Girdwood Valley Service Area Parks & Recreation Non-Profit Recreation Organization Grant Funding Program

The Girdwood Parks and Recreation Department strives to ensure that comprehensive and diverse recreation programs and activities are made available to the community. The objective of this grant program is to use tax funds collected in the Girdwood Valley Service Area (GVSA) to assist in providing a variety of quality recreation projects.

How do we define recreation?

Recreation: Consists of leisure time activities that contribute to healthful living.

Enhances participation and skill-building. Instills positive personality characteristics.

Expands one's interests and increases quality of life.

Eligible projects fall into one or more of the following categories:

- I. Enable community members of Girdwood to participate in recreation activities. Grant funds will be specifically used to:
 - A. Provide scholarships to individuals, or
 - B. Directly result in a quantifiable fee reduction to the participant.
- II. Expand existing recreational opportunities. The grant funded project will fill a need in the community that:
 - A. Cannot be met by the Municipality as effectively or efficiently, or
 - B. Is not currently being met by another agency in the community.
- III. Foster new, innovative, unique projects. The grant funds will:
 - A. Provide seed money for new projects not currently available in the GVSA
 - B. Provide special recreational opportunity for the community

Restrictions on this Funding:

Below is a list of key restrictive parameters on funding, other restrictions may apply:

- I. The organization must have obtained 501(c)3, 501(c)4 or 501(c)19 status as verified by a formal determination letter from the IRS. Applicants may also be fiscally sponsored projects, as long as the fiscal sponsor has a 501(c)3, 501(c)4 or 501(c)19 status. Grantee is responsible for completion of all requirements under this contract. Informal associations are not eligible for grants.
- II. The organization must have been in operation in the GVSA for at least one year prior to application.
- III. There are no guarantees of annual funding.
- IV. This grant funding is subject to the availability of funds lawfully appropriated for disbursement.
- V. The intent is to supplement the project, not to fund the project in total. It should be noted that funding is provided, in full, within a reasonable period upon execution of the contract.
- VI. Grants are for direct project expenses only, such as supplies, equipment or facility rental for project activities, project staff wages (to a limited degree), project travel expenses within the Anchorage area, etc.

- VII. Grant funds <u>may not be used for general operating or administrative expenses of your organization</u>, such as administrative personnel expenses, non-project space rent or utility costs, liability insurance, office supplies, audit or legal fees, fund-raising expense, etc.
- VIII. Recreation programming is the goal; grant funds are not to be used for construction activities or capital equipment, lobbying, or any political activity.

Insurance Requirements for grant recipients:

I. Certificate of Insurance naming the Municipality of Anchorage as Additional Insured and Waiver of Subrogation must be in effect during the entire contract period. Additionally, programs that work with youth or other at-risk populations are required to carry sexual molestation coverage.

- 2 Commercial Automobile Liability per occurrence in the amount of \$500,000 single limit to include: owned, hired and non-owned.
- 3 Comprehensive General Liability in the amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit to include:
 - a. Premises operations
 - b. Products and completed operations
 - c. Blanket contractual
 - d. Broad form property damage
 - e. Independent contractors
 - f. Personal injury coverage
- II. Each policy of insurance required by this section shall provide or a faxed copy of insured's cancellation notice, within two (2) business days of receipt, to the Municipality of Anchorage.
- III. With the exception of Worker's Compensation, each policy shall name the Municipality of Anchorage as an additional insured and the actual policy endorsement shall accompany each Certificate of Insurance.
- IV. General liability and Automobile policies shall be endorsed to waive all rights of subrogation against the Municipality of Anchorage by reason of any payment made of claims under the above coverage. This policy endorsement should accompany each Certificate of Insurance.

 Challenge Alaska Girdwood provides Adaptive Sports and Therapeutic Recreation, including, but not limited to, Adaptive Ski and Snowboard programs for People with Disabilities. Challenge Alaska improves the lives of individuals with disabilities and their families by providing equal access to sports and recreation. Through progam participation, individuals with disabilities have increased health and fitness, learn lifelong skills for healthy living, increase socialization, as well as improved mobility, flexibility and strength. The facility hosts the Girdwood Fine Arts Camp each summer as well as other community events and gatherings such as Community Schools programming, weddings, retirement parties, memorial services etc. The Keil Center provides an opportunity for Girdwood residents to learn about disabilities and become skilled in adaptive ski and snowboard instruction. Finally, this facility and its programs assist the Municipality in fulfilling its ADA requirements under the federal law.

Challenge Alaska is one of the limited facilities its size in the community where programs can be offered. In addition it is the only organization in Girdwood which provides sports and recreation programs specifically for individuals with disabilities. The Challenge Alaska Girdwood program enhances the entire community through disability awareness and education as well as providing one of a very few fully accessible facilities in Girdwood large enough to host community events such as the Girdwood Fine Arts Camp, memorial services, and other community events. Challenge Alaska uses the funds requested to scholarship participants both directly and indirectly through reduced facility use costs. Challenge Alaska historically subsidizes participants and organizations at twice the amount it receives from the non-profit recreation grant.

This request is for \$10,000 and last year Challenge Alaska provided \$32,000 in scholarships to individuals and subsidies to Girdwood based groups such as Girdwood Fine Arts Camp, Alyeska Ski Patrol, etc.

Challenge Alaska was founded in 1980 and incorporated in 1981 by Douglas Keil and other individuals dedicated to providing sports and recreation opportunities for people with disabilities. Mr. Keil was electrocuted at age 14, and as a result his left arm and leg were amputated. After struggling for years with depression resulting in drug and alcohol abuse, in 1975 Doug visited Winter Park, Colorado, which turned his life around. After winning two Gold Medals in Norway with the US Disabled Alpine Ski Team, Doug was determined to bring those same opportunities to the disabled community of Alaska and in 1980 Challenge Alaska was born Challenge Alaska has a long history with Girdwood Parks and Recreation grants. We strive to be a valued member of the Girdwood community, and to help all residents and organizations within Girdwood thrive.

Girdwood Summer Fine Arts Camp is a 2 week day camp. typically broken into 3 sections, the Art Camp employs artists to teach students from Girdwood and Anchorage. This year we are continuing our our teen leadership apprentice program.

The primary goal of the Art Camp is to provide a quality enrichment fine arts program to youth in the Girdwood valley.

Our objectives are

- 1) to create a safe and stimulating learning environment for all our participants;
- 2) to offer quality professional fine arts instruction in a variety of disciplines to youth 5-14 yrs old;

Daily evaluations by directors, staff (including apprentices), and art instructors occur during morning set up and lunch meetings each day. Directors keep notes on feedback and suggestions for the future, as well as use feedback immediately in the steering of the current program. We ask teaching artists to give feedback on their experiences and what they might do differently next time. Further, we solicit feedback from students and parents through verbal conversations and invitations to contact us by email or social media. We keep an active Facebook page where families can reach us by messages or comments. Following the show of student works, art camp staff has a meeting to discuss the successes and any areas of improvements for the next camp.

A few of our evaluation metrics: full enrollments in all camp sessions that we observe year after year; number of sibling and need scholarships utilized by families; full apprentice crew and their post-camp evaluations.

3. Describe why the project to be funded under this proposal is needed and how it will benefit the community. Is this a new or existing project? Is there unmet need or population that will be served with this project?

Girdwood Fine Arts Camp is an existing, long-established program that provides creative opportunities for the children of Girdwood and beyond. As funding for arts in public schools continues to recede, the need for art programs grows. Further, given Girdwood's relatively remote location and its distance from Anchorage, the closest urban center, there is a need for locally available enrichment opportunities. Our camps are almost always at full enrollment, often with a waitlist, which illustrates the need for the program.

The Girdwood Fine Arts Camp has also had a more general and long term significance in Girdwood. The camp has had almost 5,000 students in its 40 seasons and has employed hundreds of artist instructors. Each one of these students and instructors carries forward the enthusiastic art experience that is the hallmark of the Girdwood Fine Arts Camp. Many previous campers have also returned to teach, one of which is presently a director of the camp. Arts Camp volunteers are proud of service and return every year. Arts Camp has been in Girdwood long enough to start to have its contribution to the establishment of Girdwood's reputation as an arts community taken for granted. And even as the number of artists in Girdwood has increased, the camp has strived to bring in new and unique artists each year, exposing the youth, of what could otherwise be seen as a relatively isolated community, to new ideas and art experiences of the highest caliber. This buy-in demonstrates to us that the camp is valuable to the community.

4. Provide a brief history of your organization, especially as it relates to Girdwood Parks and Recreation.

Girdwood Fine Arts Camp is in its 41st consecutive year in 2026. Begun by Tommy O'Malley and Annie Olson in 1986, it has been annual since. It is anticipated by many families and children in the community for the cultural and recreational enrichment it provides.

5. Explain how the proposed project meets the definition of recreation stated in the information packet.

Participation in the arts contributes to individual and community well-being through instilling positive character traits, such as respect for peers (as well as adults) and openness to multiple ways of doing things. It expands participants' interests and increases quality of life by fostering appreciation for the arts, both that which they make and that of others. Participation in the arts enhances social-emotional well-being and enhances intelligence, fostering healthy living. Our students participate in an atmosphere of respect, collaboration, and critical thinking. Students build important lessons in taking responsibility and supporting others.

We have increased our request amount to help make up for any increase in space costs resulting from the temporary necessity to find a new location.

Some camp activities will take place around town. For instance we paint a biannual mural at Forrest Fair Park.

The staff will be required to teach more and we will be able to hire fewer professional artists.

While the quality of artistic instruction would still be good, some of the characteristics that make this camp so special would diminish in that there would be less exposure to variety among instructors and media. Hiring artists keeps it fresh and new and unique. We also would risk burnout among the staff.

We have some funding saved for making up for years where we do not receive the amount of funding necessary to run the program. In the case that we do not receive full funding, we may need to draw on this safety net.

BOS funding provides sibling scholarships (free camp participation for a sibling of a registered child) and salaries for the 5-7 teenage apprentices (\$500 each on average), as well as covers some of the operational costs. We continue to seek other sources of funding, in addition to applying for the Parks and Recreation grants We do not wish to raise tuition as we feel it would make the program inaccessible to too many people.

This program is the operation of the only local community FM radio station in Glacier Valley/Turnagain Arm. It is non-commercial and is run by volunteers, from management to programming. It provides over 38,000 hours a year of recreational opportunities for people in our facilities, in a diverse communication, audio, music, computer, library, research, skill building, analog, digital and electronic operating environment. The primary goals and objectives are 1) Provide a public safety net in times of emergencies. 2) Encourage residents of all ages to become volunteer/program hosts and use their recreational time to expand their interest in radio, providing educational, recreational, and music programming for the recreational listeners of Girdwood.

3) Provide all residents of the Girdwood community with the ability to listen to quality radio programs amongst their leisure time recreational activities.

- 2. What evaluation criteria will be used to determine if goals and objectives have been met? This existing program falls under category II of the "Eligible Programs" descriptions: "This grant funded program fills a need in the community that both A) Can't be met by the Municipality as effectively or efficiently, and B) Is not currently being met by another agency in the community." Radio is immediate. It is the only medium that provides fast networking, messaging, communications, and interaction to thousands of people through a free ubiquitous medium. Local on-air personalities strengthen the sense of community with information on public issues including broadcasts of the GBOS meetings, community fundraisers, meetings, organizing, and events. KEUL broadcasts discussions with the community and community leaders, and produces special events. It is also a community recreational resource, providing programs of varied interests for recreational listening and for the recreational activity of radio program hosts. It will continue an existing recreational program. This station is seen as the heartbeat of Glacier Valley. More than any other program, we represent our community to the rest of the state. We are a public safety net in times of emergencies with road information, child abduction alerts, lost and found animals, bear and moose sightings, tsunami warnings, and heavy weather alerts. Some of these services you won't receive anywhere else. There are no other local broadcast facilities to disseminate information. This program is needed because these services can't be met by the Municipality and are not currently being met by any other agency in the community.
- 4. **Provide a brief history of your organization, especially as it relates to Girdwood Parks and Recreation:** Formed in the late 1940s, the club has initiated, contributed to, and by deed and action promoted community enrichment projects with such firsts as Girdwood's: first school (our current building), fire department, telephone and electrical utilities, library, *community park*, *alpine ski area (we loaned them money for starters)*, produced a theatre group, brought the relay television broadcast system to Turnagain arm, serving Girdwood, and started KEUL FM radio in Glacier Valley.

- 5. **Explain how the proposed project meets the definition of recreation stated in the information packet.** This program meets all the definitions of recreation. *Italicized phrases* throughout this application refer directly to all grant definitions of recreation. We are an eclectic volunteer organization that has, over the years, included parents, children, members, librarians, bankers, teachers, construction, middle & high school and college students, drop-outs, hotel & restaurant employees, electrical & electronic technicians, radio & television station owners, lift operators, maintenance workers, municipal, state, and federal employees, internet service providers, webmasters, graphic designers, creek muffins, and tree people.

Radio operations and volunteer training including: Station Manager, Chief Operator, Chief Trainer, Youth in Radio, music acquisition, development, fund-raising, underwriting, radio program hosts, DJs, audio producers, Emergency Broadcast Coordination, radio frequency and audio engineering, computer and internet technicians, artists, and designers.

Without this grant we could not operate or improve this important service which not only provides a sense of community, but also provides a safety net in times of emergencies. Diminished funding would bring us below the value of our past service and harm our commitment to the community. Our program operates at it's intense full-time level 24/7/365. No other program funded by this grant operates at this high level with such a low budget. It is truly a high value return for the money.

Over our years of operation the project manager has been adaptable, working with various levels of project funding, which produced both growth and shrinkage of the project. Adaptation is done through scheduling of equipment maintenance and replacement along with advancing or delaying new purchases.

Many people take radio for granted because it is free and available everywhere. Even with this grant, we are already working at a minimum funding level; maximum support from the Girdwood Board of Supervisors is critical. When we were accepted into the National Federation of Community Broadcasters (NFCB) in 2001, the president of the NFCB board was shocked to hear that our cash flow was merely in the thousands of dollars and declared that we were well below the poverty level for non-commercial radio in America. In the past, stations needed to have 5 full-time employees to receive federal funding and operate with budgets from \$250,000 to millions of dollars yearly. Yet, over 25 years after its inception, Glacier City Radio is a broadcast powerhouse, while still operating with an all-volunteer staff, community support, and a frugal budget.

Glacier City Radio has built a state-of-the-art broadcast facility from studio to transmitter with backup facilities for emergency contingencies. To provide this service without down time, there is a constant need to repair and replace electronic and computer equipment, most of which is specialty for radio broadcast. This grant provides our operational expenses so we can use the monies generated from our program to buy necessary electronic equipment.

Without this grant we could not improve our operations. Over two decades we have progressed literally from 'two turntables and a microphone' with a low-power transmitter in a stuff sack, to an FCC Class A full-power FM broadcast station. This couldn't have happened without the continuing full support of this Parks and Recreation Grant. The original motivating investment of a few hundred dollars and lots of time by many locals has grown that seed into a non-commercial community enterprise, worth half-a-million dollars; one that rivals similar stations throughout the country.

12. Any other comments you would like to make about this program? These programs that we support with our tax dollars are what economists call a public good that provide cheap or free services with *enhancements to the quality of life* for all community members, and need to be supported by the community at large. All of our activities are free/low cost, eliminating the barrier/stigma of class, which essentially scholarships all programs, activities and training. Nationally, other Parks and Rec departments own, operate, and/or support community broadcasters.

Recreation has many faces. It is not only a motor sports activity. It also includes hobbies such as photography, stamp collecting, board games, gold mining, and kite flying. Municipal Recreation Centers support hobbies, board games, and crafts. Dictionary definitions describe recreation as "refreshment of one's mind or body after work through activity that amuses or stimulates." Radio is recreation. Program hosts consider time spent playing music, entertaining, and educating listeners as recreation. The community considers their time spent listening to radio as recreation. Summer and winter outdoor recreationalists and adventurers learn more of their hostile environment through public service announcements, actively reporting on events, and becoming involved in recreational public service activities.

There should be no age or activity preference in determining access to or funding of *recreational programs*. We provide programming for young and old and welcome all ages as volunteers. We will continue to provide an outlet for the creativity and energy of the community. This program is available free to 100% of the community 365 days a year on both the programming and listening end of the radio.

Glacier Valley Transit, Girdwood's public transportation system, is funded by 5311 FTA Rural Transit funds, donations from riders, sponsorships from local businesses & grants from s from the Municipality of Anchorage. The estimated cost of operations in 2026 is \$474326. Public Transportation is vital to Girdwood and enhances the community's safety, access to recreation, employment, tourism and overall economy. GVT operates on a flex route providing reliable and free transportation to Girdwood's residents and visitors. We strive to remain a sustainable organization in the valley.
2. What evaluation criteria will be used to determine if goals and objectives have been met? Be specific. GVT's goal is financial stability through continued growth in ridership and local contributions. In 2025 GVT carried 73007 riders. For the first time in GVT's history, just over 50% of riders were residents. Local riders = 39146; Visitors = 33861 GVT analyzes the budget against actual figures for the fiscal year.

GVT needs the financial support of Girdwood residents and businesses to continue to offer this fare-free service. The Parks and Recreation grant, Municipality funding and local business sponsorships made it possible for GVT to reduce that shortfall significantly. GVT brings visitors and purchasing power to every business in the valley, the economic impact trickles down to all Girdwood residents. As a community, Girdwood strives to become a year round destination; public transportation is needed to reach this goal.

Little Bears Playhouse serves Girdwood, and the surrounding valleys, with an essential need of year-round childcare. Our early learning center is dedicated to providing intentional, and engaging learning experiences for the children enrolled in our center. Funds from this year's grant will be allocated to support the ongoing learning experiences for our students. Our goal this year will be strong introduction to STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics). Our teachers are working to include these focuses in each of their monthly curriculums. Our objective is to create a strong foundation and love for these educational areas of learning.

2. What evaluation criteria will be used to determine if goals and objectives have been met? Be specific.

The evaluation criteria that will be used to determine if goals and objectives have been met are uninterrupted or altered services that will be delivered to our community. Our learning center's goals are assessed annually through a survey given to our members, that allows self-evaluation on how our program is meeting its goals. Our financial objectives are reviewed through our Profit and Loss reports provided at our monthly board meetings, and at our end of the year financial review.

Little Bears Playhouse is the only licensed early learning center within our community and the Turnagain Service Area. Funds from this grant will allow us to continue to provide educational experiences that these children may not normally be exposed to. Currently, the large portion of early learning focuses on social/emotional learning and pre-academics. This focus on STEAM will introduce new concepts and learning experiences that will lay a strong foundation for our children's love of learning. The benefits of STEAM in an early learning environment include: developing problem-solving, promoting collaboration, enhancing critical thinking and logical reasoning.

4. Provide a brief history of your organization, especially as it relates to Girdwood Parks and Recreation.

Little Bears Playhouse has been licensed and operating as a childcare facility since 1982. Our early learning center provides high quality child care for Girdwood and the surrounding valleys. Our facility is currently located in the Girdwood community building, which is managed by the Municipality of Anchorage Parks and Rec Department. Our early learning center gives Girdwood's youngest community members a space to develop fine/gross motor skills, positive peer relationships, and intentional curriculum that is developmentally appropriate, and new experiences that promote healthy living choice.

 Four Valleys Community School (FVCS) delivers year-round recreational, educational, and cultural programs for residents of Girdwood, Bird, Indian, Portage, and Hope. Our offerings span sports, art, cooking, outdoor recreation, wellness, and enrichment activities designed to reflect community interests and needs. FVCS partners with local instructors and outside professionals to create a broad mix of classes, camps, and events. During the school year, programming is focused on after-school and weekend opportunities, while summer brings day camps, evening art events, and outdoor sports. Long-term objectives include maintaining a safe, welcoming space for all ages, ensuring accessible opportunities for families, and continuing traditions like the annual Sport Swap, which makes outdoor gear more affordable for local households.
- 2. What evaluation criteria will be used to determine if goals and objectives have been met? Be specific. FVCS measures success through enrollment numbers, participant engagement, and community feedback. We track referrals of new instructors and classes, as well as attendance at recurring and "pop-up" programs, to assess how well offerings align with community interest. Monthly budget reviews provide additional data on whether enrollment levels support programming or if adjustments are needed. A balance of long-standing, reliable programs and innovative, one-time events ensures that the schedule remains engaging, and high participation in either category signals success.
- 3. Describe why the project to be funded under this proposal is needed and how it will benefit the community. Is this a new or existing project? Are there unmet needs or populations that will be served with this project?Now in its 45th year, FVCS remains the only provider of local after-school and summer recreational, artistic, and cultural opportunities for families in Girdwood, Bird, Indian, Hope, and Portage. Funding supports ongoing programs that allow families to access activities close to home rather than traveling to Anchorage. This is especially critical for residents without reliable transportation and for families who rely on consistent afterschool options for their children. Local programming also reduces the need for winter highway travel, which can be unsafe. By offering high-quality, affordable classes and events within the community, FVCS ensures that all residents—regardless of age, schedule, or resources—have access to enriching experiences.
- 4. Provide a brief history of your organization, especially as it relates to Girdwood Parks and Recreation. Founded in 1981, FVCS was originally funded through MOA Parks and Recreation before support was phased out in the mid-1980s. The program later operated under the Anchorage School District until 2006, when district-wide funding cuts eliminated community school programs. At that point, FVCS transitioned to nonprofit status, securing local control and support through the Girdwood community. Since then, FVCS has remained community-driven and continues to be the only organization in Girdwood offering a comprehensive range of recreational, educational, and cultural opportunities for residents of all ages and income levels.
- 5. Explain how the proposed project meets the definition of recreation stated in the information packet. Four Valleys Community School (FVCS) is the only nonprofit in Girdwood dedicated to year-round recreation, education, and cultural programming, serving residents for more than 40 years. We meet the GVSA grant criteria by providing activities that improve health, build skills, and strengthen community connections, while also ensuring affordability through reduced fees and free resources like daily access to the school gym and walking track. Without FVCS, many after-school, summer, and drop-in opportunities would not exist locally, forcing families to travel to Anchorage or go without. GVSA funding makes it possible to sustain these essential programs, keep costs low for families, and introduce new, innovative offerings that directly respond to community needs. In short, FVCS ensures that recreation in Girdwood remains accessible, diverse, and deeply rooted in the community it serves.

FVCS primarily operates under a special-use after-school permit at Girdwood K–8 School, but our programs extend throughout the community thanks to strong partnerships with other local facilities. We regularly utilize spaces such as the Girdwood Community Room, Meadows Community Center, Alyeska Resort Daylodge, Girdwood Nordic Trail System, Forest Fair Park and Pavilion, Arlberg Soccer Field, and the local baseball field. In addition, FVCS collaborates with businesses like Spoonline Bistro, Alpenglow Coffee House, and Girdwood Brewing Company. Hosting classes in these venues not only expands our programming options but also supports local businesses—for example, scheduling a class at Alpenglow on a night they would typically be closed increases both class participation and off-hours sales for the business.

If FVCS receives less than the requested amount from GVSA, we will immediately seek alternate funding sources to close the gap. In the meantime, FVCS would continue operating but would need to raise class fees and scale back external enrichment offerings. This would include reducing support for community activities not tied directly to core programming, such as the Girdwood School play, school ski days, and the Angel Tree. Staff hours would also be reduced until program revenue allowed for expansion again, which would directly impact free resources like daily gym and track access. Long-standing low-cost programs, including drop-in sports and Romp & Roar for toddlers, would also see increased participant fees without GVSA support.

FVCS provides essential recreational and social opportunities for all ages, offering diverse, high-quality programs for more than 44 years. Since 1984, we have managed GBOS-allocated public funds to support activities identified as valuable to the community. Through our Memorandum of Agreement with ASD, we also provide public access to the Girdwood K–8 School gym after hours. Our programs are shaped by community needs and interests, fostering academic growth, healthy lifestyles, recreational experiences, and social development. Answer to 4: Provide a brief history of your organization, especially as it relates to Girdwood Parks and Recreation.

The Turnagain Arm Mycological Society (TAMS) was formed in 2017 as an all-volunteer organization and is a member of the North American Mycological Association (NAMA). TAMS contributes to documenting mushroom species in Alaska, helping the public and medical professionals to identify mushrooms, sponsor community talks and forays, and organizes the Girdwood Fungus Fair.

As an organization based in Girdwood, AK, our members frequent all trails in the Girdwood valley on club forays and as individual citizen scientists. Our organization has also met in the Girdwood Forest Fair Park after forays to utilize the park pavilions and picnic tables to display, discuss, and identify foraged fungus. In addition, the Girdwood Fungus Fair has been held 18 times in the last 19 years and utilizes the trails, community room, Nissman Pavilion, and Forest Fair Park. This fair has been held so long it is promoted on the Girdwood Parks and Recreation website as a public event that occurs within the Girdwood Parks and Recreation lands.

I had thought I could be helpful and engaged without actually being on the committee but realize that without a commitment to regularly attend meetings and contribute to the community discussion I don't make the time.

This is a tremendously challenging problem for Girdwood. I am prepared to be frustrated. But we are gradually weakening our sense of community as more and more local workers (AWWU, DOTPF, USFS, Clinic, and likely teachers in the near future) are commuters rather than rooted in Girdwood. So this is a worthy effort that needs to combine seeing what has and has not worked elsewhere with locally driven creative problem solving.

My immediate objective would be to create a timetable for committee deliverables to GBOS and the community which if adopted would identify proposed policy solutions for presentation to MOA and potential partners/funders of a realistically scaled initial "pilot" project. The committee is already moving in this direction so this appears feasible especially if the work of the committee is valued by GBOS.
