

Address traffic safety




Support desire / need for denser, mixed-use housing

# MULDOON & DEBARR TRANSIT CENTER STUDY Existing Muldoon Transit Hub





- Three stops separated by high volume, 45 mph arterial roadways
- Higher than expected number of pedestrian accidents
- Average of 600 people per day boarding at one of the three stops
- Limited bus operator and rider facilities

### MULDOON & DEBARR TRANSIT CENTER STUDY Project Overview



- Identify a preferred site and concept plan for a new East Anchorage transit center
  - Define goals
  - Evaluate multiple candidate sites
  - Refine concepts and costs
  - Coordinate municipal approvals
- Tied to the Muldoon Public Library through a joint grant
- Robust, inclusive public engagement

# MULDOON & DEBARR TRANSIT CENTER STUDY Existing Muldoon Public Library






- Rented facility, so changes are difficult

A RESOLUTION OF THE PUBLIC TRANSIT ADVISORY BOARD RECOMMENDING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF AN HMIS-LINKED TRANSIT PASS PROGRAM

**WHEREAS**, the Public Transit Advisory Board was established to advise the Assembly and the Mayor on matters related to public transportation, and;

**WHEREAS**, the Board is charged with recognizing the value and importance of public transportation, making recommendations to the Assembly and Mayor on municipal policy with respect to budget review, capital improvement programs, and funding of the publicly owned and operated transit system, and;

**WHEREAS**, the Board recognizes the importance of community partnerships in extending the benefits of public transportation to all residents, and;

**WHEREAS**, as part of an ongoing fare study, the Public Transit Advisory Board was informed of the Austin, Texas based HMIS-Pass program, which provides free transit passes to individuals experiencing homelessness who have an active profile in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), and;

**WHEREAS**, the Austin program offers a model to provide significant benefits to people receiving support for homelessness by providing consistent access to transportation for essential services, employment opportunities, and community engagement, and;

**WHEREAS**, providers of homelessness services and sheltering services have spoken at the Assembly Housing and Homelessness committee about experiencing issues with individuals reselling bus passes that are distributed as a regular requirement of the operating of services, which has led to a more cautious distribution of passes to individuals who are in dire need of supportive services, and;

**WHEREAS**, a similar initiative in Anchorage could help alleviate a known issue for homelessness supportive service providers while also providing individuals experiencing homelessness with reliable transportation, linking them to opportunities for stability in housing, support services, and employment.;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE THE PUBLIC TRANSIT ADVISORY BOARD 1 2 **RECOMMENDS:** 3 the Public Transportation Department explore the feasibility of establishing a 4 partnerships to create a program, modeled on the Austin Texas HMIS-Pass 5 initiative, to provide free transit passes to individuals experiencing homelessness who have an active HMIS profile, thereby expanding mobility 7 and access to vital services for the community.
