Meeting Minutes December 5, 2024



1. <u>Call to Order</u>: The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Pamela Schamber.

2. Minutes from October 24, 2024:

5. Standing Reports:

Anchorage Animal Care Control (AACC) Monthly Report and Public Outreach

Melissa Summerfield Reported:

Animal Intake:

 Seasonal increase in animals during the holiday season noted; current situation remains manageable.

Adoptions:

 Slowed in November but expected to rise towards the end of the year, aligning with holiday and new year trends.

Enforcement Activity Overview:

Seasonal Concerns:

- o Increased reports of animals left in vehicles during cold weather.
- o Staff reminded to use updated check sheets and tools implemented this year.

Case Updates

1. Two Dogs Cruelty Case:

- o Case dissolved in November; no charges filed.
- Owners could not pay claim fees; dogs became MOA property.

2. Horse Case:

- Ongoing; recent court date occurred, awaiting updates.
- Checked the horses at the beginning of winter and they are showing significant improvement, with their weight increasing, thrush healed, and mites under control, while thriving on a family farm with ample space to roam and regular positive human interaction supporting their well-being.

3. Vehicle Fire Incident:

- o Details:
 - 11 adult dogs and a litter of puppies involved.
 - Five dogs deceased; remaining animals taken to animal control.
- Investigation:
 - Cause of fire under investigation.
 - Findings submitted to APD for potential neglect or cruelty charges.

Case History

Background:

- Individual relocated to Anchorage in May 2024 after having 50 German Shepherds seized in Matsu with no charges filed.
- Eight reports filed since May, including five welfare concerns.

Key Interactions with Animal Control:

- o May:
 - Educated on sanitation and welfare, no immediate concerns.
- July:
 - Claimed a stray dog; vehicle inspected.
 - Issued notice to comply with special purpose licensing.

o August:

Limited enforcement jurisdiction due to Matsu residency.

September-October:

 Two welfare cases reported; individual could not be located before the fire incident.

Key Takeaways

- Enforcement actions were appropriate given legal limitations.
- Some areas for process improvement identified but unlikely to have changed outcomes.

Joel Jorgensen Reported: Public Outreach:

Adoptions:

 Slowed in November but expected to surge in December due to increased online interest.

• Community Support:

- Strong community involvement, even during negative publicity, demonstrates ongoing support.
- Alaska Mill & Feed donated a pallet of dog food for the pet food pantry.
- Public engagement increased after the bunny overpopulation issue at Aquarian Charter School, with residents reaching out about humane trapping and care.

Donations:

- Petco donated toys, Fred Meyer donated 1,000+ pounds of food, and individuals brought in supplies for shelter animals.
- Donations have been particularly helpful during the holiday season and periods of lower adoptions.

Programs:

- SOT Program: Seward Correctional Facility program approved; first dog transfer underway.
- Focuses on training and care for long-stay shelter animals, reducing kennel time and improving adoption readiness.

Volunteers:

 Volunteers are highly supportive, spreading positive messages about the shelter's efforts.

Public Sentiment:

 Despite occasional negative cases in the media, the community overwhelmingly supports shelter initiatives and recognizes staff dedication to animal care.

7. AHD Staff Reports:

Tamiah Liebersbach - Reported:

Board Vacancies

- Several positions remain open; applicants are awaiting review by the mayor's office.
- Board members with expired terms continue to serve under code while reappointments are processed.

Horse Case Civil Suit

- A lawsuit was filed to recover \$127,000 in care costs as of November.
- The defendant's counsel requested two deadline extensions but has not responded.
- A request for a default judgment in favor of the municipality has been filed.

City Budget Process

- Savings from staff vacancies will allow re-appropriation of \$100,000 to a capital account.
- Funds will be used to develop building blueprints, a key step for facility enhancements.

Resolution and Initial Plan Summary

• Starting Point:

 The resolution provides an opportunity to address facility and operational improvements.

• Subject Matter Expert Assessment:

- Hire an external expert organization to assess facility needs, staffing capacity, and gaps based on community size, geography, and pet population.
- o Include a staffing study as part of the assessment.
- Use organizations with expertise in animal shelters to ensure credibility and best practices.

• Facility Needs Assessment:

- Evaluate whether the current facility can be expanded or requires replacement.
- Maintenance and Operations recommend replacing the facility due to infrastructure challenges, including plumbing issues.
- o Findings will inform a capital project plan for facility upgrades.

• No-Kill Shelter Clarification:

- Shelter follows best practices by the Association of Shelter Veterinary Medicine, not a "no-kill" model.
- The term "no-kill" lacks a uniform definition and is being phased out in the field.
- Data shows live release rates have improved over time, reflecting enhanced care capacity.

Animal Cruelty Code Review:

- Form a team with APD, legal representatives, and prosecutors to review Title 8.55.
- Address gaps in enforcement, training, and prosecution.
- Identify challenges, including limited resources and the prioritization of animal cruelty cases.

Incident Review:

- o Commission a third-party review of the incident involving Mr. Braden.
- Use findings to inform the 120-day report and process improvements.

• Public-Private Partnerships:

Explore partnerships with corporate donors or foundations to supplement

taxpayer funding for facility upgrades.

• Quality Improvement Focus:

- Commit to continuous improvement based on guidelines from the Association of Shelter Veterinary Medicine.
- o Identify areas for enhancement within the constraints of available resources.

• 120-Day Plan:

- Develop a detailed plan within 120 days, addressing facility needs, funding strategies, and operational improvements.
- The plan will outline steps and priorities for implementation.

Facility Assessment:

• Enhancement vs. New Construction:

- Two options are under consideration:
 - A comprehensive enhancement of the existing facility.
 - Designing and constructing a new, purpose-built facility that meets current standards.
- The Maintenance and Operations Department suggests that if significant funds are to be invested, building a new facility may be more cost-effective and better suited to meet modern requirements.

• Starting Point:

 The resolution provides an opportunity to address facility and operational improvements.

Facility Considerations:

Municipal Budget Constraints:

- Given the municipality's limited budget and multiple funding priorities, securing approval for a new facility may be challenging.
- The Maintenance and Operations Department suggests that if significant funds are to be invested, building a new facility may be more cost-effective and better suited to meet modern requirements.

Public Support and Funding:

- o Proposing a capital bond for a new facility would require voter approval.
- Public support may be attainable, especially considering the aging state of the current facility and the substantial funds needed to upgrade it to meet present-day standards.

Next Steps:

 Ongoing studies and assessments will provide critical data to inform the decisionmaking process regarding whether to enhance the existing facility or pursue new construction.
