MERRILL MENTIONABLES

One thing that is on everyone's mind... Runway 7/25 (soon to be 8/26) rehabilitation project is scheduled for summer of 2025. The design is complete, the bid awarded to Quality Asphalt and Paving (QAP), and funding appropriated. Soon, there will be several informational meetings held to ensure everyone is kept informed and has their questions answered.

This project will require closure of runway 7/25, but access to runways 16/34 and 5/23 will be maintained throughout the project. Expect ground work to begin in June, and significant completion 60 days later. MRI staff, our engineering firm, HDL and QAP will do everything humanly possible to ensure the runway closure is kept to a minimum.

SHOP TALK FROM AIRFIELD MAINTENANCE


Despite facing unexpected staffing challenges, our dedicated team at Merrill Field has been working tirelessly to ensure the safety and smooth operation of our runways and taxiways during the ongoing winter conditions. Managing snow and ice on an airport scale with only three operators covering 7 days a week requires precision, coordination, and relentless effort.

In these demanding times, we've implemented strategic approaches to maximize our resources, including optimized schedules, cross-training staff, and enhanced use of equipment. Our priority remains clear: to maintain safe conditions for all aircraft and passengers, while being fiscally responsible.

We thank you for your patience and understanding as we navigate this winter season together. Your safety is our top commitment, and we remain steadfast in our efforts to keep flights operating as smoothly as possible.

Stay safe and stay warm. And remember your snow pile is on the list!





Since we are in the winter season, we would like to provide everyone with some tips for how operations change once the snow starts falling.

- ★ Our first priority is assisting Airport Maintenance in getting the runways and taxiways open as quickly as possible. This may mean restricting the availability of touch-and-goes, use of non-standard runway configurations, or delays in arrivals or departures.
- ★ Be prepared for runway and taxiway closures, and aware of berms and other hazards during the snow removal process. Check NOTAMS before every flight and listen carefully to clearances you may be given a taxi route different than you are used to. When landing, some taxiways may be closed; listen carefully to exiting instructions from the controller.
- ★ The snow and darkness create a lack of contrast making runways and taxiways harder to see; verify you have the correct surface positively in sight ask the tower to turn up the lights if needed especially on the gravel ski strip.
- ★ Aircraft on final to runway 25 are very hard for us (and other aircraft) to see in front of the snow covered mountains; please turn on all of your lights, even in the daytime.
