The double-decker offers a free ride and its route is designed to serve fringe parking areas of the central business

district, allowing workers to park and ride to most downtown businesses and employment centers. Municipal Press Officer Kathy Madison said

The bus, part of the People Mover transit system, travels a circuitous route downtown from 7:30 a.m. to 7:30 n.m. Mondays estoft

through Fridays and 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Saturdays. The bus is a 1967 model. The chassis and engine were con structed in Bristol, on Eng-

land's south coast and the body was built by Eastern Counties Coach Works in Low-

It was first used for public transit in the county of Hampshire and was operated by the Hants and Dorset Motor Services Company I to Though the new route is considered an experiment
