 921(a)(16) and amendments thereto.

*Bicycle* means any wheeled device primarily designed to be propelled by human power, including tricycles and unicycles, platform scooters and may be motor-driven assisted.

Biohazard means infectious agents, microorganisms, blood borne pathogens, or hazardous biological materials, or chemicals that present a risk, potential risk, or a hazardous condition to the health of humans, animals or the environment.

Chief of police means the Anchorage Police Department chief of police or an authorized designee.

Child pornography has the same meaning as set forth in 18 U.S.C. § 2256 and amendments thereto.

Claim date means the date 10 days after the disposition deadline date.

Collectible item means money, ingots, a precious metal commodity, artifact or any other item considered collectible or perceived to have an above average monetary market value.

Community based non-profit organization means a fraternal, charitable, religious, benevolent, or other non-profit organization, actively operating in the Municipality of Anchorage, and is exempt from taxation under the Internal Revenue laws of the United States as a fraternal, charitable, religious, or benevolent organization.

Contraband means any property, excluding firearms and ammunition, exported or imported in violation of law, or any property the possession of which constitutes a violation of law or is otherwise prohibited, including controlled substances and drug evidence.

Controlled substance means a drug, substance, or immediate precursor included in the schedules set out in AS 11.71.140 through 11.71.190.

Counterfeit or altered currency means evidence that is transferred to the United States Secret Service, and will not be subject to a claim by an owner or finder, or subject to destruction.

Dangerous or perishable property means any designation of property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department determined to be perishable, or an immediate danger, inclusive of damaged or corroded ammunition, fireworks, and all forms of gun powder, or any biohazard that poses a risk to municipal employees or the general public.

Destroy means destruction or rendering incapable for use, and permanently disposing of property by any lawful means.

# Destructible property means:

- Dangerous or perishable property or property determined to be a biohazard;
- 2. Forensic evidence retained until completion of the final judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory disposition date;
- 3. Property ordered to be destroyed either by a court or pursuant to a plea bargain agreement;
- 4. Contraband, unclaimed personal property, drug evidence, controlled substances, or child pornography;
- 5. Property, determined by the Anchorage Police Department to be unserviceable, junk, or waste, or with insubstantial fair market value;
- 6. Prescription or over-the-counter medication;
- 7. Any firearm or weapon determined by an Anchorage Police Department or State of Alaska armorer, bomb disposal officer, or an authorized United States Department of Treasury Official to be:

- a. Unlawful to own or possess under federal or state
- b. Utilized in a homicide, including a suicide.
- c. Unsafe, a biohazard, or presents an immediate or potential risk of endangerment to the public.
- d. Any part of a firearm causing the sale of the firearm to be prohibited by federal or state law; and
- 8. Any unclaimed disposable property, the chief of police does not claim and the purchasing officer is unable to dispose of through sale, trade, or barter, may be deemed destructible property.

Destruction means to destroy or permanently render unserviceable any property, by any means, creating a state of substantial irreparability, ruin, or disassembly.

Digital media means any storage device capable of holding digital data, including hard and optical discs and USB drives.

Disposable property means property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department, excluding destructible property and impounded motorized vehicles that may be lawfully returned to an owner or finder, or disposed of by any means after meeting the retention periods set forth in this chapter.

Disposition deadline date is 30 days after the posted date of a public notice of disposable property which is eligible for recovery by an owner, finder or authorized representative.

*Drug evidence* has the same meaning for items, excluding real property, subject to forfeiture as defined under AS 17.30.110.

*Drugs* mean prescription medication, over-the-counter medication, or controlled substances.

Evidence means any property collected, found, recovered, seized, or otherwise comes into the custody of the Anchorage Police Department, and retained for any criminal or internal investigation, judicial, quasi-judicial, or adjudicatory proceedings.

Fair market value means the value reasonably expected for any unclaimed disposable property disposed of under this chapter.

Final judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory disposition date means the date when all adjudicatory, quasi-judicial, and court appeals have been

 exhausted or the appeal period has expired, for each referenced case and for all persons charged or associated with the evidence in possession of the Anchorage Police Department.

Finder means the person identified on an official police report who discovered non-evidentiary found property.

Firearm means any device designed for or capable of delivering a projectile using an explosive as a propellant, including an antique firearm, pistol, rifle, shotgun, revolver or similar device. A firearm does not include toy guns or guns utilizing an elastic ban, compressed gas, or air to deliver a projectile.

Forensic evidence means evidence collected that may be scientifically testable, may contain organic or inorganic biological properties, may have been chemically treated, or collected with the intent to conduct a scientific examination for evaluation or discussion and has potential for presentation in a internal investigation, judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory proceeding.

Found means non-evidentiary property held by the Anchorage Police Department as lost or abandoned property.

Insubstantial fair market value means unclaimed disposable property the Anchorage Police Department determines to have a fair market value of \$50.00 or less.

Money means any domestic or foreign currency or comparable medium of exchange currently in circulation, has value, and is generally accepted by a financial institution.

Motor vehicle has the same meaning as defined under section 9.04.010, excluding motor assisted bicycles, battery operated toys, or machines designed as children's toys or for assisting pedestrian transportation.

Over-the-counter medication means any substance that may be lawfully sold over the counter without a prescription, under 21 U.S.C. §§ 301-399a (Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act) and 21 C.F.R. § 1308.22, and any amendments thereto.

Owner means a person, the legal representative of a person, or an authorized representative of a business with a legal or equitable interest in disposable property, who produces proof of ownership acceptable to the Anchorage Police Department.

Owner and finder notice of possession means a letter advising a known

owner, or any finder that the Anchorage Police Department is in possession of disposable property which may be returned for which they may have an ownership interest.

Personal property means property in the form of personal identification, credit, debit, or bank cards, personal credentials, financial or legal documents, mail, photographs, cell phones and devices containing digital media, keys, grooming materials, purses, backpacks, and similar items.

Posted date means the first published date of an itemized list of disposable property which is eligible for disposition or recovery by an owner, finder or authorize representative.

Prescription medicine means a licensed drug or narcotic regulated by legislation to require a prescription before it can be obtained and intended to distinguish it from over the counter drugs which can be obtained without a prescription.

Prohibited person means any person under federal, state, or municipal law prohibited from actual or constructive possession of a firearm. A prohibited person may still have an ownership interest in the firearm that may be transferred.

*Property* means all tangible items, excluding impounded motorized vehicles, in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department classified as evidence, found, or safekeeping.

Public notice of disposable property means a printed notice and an electronically accessible document containing information and an itemized list of property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department that may be disposed of or is lawful to return to an owner, finder, or other authorized representative.

Safekeeping means any non-evidentiary property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department placed into temporary custody on behalf of a known owner.

Unclaimed disposable property means any disposable property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department forfeited by a court or judicial proceeding, or not claimed by or timely retrieved by an owner or finder after the disposition deadline date.

Unsafe means a state or condition of property reasonably determined prima facie or through a professional conclusion, opinion or decision that it is dangerous or liable to cause or inflict injury, harm, or death, or may pose a significant risk of endangerment to the public.

Weapon means any item traditionally used as a weapon, except firearms and ammunition, and includes a chemical dispensing device, bow, club, baton, crossbow, knife, metal knuckles, martial arts weapon, stun guns or a gun which uses compressed air to deliver any projectile, or any explosive component or destructive device.

# 7.25.030 Disposable property.

- A. Property classified by the Anchorage Police Department as evidence, found, or safekeeping property shall become disposable property after expiration of the following retention periods:
  - 1. Property classified as evidence shall become disposable property
    - a. 30 days after it is no longer required for purposes of investigation; or
    - b. If it is presented in a criminal, civil, or administrative proceeding, 30 days after the final judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory disposition date.
  - 2. Property classified as found shall become disposable property 10 days after coming into the custody of the Anchorage Police Department.
  - 3. Property classified as safekeeping shall become disposable property 10 days after coming into the custody of the Anchorage Police Department.
- B. The following property in possession of the Anchorage Police Department is not subject to subsection A. above, and shall immediately become destructible property:
  - 1. Contraband evidence where there is no defendant, active investigation or prosecution; or
  - 2. Dangerous or perishable property.

# 7.25.040 Courtesy notice of possession of disposable property.

- A. The Anchorage Police Department may notify the last known owner of disposable property, through a courtesy notice of possession, that disposable property is available for retrieval.
- B. A courtesy notice of possession may be by telephone, e-mail, fax, or by mail.
- C. No legal obligation shall be attached to the Anchorage Police Department for failure to provide notice under this section.

# 7.25.050 Public notice of disposable property.

- A. The Anchorage Police Department shall publish, as deemed necessary, a public notice of disposable property in a newspaper or other publication of general circulation once a week over the period of four weeks beginning on the first Wednesday of the published month.
  - 1. The notice shall be titled "Anchorage Police Department, Announcement of Disposable Property, Notice and Listing."
  - 2. The notice shall advise the public that the department is in possession of disposable property along with the physical and internet locations where lists of disposable property may be viewed.
- B. The Anchorage Police Department shall also:
  - Post monthly on the department's internet website any list(s)
    of disposable property and include any other internet
    websites, links, or physical locations where the public may
    view the list(s) of disposable property;
  - 2. Provide in the posting the final claim date, the item number, general description, information and the manner, including any restrictions, in which an owner or finder may recover disposable property; and
  - 3. Provide in the posting that disposable property not retrieved by the claim date shall be forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage as unclaimed disposable property.
- C. This section does not apply to items of \$50 or less, forensic evidence, destructible, dangerous or perishable property, items forfeited by a court, money payable on traveler's checks, money orders, and other instruments presumed abandoned.

# 7.25.060 Written notice of possession of disposable property.

- A. The Anchorage Police Department shall, except as provided in subsection D. below, provide a written notice of possession of disposable property to the last known owner and any finder of disposable property concurrently with posting a notice of disposal property under section 7.25.050 B.
- B. The written notice of possession of disposable property shall be sent certified mail to the last known address of the owner and any finder, or if the owner or finder is incarcerated, sent via fax, in lieu

of certified mail, to the correctional institution where the owner or finder may reside.

- C. The final notice of possession shall contain the information required by section 7.25.050 B.
- D. This section does not apply to items of \$50 or less, forensic evidence, destructible, dangerous or perishable property, items forfeited by a court, money payable on traveler's checks, money orders, and other instruments presumed abandoned.

# 7.25.070 Retrieval of disposable property other than firearms and ammunition.

- A. All disposable property is subject to civil and criminal asset forfeiture prior to release to an owner or finder.
- B. Retrieval of disposable property by an owner or finder shall be accomplished by the claim date.
- C. The finder of a bicycle may not retrieve the found bicycle. If the found bicycle is not retrieved by the owner, it shall be forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage as unclaimed disposable property.

# 7.25.080 Retrieval of disposable property in the form of firearms and ammunition.

- A. All firearms and ammunition are subject to civil and criminal asset forfeiture prior to release to an owner or finder.
- B. The owner of a firearm or ammunition shall be permitted to retrieve a firearm or ammunition if:
  - 1. The retrieval of the firearm and ammunition is accomplished by the claim date;
  - 2. The firearm or ammunition is lawful to possess; and
  - 3. The owner or finder is not identified as a prohibited person.
- C. If the owner of a firearm or ammunition is identified as a prohibited person, the owner shall be prohibited from retrieving the firearm or ammunition. However, the prohibited person may:
  - 1. Transfer full and complete ownership interest, including all rights, title and interest, in the firearm and ammunition to a non-prohibited person or the Anchorage Police Department;
  - 2. Arrange for the Anchorage Police Department to release the

firearm and ammunition to a federally licensed firearms dealer for the sole purpose of sale.

- D. The finder of a firearm or ammunition not designated as evidence may retrieve the firearm or ammunition if:
  - 1. The owner of the firearm or ammunition does not retrieve the firearm or ammunition pursuant to subsection B. above;
  - 2. The finder delivers a letter to the Chief of Police requesting the firearm or ammunition prior to the disposition deadline date;
  - 3. The firearm or ammunition is retrieved by the claim date and
  - 4. The finder is not identified as a prohibited person. Any finder identified as a prohibited person shall not be entitled to any claim, possession, constructive possession or any ownership interest in any found firearm or ammunition.

# 7.25.090 Forfeiture of disposable property to the Municipality of Anchorage.

All disposable property, including firearms and ammunition, forfeited by a court or judicial proceeding, or not retrieved by the owner or finder by the claim date shall be deemed forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage and disposed of as unclaimed disposable property.

# 7.25.100 <u>Disposition of unclaimed disposable property, other than firearms and ammunition.</u>

- A. Unclaimed disposable property forfeited to the Municipality pursuant to section 7.25.090 shall be governed by this section.
- B. The purchasing officer shall authorize the disposition of unclaimed disposable property as follows:
  - 1. Unclaimed disposable property, excluding money and collectible items, shall be subject to a claim by the chief of police for retention, use, trade or bartering.
  - 2. Unclaimed disposable property, excluding forensic evidence, destructible, dangerous and perishable property and property not claimed by the chief of police, may be disposed of by the purchasing officer through destruction, sale, trade, bartering, donation to a community based non-profit organization, or through an agreement or contract.
  - 3. Unclaimed disposable property in the form of money, excluding collectable and foreign currency, shall be delivered to the municipal treasurer for deposit into the Anchorage

- Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund.
- 4. Collectable and foreign currency or a collectable item may be disposed of by sale with the proceeds deposited into the Anchorage Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund.
- C. Upon approval by the purchasing officer, any unclaimed disposable property claimed under subsection B.1. shall be used for:
  - 1. Anchorage Police Department use, issue, training, or parts; or,
  - 2. Any municipal use.
- D. Unclaimed disposable property that is determined to be forensic evidence, digital media or personal property or is property the purchasing officer is unable to dispose of through sale, trade, or barter may be disposed of as destructible property in conformance with section 7.25.130.

# 7.25.110 <u>Disposition of unclaimed disposable property in the form of firearms and ammunition.</u>

- A. Except as provided in subsection B., C., and D. below, unclaimed disposable property in the form of firearms and ammunition forfeited to the Municipality pursuant to section 7.25.090 shall be disposed of by:
  - 1. A public sale not limited to firearms dealers;
  - 2. Trade-in for credit in the purchase of firearms; or
  - 3. Transfer to a state or municipal law enforcement agency, including the Anchorage Police Department.
- B. If federal or state gun laws or regulations prohibit the sale of a particular firearm under subsection A. above, the purchasing officer shall:
  - 1. Arrange for the sale of the firearm to a firearms dealer who has the appropriate federal license to buy the firearm;
  - 2. Trade-in or transfer of the firearm under subsections A.2. and A.3. above; or
  - 3. Order the firearm to be dismantled, destroying those firearm parts causing the sale of the firearm under subsection A to be prohibited, and disposing of the other parts of the firearm under subsection A.
- C. Notwithstanding subsection A. or B. above, no firearm, firearm part, or ammunition shall be sold if the condition of the firearm, firearm

part, or ammunition is not functional for its intended use, is in obvious disrepair or damage, is in an unsafe condition, or has no residual value as a separate piece part. Nor shall a sale be conducted that invalidates the protections afforded the Municipality under AS 18.65.340(e).

- D. Firearms used in the commission of a homicide, including a suicide, are exempt from the provisions of this section and shall be disposed of in accordance with section 7.25.130 A., or in accordance with a judicial order or plea agreement.
- E. The provisions of this section do not apply to firearms or ammunition the Anchorage Police Department may agree to dispose of at the request of the owner.

# 7.25.120 Reimbursement of fees.

- A. At the time disposable property is retrieved by an owner, finder, or authorized person, and prior to shipping any disposable property, the chief of police may require a reimbursement fee pursuant to subsection B. below from the owner, finder, or other authorized person receiving the disposable property.
- B. A reimbursement fee may include the costs of courtesy notice of possession, public notice, written notice of possession, publication, storage, postage, shipping, shipping container and materials, sale, or any other cost or handling expenses.
- C. The chief of police may waive a reimbursement fee for good cause.
- D. Any collected reimbursement fee shall be deposited into the Anchorage Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund.

# 7.25.130 Disposition of destructible property.

- A. Destructible property may be destroyed or disposed of by any lawful means, except:
  - 1. The chief of police may authorize the return of a prescription when there is no evidence of contamination or product tampering and the owner provides evidence of a valid medical need.
- B. Notwithstanding any other section in this chapter, property that comes into the possession of the Anchorage Police Department that is determined to be a biohazard, dangerous or perishable is

exempt from the retention periods provided under section 7.25.030, and may be immediately disposed of by any lawful means.

# 7.25.140 Certification of disposition of unclaimed disposable property.

- A. The municipal internal auditor shall certify the proper disposition of unclaimed disposable property under this chapter anytime:
  - 1. Property in the form of money is forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage.
  - 2. Property is released to a vendor under municipal contract or agreement for the purposes of auction, barter, sale, trade or donation.
  - 3. Property, in the form of drugs, firearms, or unlawful parts of firearms, is destroyed.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be effective on September 29,2009

This ordinance repeals and re-enacts AMC Chapter 7.25 to add and clarify definitions, prevent the retrieval of firearms and ammunition by persons prohibited from possessing firearms under federal, state, or municipal law, comply with Federal gun laws and the provisions of AS 18.65.340 regarding the disposition of firearms and ammunitions by the state and municipallities, and clarify the disposition processes for firearms and drug paraphernalia along with reducing municipal liability and the potential for civil suits and risk management claims.

#### PRIVATE SECTOR ECONOMIC EFFECTS:

This ordinance has no private sector effects. Firearm owners prohibited by federal gun laws from possessing a firearm may legally transfer ownership to another person or sale through a federally licensed gun dealer.

## Chapter 7.25 DISPOSITION OF DISPOSABLE PROPERTY\*

#### 7.25.005 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, unless otherwise provided, the following words when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section:

*Bicycle* means any wheeled device primarily designed to be propelled by human power, including tricycles and unicycles, and may be motor-driven assisted.

Collectible item means any disposable property, including, but not limited to, money, ingots, or a precious metal commodity, which may be considered collectible or perceived to have an above average monetary market value.

Community based non-profit organization means a fraternal, charitable, religious, benevolent, or other non-profit organization, actively operating in the Municipality of Anchorage, that is exempt from taxation under the Internal Revenue laws of the United States as a fraternal, charitable, religious, or benevolent organization.

Contraband means any property exported or imported in violation of law, or any property the possession of which constitutes a violation of law or is otherwise prohibited, including controlled substances, drug paraphernalia, and altered or counterfeit money.

Controlled substance means a drug, substance, or immediate precursor included in the schedules set out in AS 11.71.140--11.71.190.

Dangerous or perishable property means any disposable property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department determined to be perishable, or determined to be an immediate danger or health hazard to anyone, including municipal employees or the general public.

Destroy means destruction or rendering incapable for use, and permanently disposing of property by any lawful means, excluding auction, sale or converting to municipal use.

Destructible property means any disposable property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department that is dangerous, perishable, forensic evidence released after the final judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory disposition date, or any other disposable property that may be destroyed as set out in Section 7.25.060.

Disposable property means any property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department, including money or collectible items, that can be lawfully released or disposed of after retention periods set out in this chapter. Disposable property does not include motorized vehicles towed or impounded to a towing yard, which are regulated under Title 9 and 15, or municipal surplus property, regulated by Section 7.10.070.

Disposition deadline date is 30 days after the posted date of the notice of disposable property.

Drug paraphernalia has the same meaning as in Section 8.35.010.

*Drugs* means prescription drugs, over-the-counter medication or controlled substances.

Evidence means any property that is collected, found, recovered, seized, or otherwise comes into the custody of the Anchorage Police Department, and retained for any criminal or internal investigation, judicial, quasi-judicial, or adjudicatory proceedings.

Fair market value means the commercial value that could reasonably be expected for any unclaimed disposable property disposed of under this chapter.

Final judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory disposition date means the date when all adjudicatory, quasi-judicial, and court appeals have been exhausted or the appeal period has expired, for each referenced case and for all persons associated with the evidence in possession of the Anchorage Police Department.

Finder means the person identified on an official police report who has given found property to the Anchorage Police Department.

Firearm means any device that is designed for or capable of delivering a projectile using an explosive as a propellant, including a pistol, rifle, shotgun, revolver or similar device.

Forensic evidence means evidence collected that is scientifically testable, may contain organic or inorganic biological properties, may have been chemically treated, or collected with the intent to conduct a scientific examination for evaluation or discussion and has potential for presentation in a internal investigation, judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory proceeding.

Found property means non-evidentiary property held by the Anchorage Police Department as lost or abandoned property.

Insubstantial fair market value means unclaimed disposable property which the Anchorage Police Department determines to have a fair market value of \$50.00 or less.

Money means any domestic or foreign currency or comparable medium of exchange that is currently in circulation, has value, and is generally accepted by a financial institution.

Notice of disposable property means a printed or electronically accessible document containing information and an itemized list of disposable property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department.

Notice of possession means a letter mailed or electronically sent to a known owner or any finder of disposable property, advising that the Anchorage Police Department is in possession of the disposable property for which they may have an ownership interest.

Over-the-counter medication means any substance that may be lawfully sold over the counter without a prescription, under 21 U.S.C. §§ 301-392 (Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act) and 21 C.F.R. § 1308.22, and any amendments to these federal laws.

Owner means a person, their legal representative, or an authorized representative of a business with a legal or equitable interest in disposable property, that can produce sufficient proof of ownership acceptable to the Anchorage Police Department.

Personal property means property in the form of personal identification, credit, debit, or bank cards, personal credentials, financial or legal documents, mall, photographs, keys, grooming materials, clothing or similar items.

*Property* means any item in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department classified as evidence, found, safekeeping, or for destruction.

Safekeeping property means any non-evidentiary property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department placed into temporary custody on behalf of a known owner.

Unclaimed disposable property means any disposable property in the possession of the Anchorage Police Department that is not claimed by, or timely retrieved after, the disposition deadline date.

Vehicle means any motor vehicle, motorcycle, motor-driven cycle, snow machine, all terrain vehicle, or any classification of trailer. Motor assisted bicycles, battery operated toys, or machines designed as children's toys, are not considered a vehicle.

Weapon means any item traditionally used as a weapon, except firearms, and includes a chemical dispensing device, bow, club, baton, crossbow, knife, metal knuckles, martial arts weapon, or a gun which uses compressed air to deliver a pellet, BB, paintball or similar projectile, or any explosive component or destructive device.

### 7.25.010 Disposable property.

- A. Except as otherwise required by law, the following property in possession of the Anchorage Police Department is disposable property and shall be disposed of as provided for in this chapter:
  - 1. Evidence which is no longer required for purposes of investigation or presentation and has been retained for 30 days after the final judicial, quasi-judicial or adjudicatory disposition date;
  - 2. Safekeeping property that has not been claimed by the owner within 15

- days after being acquired by the Anchorage Police Department;
- Found property, excluding bicycles, that has not been claimed by the owner within 15 days after being acquired by the Anchorage Police Department; and
- 4. Found bicycles that have not been claimed by the owner within ten days after being acquired by the Anchorage Police Department.
- B. The following property in possession of the Anchorage Police Department is not subject to the retention periods in subsection A:
  - 1. Property voluntarily submitted to the Anchorage Police Department by the owner for the purposes of disposal or destruction; or
  - 2. Found contraband; or
  - 3. Dangerous or perishable property.

# 7.25.015 Notice of possession.

- A. The Anchorage Police Department shall make an attempt by any reasonable method to identify and notify the last known owner. In the event the owner does not claim the property, a notice of possession shall be sent to the owner and to any finder of found property in the following manner:
  - 1. Certified mail, return receipt requested; or
  - Fax, if it is determined that the owner or any finder is currently incarcerated in a correctional facility that prohibits acceptance of certified mail on behalf of an inmate. A fax transmission receipt report shall constitute sufficient verification of receipt of the notice.
- B. The notice of possession shall contain the following information:
  - 1. Date of the notice of possession;
  - 2. Disposition deadline date;
  - 3. Notice of disposable property tracking number for each property item;
  - General description of each property item;
  - 5. Explanation of procedures for owner and any finder to claim and retrieve property;
  - 6. Provision that the owner or any finder shall be required to sign an indemnity, defend and hold harmless release;
  - 7. Provision that any reimbursement fee shall be required to be paid at the time the property item is retrieved;
  - 8. Provision that any owner or finder shall forfeit to the municipality any and all rights, titles, claims or ownership interests in any disposable property not timely claimed or retrieved; and

9. Provision that property forfeited to the municipality shall be disposed of by any means as provided in this chapter and Title 7, with any net proceeds deposited into the Anchorage Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund.

## 7.25.020 Notice of disposable property.

- A. The Anchorage Police Department shall prepare a notice of disposable property after an accumulation of disposable property or as deemed necessary. An itemized list of the disposable property contained in each notice shall be forwarded to the purchasing officer.
- B. The purchasing officer shall publish in a newspaper of general circulation within the municipality for four non-consecutive days each calendar month the locations, including any website addresses, where the public can find the current listing(s) of disposable property as provided for in subsection A.
- C. Each posting of a notice of disposable property shall contain the following information:
  - 1. Posted date of the notice of disposable property:
  - Disposition deadline date;
  - 3. Notice of disposable property tracking number for each property item;
  - 4. General description for each property item;
  - 5. Provision that the owner has a priority claim over any finder regarding found property;
  - 6. Provision that the owner shall contact the Anchorage Police Department before the disposition deadline date to claim the property:
  - 7. Provision that any finder shall submit a letter claiming an interest in a disposable property item to the chief of police that is postmarked, electronically dated, or hand-delivered before the disposition deadline date. The letter shall include the finder's name, mailing address, contact phone number during normal business hours, notice of disposable property tracking number, and a brief description of each claimed property item;
  - 8. Provision that the owner or any finder shall contact the Anchorage Police Department and arrange for retrieval of claimed property within 15 days after the disposition deadline date;
  - 9. Provision that the owner or any finder shall be required to sign an indemnity, defend and hold harmless release;
  - 10. Provision that any owner or finder shall forfeit to the municipality any and all rights, titles, claims or ownership interests in any disposable property that is not timely claimed or retrieved; and

- 11. Provision that any and all disposable property forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage shall be disposed of by any means provided in this chapter.
- D. The notice requirements in subsection's A. through C. do not apply to disposable property subject to destruction under Section 7.25.060 or forfeited by a court or plea bargain agreement.

## 7.25.030 Disposition of disposable property.

- A. Disposable property shall be returned to any owner if claimed and retrieved within the time periods established in 7.25.010 and according to the procedures in Sections 7.25.015 and 7.25.020, unless the property is subject to forfeiture, unlawful to possess, subject to destruction, or its release is otherwise prohibited by this chapter or federal, state, or other municipal laws.
- B. Disposable found property, except bicycles, that is not claimed and retrieved by the owner within the time periods and according to the procedures in Sections 7.25.015 and 7.25.020, shall be returned to the finder, unless the property is subject to forfeiture, unlawful to possess, subject to destruction, or its release is otherwise prohibited by this chapter or federal, state, or other municipal laws.
- C. All disposable property in subsection A or B that is not released to the owner or any finder within the time periods and after the notification requirements established by this chapter, and any found bicycles not claimed by the owner, shall be forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage as unclaimed disposable property.

### 7.25.035 Disposition of unclaimed disposable property.

- A. The purchasing officer shall authorize the disposition of unclaimed disposable property in one of the following manners:
  - All unclaimed disposable property, excluding money, collectible items, and property items subject to destruction under Section 7.25.060, shall be subject to a claim by the chief of police for retention, use, trade or bartering in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.
  - 2. All unclaimed disposable property, not claimed by the chief of police, may be disposed of by the purchasing officer through any means, including sale trade or bartering in accordance with this chapter and the provisions of Title 7, or donation to a community based non-profit organization through an agreement or contract, except:
    - a. As otherwise provided for in Section 7.25.060;
    - b. Money, which shall be given to the municipal treasurer for deposit into the Anchorage Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund;
    - c. Money determined to be a collectible item, may be deposited directly into the Anchorage Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund or disposed of by sale in accordance with the provisions of this

section; or

- d. Except as provided in subsection e. below, firearms shall be sold to the highest bidder at a public auction through an auctioneer certified as a federally licensed firearms dealer.
- e. If state or federal law prohibits the sale of a firearm, such firearm shall be disposed of either by:
  - 1. Sale to a firearms dealer with an appropriate federal licensee, or
  - Dismantling the firearm, destroying parts causing the sale to be prohibited, and disposing of the remaining parts of the firearm at a public auction pursuant to subsection d. above.
- B. Any unclaimed disposable property claimed by the chief of police under the provisions in subsection A.1., and upon approval by the purchasing officer, may be used for:
  - 1. Anchorage Police Department use, issue, training, or parts; or
  - 2. Any municipal use that serves the public interest; or
  - 3. Trade or barter when the unclaimed disposable property is a weapon or firearm, through the purchasing officer with a federally licensed firearms dealer or gun manufacturer for the purchase or acquisition of weapons, firearms, police equipment, or firearm related parts or accessories for use by the Anchorage Police Department.

### 7.25.050 Reimbursement of fees.

- A. At the time disposable property is being retrieved by any owner or finder, and before shipping any disposable property, the chief of police shall require a reimbursement fee pursuant to subsection B. from the person receiving the disposable property.
- B. A reimbursement fee may include costs of any notice, publication, storage, postage, shipping, any other cost or handling expense related to a disposable property item.
- C. The chief of police may waive a reimbursement fee for good cause.
- D. Any collected reimbursement fee shall be deposited into the Anchorage

Metropolitan Police Service Area Fund.

## 7.25.060 Disposition of destructible property.

- A. The following types of disposable property may be destroyed by any lawful means in accordance with the provisions of this chapter:
  - 1. Property acquired under subSection 7.25.010B.;
  - 2. Property ordered to be destroyed by a court or pursuant to a plea bargain agreement;
  - 3. Property, including money, determined by the Anchorage Police Department to be contaminated, a biohazard, or health hazard;
  - 4. Ammunition, contraband or unclaimed personal property;
  - 5. Property determined by the Anchorage Police Department to be unserviceable, junk, or waste, has insubstantial fair market value, or does not sell at an auction; and
  - 6. Prescription or over-the-counter medication, except that the chief of police may authorize the return of a prescription when there is no evidence of contamination or product tampering and the owner can provide evidence of a valid medical need.
- B. Notwithstanding other provisions of this chapter, firearms or weapons may be destroyed or rendered incapable of use, and then permanently disposed of by any lawful means, when a police department armorer or a United States Department of Treasury Official, inspects, examines or otherwise determines:
  - 1. There is a violation of municipal, state, or federal law, including the Federal Firearms Act, which makes the weapon or firearm not legal for private ownership or possession; or
  - 2. The weapon or firearm is unsafe, a biohazard, or presents an immediate or inherent danger to the public.
- C. Notwithstanding Section 7.25.070, any property that comes into the possession of the Anchorage Police Department that is determined to be dangerous or perishable may be immediately disposed of by any lawful means.

### 7.25.070 Certification of disposition of disposable property.

- A. The municipal internal auditor shall certify the proper disposition of disposable property under this chapter anytime:
  - 1. Disposable property in the form of money is destroyed or forfeited to the Municipality of Anchorage.
  - 2. Disposable property is released to a vendor or a third party contractor for the purposes of barter, sale, trade or donation.

3. Disposable property in the form of drugs or firearms are destroyed. (AO No. 2002-171, § 11, 12-17-02)
