A RESOLUTION OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY RECOGNIZING AND REMEMBERING ALASKA PIONEER AND COMMUNITY ACTIVIST: GRADY WARD.

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2010, Grady Ward, a founding member of the Fairview Community Council and Fairview Community Patrol, died at the age of 85; and

WHEREAS, Grady Ward was born on December 29, 1924 in rural east Texas; and

WHEREAS, in 1949, Grady Ward headed north to Anchorage, Alaska to make a future in "The Last Frontier"; and

WHEREAS, as one of Alaska's first African-American pioneers, Grady Ward found no one willing to rent him a room in a boardinghouse, so he lived in a tent on the Ship Creek rail yard for over two-and-a-half years while working as a welder for the Alaska Railroad; and

WHEREAS, as a laborer, welder and carpenter, Grady Ward was a member of Carpenter's Local Union 1281 and worked for 52 years on numerous local construction projects including the Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport, JC Penney, Nordstrom, Fifth Avenue Mall, Providence and Alaska Regional Hospitals, Captain Cook Hotel, and projects on Elmendorf Air Force Base and Fort Richardson; and

WHEREAS, in 1976, Grady Ward helped found the Fairview Community Council; and

WHEREAS, in the 1970s and 1980s, Grady Ward worked tirelessly with Fairview residents, with the Anchorage Police Department, and with former Mayor George Sullivan to improve the quality of life in the Fairview community; and

WHEREAS, Grady Ward, also a founding member of the Fairview Community Patrol, spent many nights patrolling the streets of Fairview making it safer for families; and

WHEREAS, Grady Ward was instrumental in obtaining traffic signals, school crossings, speed limit and "drug-free community" signs throughout Fairview which make for a safer community today; and

WHEREAS, a friend recently described Grady Ward as a Fairview community legend whose vigilance and dedication increased awareness of one's responsibility to oversee and to actively engage in maintaining the safety of one's community; and

 WHEREAS, Grady Ward was friend to many of Alaska's pioneers including former Senator Ted Stevens, former Governor Bill Egan, and former Mayor George Sullivan; and

WHEREAS, over the years, Grady Ward worked closely with the Alaska State Legislature including Senator Johnny Ellis, his neighbor and fellow Fairview Community Council member, and Senator Bettye Davis; and

WHEREAS, true of many unsung heroes, Grady Ward did not seek the limelight, but was more concerned about making a difference in his neighborhood, community and state; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Anchorage and Fairview community are indebted to Grady Ward for his community service;

for his passion and commitment to the Fairview community, pioneer spirit, and fortitude in meeting the challenges of "The Last Frontier."
