### ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AO No. 2010-25

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 6.40, REPORTS AND AUDITS, TO PROVIDE PROCESS FOR ADMINISTRATION FINANCIAL REPORTS TO THE ASSEMBLY AND AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 1.45.010 TO PROVIDE CIVIL AND CRIMINAL FINES AND PENALTIES FOR INTENTIONAL VIOLATIONS OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CHARTER.

WHEREAS, the Assembly needs timely, accurate, and truthful financial information in order to make fiscal decisions in the best interest of the Municipality;

**WHEREAS**, some financial reports are identified in Code, but many other reports are either needed or are currently available, but have not in the past been routinely submitted to the Assembly;

WHEREAS, as computer systems and other technological advances have improved and will continue to improve the "real time" reporting capabilities of many layers of data, allowing the Assembly to access more detail;

**WHEREAS**, given the ebb and flow of what is of most interest to the Assembly is subject to change to meet present circumstance, it is most helpful to have an annual review;

WHEREAS, within a recent investigation authorized under AR 2009-241, the Municipal Attorney determined, in part, that there were no criminal penalty provisions in the Anchorage Municipal Code applicable to certain violations of the Anchorage Municipal Charter related to reporting to the Assembly; and

WHEREAS, public officials must be held accountable for intentional violations of the rights of citizens protected under Charter, including an expectation of lawful conduct between the executive and legislative branches of municipal government; now, therefore,

## THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

**Section 1.** Anchorage Municipal Code section 6.40.010 is amended to read as follows (the remainder of the section is not affected and therefore not set out):

6.40.010 Accounts[; MONTHLY STATEMENT OF REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES; REPORT OF UNANTICIPATED REVENUE.]

 A. The chief fiscal officer shall install and have supervision over the accounts of all organizational elements of the municipality. Such accounts shall show in detail the financial transactions of all departments. [THE CHIEF FISCAL OFFICER SHALL CAUSE A MONTHLY STATEMENT, IN CONDENSED FORMAT, TO BE PREPARED AND DISTRIBUTED TO THE ASSEMBLY, THE MAYOR AND ALL DEPARTMENT HEADS, SHOWING THE AGGREGATE REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES OF EACH FUND OF THE MUNICIPALITY FOR THE PRECEDING MONTH AS WELL AS THE YEAR-TO-DATE ACCUMULATIVE AMOUNT.]

[B. REVENUE ACCRUING TO THE MUNICIPALITY NOT ANTICIPATED BY THE FISCAL YEAR BUDGET APPROPRIATION SHALL BE REPORTED TO THE ASSEMBLY AT LEAST QUARTERLY.]

(GAAB 9.15.070, 9.20.050, 9.20.110; AO 92-148)

<u>Section 2.</u> Anchorage Municipal Code chapter 6.40 is amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

#### 6.40.015 Reports.

A. The chief fiscal officer shall provide financial reporting on a monthly basis to the Assembly, with an executive summary. On a quarterly basis, monthly reporting shall include the additional reporting requested by the assembly.

B. At the last Assembly meeting prior to June 30 of each year, the Mayor shall identify by Assembly Memorandum the financial reports proposed for inclusion in the monthly financial reporting to be provided to the Assembly by the chief fiscal officer for the next 12 months including identification of the frequency, data, and format of the reports. This section does not apply to reports required by other provisions of the Charter or this Code. In the event an Assembly Memorandum governing these reports is not approved by June 30, the Mayor's proposal shall be in effect until superseded by assembly action.

C. Financial reporting under this section shall include an executive summary in the transmittal Assembly Information Memorandum.

D. Reported positive or negative variances of 5% or more for expenses by department and 1% or more for revenues in aggregate for all general government funds within the one hundred series of accounts shall be noted with specificity in the executive summary. Failure to note variances in the executive summary shall not constitute a violation of the Charter or this Code.

E. Upon the request of three or more Assembly members after receipt of reported positive or negative variances of 5% or more for expenses by department or a 1% or more for revenues in aggregate for all general government funds within the one hundred series of accounts, the public shall be given notice and an opportunity to provide comment.

 F. The mayor shall notify the assembly in writing within 21 days if a projected revenue shortfall in aggregate exceeds 1% of the total General Government Operating Budget. The notice shall be delivered to the municipal clerk's office for distribution to the assembly.

Section 4. Anchorage Municipal Code section 1.45.010 is amended to read as follows:

## 1.45.010 General penalties.

- A. Every act prohibited by <u>Charter or</u> this Code is unlawful. Unless another criminal penalty is expressly provided by this Code for any particular provision or section, every person convicted of a violation of any provision of <u>the Charter</u> or this Code, or any rule or regulation adopted or issued in pursuance thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$2,000.00 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each act of violation and every day upon which any such violation shall occur shall constitute a separate offense.
- B. In addition to any other remedy or penalty provided by this Code, any person who violates any provision of the Charter or this Code or any rule, regulation, permit, variance, code of technical regulation or order issued or adopted pursuant to the Charter or this Code shall be subject to a civil penalty as set forth in Section 14.60.030, or, if such violation is not listed in the fine schedule set forth in Section 14.60.030, a civil penalty of not less than \$50.00 and not more than \$1,000.00 for each offense or injunctive relief to restrain the person from continuing the violation or threat of violation or both injunctive relief and a civil penalty. Upon application for injunctive relief and a finding that a person is violating or threatening to violate any provision of the Charter or this Code or any rule, regulation, permit, variance, code of technical regulation or order issued or adopted pursuant to the Charter or this Code, the superior court shall grant injunctive relief to restrain the violation.
- C. Each day of violation of any provision of <u>the Charter or</u> this Code or any rule, regulation, permit, variance, code of technical regulation or order issued or adopted pursuant to <u>the Charter or</u> this Code shall constitute a separate offense.
- D. The penalties provided by this section shall, unless another penalty is

expressly provided, apply to the amendment of any section of the Charter or this Code, whether or not such penalty is reenacted in the amendatory ordinance. (CAC 1.16.010; AO No. 80-131; AO No. 93-167(S-1), § 3, 4-13-94; AO No. 2003-73, § 1, 4-22-03; AO 2010-\_\_\_, ) Section 5. Anchorage Municipal Code section 1.45.020 is amended to read as follows: 1.45.020 Aiding or abetting violation. The prohibition of any act in the Charter or this Code, and in any rule or regulation adopted under the Charter or this Code, shall include the causing, securing, aiding or abetting of another person to do such act. (CAC 1.16.040; AO 2010-\_\_\_\_,) Section 6. Anchorage Municipal Code section 1.45.030 is amended to read as follows: 1.45.030 Peace officers. The mayor may designate in writing as peace officers those persons authorized to enforce any part of the Charter or this Code. Any person so designated to enforce and protect the public peace shall be authorized to issue citations for any misdemeanor, infraction or other violation of the Charter or this Code in the manner provided by AS 12.25.180--12.25.230. Peace officers appointed under the authority of this section shall not have the general authority of police officers. (AO No. 80-131; AO 2010- \_) This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage and Section 7. approval. PASSED AND APPROVED by the Anchorage Assembly this 33d day of Mark , 2010. Subject: AO 2010-25 — AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 6.40, REPORTS AND AUDITS, TO PROVIDE PROCESS FOR ADMINISTRATION FINANCIAL REPORTS TO THE ASSEMBLY AND AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 1.45.010 TO PROVIDE CIVIL AND CRIMINAL FINES AND PENALTIES FOR INTENTIONAL VIOLATIONS OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CHARTER.

Charter § 13.06 provides that if the Mayor determines that revenues will be less than appropriations for the fiscal year, the Mayor shall so report to the Assembly. AO 2010-25 establishes reasonable requirements for the Mayor to make reports to the Assembly during times of unplanned revenue shortfalls, and standardizes the list of monthly financial reports provided to the Assembly.

With respect to the forecast of revenue shortfalls to the General Government Operating Budget, the ordinance requires the Mayor to report to the Assembly within 21 days when the anticipated revenue loss is greater than 1% of the General Operating Budget for the current fiscal year. An anticipated revenue loss greater than 1% is significant enough to trigger potential spending reductions to keep the city budget balanced. In contrast, ongoing market fluctuations are to be expected and may cause interim forecasts of more minor revenue shortfalls, under 1% of the General Government Operating Budget. The expectation is that the more minor fluctuations, under 1% of the General Government Operating Budget, are manageable within any Administration's budget

Under the proposed ordinance, the Mayor, through the Chief Financial Officer, will submit a single Assembly Informational Memorandum (AIM) monthly to the Assembly, to include all of the monthly financial reports, and any of the quarterly reports due that month. The monthly AIM will include an Executive Summary that 1) highlights the significant financial events and issues currently facing the municipality and 2) provides an index to the reports included within the AIM.

Historically, the list of monthly and quarterly reports required by the Assembly has varied with the financial circumstances of the Municipality, and requests by the Assembly. The proposed ordinance provides a mechanism to formalize the process: Annually, the Mayor will propose a list of the monthly and quarterly reports to be included in the monthly AIM, subject to Assembly approval.

AO 2010-25 also includes provision for civil and criminal fines and penalties for intentional violations of the Anchorage Municipal Charter, as recommended by the Municipal Attorney.
