According to Kennedy, "Michaela was able to balance the incredible load while maintaining a strong G.P.A. She never wavered at the long hours and emotional strain of this hardship." Thankfully, both parents are now doing well.

Michaela plans to attend the University of Alaska Anchorage and study philosophy or political science. She would eventually like to pursue a law degree with a focus on public policy so that she can participate in domestic reforms of homelessness, immunizations and education. Upon returning to Alaska, she plans a career in politics, including those plans for governor and president.
